

Super Bowl berth on the line today at Heinz Field

PITTSBURGH — If there's a bigger-than-life coach, it has to be Rex Ryan. His outsized personality and outlandish comments — maybe not so absurd given what Ryan's New York Jets have achieved — draw notice no matter the situ-

If there's a bigger-than-most quarterback, literally and figuratively, it has to be Ben Roethlisberger. Not only because he's 6-foot-5, 241 pounds, larger than some linebackers and stronger than nearly everyone else at his position, but because his credentials on the field and trou-

bles away from it have been, well, so noticeable.

Ryan's loud and proud Jets (13-5) face off with Roethlisberger's fearless Steelers (13-4) today for the AFC championship. Even though both teams are blessed with playmakers galore, the centerpieces will be the bombastic coach and the controversial quarterback.

Better have a huge spotlight.

'You thought last week was emotional and all that," says Ryan, referring to a 28-21 victory at New England that improved his postseason record as Jets coach to 4-1 and lifted his team into its second straight AFC title game. "Just wait until this week.'



Gregor Named Mr. Mat

Former Springfield coach earns award

WHEELING — Coach Rich Gre-

gor began wrestling competitively at Springfield High School, where he was an outstanding varsity performer on the mats for four years. After graduating from high school in 1959, Gregor decided to matriculate to Ohio University.

At the university, Gregor wrestled under legendary mentor Harry Houska for four years, graduating in 1963. Later, he earned his masters degree from Central Missouri State in 1965.

During five decades (1960s to the 2000s), Gregor has coached in Florida, Maryland, and Ohio at both the collegiate and scholastic levels. But his true home has always been Springfield High School (now Edison High School), where he began and ended his coaching stint.

Gregor's overall coaching record is. 326-162-3, winning 69-percent of his dual meets. His 1980 Springfield squad won the Ohio Valley Athletic

also produced one of the OVAC's greatest wrestlers – Kelly Shields.

4-Goal Outburst Propels Nailers

TRENTON, N.J. -The Wheeling Nailers scored four goals in a 1:48 span late in the third, to defeat the Trenton Devils, 6-4, at Sun National Bank Center on Saturday night.

Just like Trenton, the Nailers took advantage of their first power-play chance. Mike Gershon took the faceoff victory in the offensive zone and fired the puck toward the net, which was re-directed by Joey Haddad past Devils goaltender Jeff Lerg, which pulled Wheeling within one at the end of the first period.

In the second, Devils captain Trevor Kell added to his team's lead, backhanding a rebound shot past Delmas making the score 3-1. The Nailers continued to fight, converting on the power play for the second time, when Kyle Bushee fielded the puck at the blue line and fired a shot at the net which was tipped through the five-hole of Lerg by Nick Petersen. The goal was Petersen's 20th tally of the season, and it made the score 3-2 after two periods.

The Devils took their third two-goal lead on Zancanaro's second power-play goal, lifting Trenton to a 4-2 lead. Trailing by two, the Nailers went on an important power play with 4:31 remaining in regulation. Nick Petersen deflected a

Kyle Bushee shot which slipped by Lerg to pull Wheeling with in one 4-3. Nearly 30 seconds later, Petersen broke into the zone, working 1-on-1 and spired a shot past Lerg on sniped a shot past Lerg on the glove side to net the hat trick and tie the game at 4-4. 






The Patriots lead the team, and Class AAAA, standings with 175 points.





Like his team, Crain, who wrestled for Shaw in the 1980s, is trying to find his own identity as the leader of one of the state's, and the nation's, leading programs.
"We knew what we had

to do and what our jobs were, but he was the rock that kept us steady," Crain said of Shaw.

Shaw announced his retirement near the beginning of last season, partly to give Crain an opportunity to prepare himself for the tran-

sition.
"To his credit, he opened the reins a little bit and let me do some things, as well as getting some hard-knock lessons at the same time," said Crain, who has been a coach at most levels of the Oak Glen program.




same token, that's time away from your family, wife, girlfriend or what have you."

Gregor's overall coaching record is 326-162-3, winning 69-percent of his dual meets. His 1980 Springfield squad won the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class A Team Championship. As well as coaching many



A biography titled "Bobby Douglas: Life and Legacy of an American Wrestling Legend" is due to hit shelves and online book sites in









Mother Nature delays OVAC mat tourney

• 58th annual event will hold two sessions today

It wouldn't be OVAC Wrestling Tournament weekend without a bout with Mother Nature.

Department of Transportation) to the National Guard and the local weather models showed that we were going to get hammered between 3 and 8 p.m., Rataiczak said shortly after announcing the decision through the conference's one-call system. "We felt like we could get the (athletes) to the arena, but how to get them home safely was another issue."

The official decision was made shortly before 11 a.m., which was just seven hours before the opening

ceremonies were set to begin.

Rataiczak indicated that nearly half of the schools stay in the Wheeling area for the weekend. Those schools, who were en route to Wheeling, were allowed to work out on the arena mats until 6 p.m. Thursday evening.

"We probably have half the teams stay in Wheeling," Rataiczak said. "But, we had 21 schools coming on buses and again how do you get them home?

All of the aforementioned models have indicated the storm to be a quick mover and highway officials indicated they'd be able to get the main roads clear by the morning.

DVAC mat crew on the jo

WHEELING - When grappling fans from all over the Ohio Valley arrive here this afternoon, they'll once again see the usual eight-mat layout on the WesBanco Arena floor.

That's been the customary format for more

than two decades.

Getting the mats to the arena, setting them up and mopping them all prior to the first match is a task, which gets done like clockwork thanks to work of a small team of some 15 volunteers.

Spearheading the work, which got done Wednesday afternoon, was former Wheeling Park head coach Gene Monteleone and Steve Shaffer.

"This has always been Wheeling Park's unwritten job," Shaffer said inside the arena Wednesday. "The OVAC asked us if we minded doing it since we're the closest school and we've been doing it since probably about

The team includes some 10 junior varsity

wrestlers at Wheeling Park, Bellaire head coach Shane Shaffer, who's been helping with the project since he was a junior high wrestler for the Patriots; Big Reds' assistant coach Josh Boyd and Wheeling Park head coach Jack Doyle, who according to Monteleone and the elder Shaffer is the heir apparent to take over the leadership role.

"Park usually has a lot of reserve wrestlers and we can get them out of school and down here to help a little bit," Monteleone said. "People show up for the opening ceremonies and they don't realize the work that goes into getting this ready. It would be nice to set up one of those cameras during the project, so people can see what goes into it.'

For their work, the Patriots' jayvee wrestlers get free admitance to the tournament, but their work isn't completed. They're responsible for mopping the mats between sessions. They'll also take the mats down Saturday evening after the final match concludes. After Friday's rounds, they'll take out half of the mats as the tournament shifts to four mats for Saturday's action.

The job of setting up and tearing down the mats has become much easier since Shaffer and Monteleone began the job in the mid 80s. The biggest change is the style of mat used by most of the schools.

With the use of the Dollamur mat, which comes in separate pieces and unfolds with relative ease, the job takes the crew just under four hours to complete the entire proj-

"The old mats used to curl up and you'd have to put tables on them overnight to get them to lay flat," Shaffer

Several schools have loaned the conference mats for the weekend. Included are the likes of St. John, Bellaire, Union Local, Martins Ferry, St. Clairsville, Wheeling Park and Shadyside.

Many of the schools get the mats to Wheeling them-selves, but if they don't have a way to transport them, Jeff Higgins, an electronics teacher at Wheeling Park, owns a box truck and travels around the area to pick up the mats and then brings them to the arena.

"We try to get the closest schools to loan us mats and deliver them if we can," Monteleone said. "We used to have to beg, borrow and steal to try to get these mats here. But, Jeff has been a big help and Ohio County Schools gives him the day off to help us."

The focus now shifts to wrestling, but the mat crew will

be ready all weekend. Staskey can



The brackets and seeding were finalized during Sunday's meetings and officially unveiled Monday.





All but two of the Monarchs' 14 starters have double-figure victories this season, with a half-a-dozen surpassing the 20-win plateau.




Obviously, the kids bought in.



times this year and I think a top five finish would be a good goal for this team.'


The Patriots boast a 37man roster, but have still had trouble finding consistent entrants in three of the weight classes, which Doyle admittedly has a tough time understanding.



Bridgeport's once-dominant wrestling program has slipped in recent years, but first-year head coach Scott Neuenschwander is determined to get the Bulldogs back on track.

"We've only got four kids out this season and one of them is injured right now," the former St. Clairsville and Ohio Northern matman said. "But we've got 25 kids in our pee-wee program this year and there are a couple of eighth-graders that are having pretty good seasons.

"With the young kids on the high school team and those kids coming up, I think we've got a pretty good core to build around," he declared.

Neuenschwander was hired after serving as chief assistant to long-time head coach Ross Roskovich who stepped down following last season.


The Bridgeport program had been defunct before Roskovich came back to return the program after it had been non-existent for several years.

The first-year coach is doing his best to continue the program and enhance it at the same time.

However, like at many other schools in the Ohio Valley, numbers have become an issue.

Bridgeport, which is one of just only two Belmont County schools to have won a team state title in grappling, has some of its richest history in the mat sport. At last year's tournament, Bridgeport finished with eight points and had one placer. Jimmy Gessler placed eighth, but he's since graduated.

Of that trio, Neuenschwander thinks Anderson has a legitimate shot of standing on the podium come Saturday night.

"John has a shot (at placing)," his coach said. "It all depends on what kind of draw he gets. He's been steadily improving and if we can get a couple weeks of hard practice in before the tournament, that will be beneficial for him."

Thus far, Anderson is 9-8 and recently finished fourth in the Shadyside Last Man Standing event, which was held two weeks ago.

Kinemond is being assisted by former Tiger grapplers Brian Crosier and Luke Burkhardt.






