WHEELING — Parkersburg South continued its stranglehold on the 63rd annual Ron Mauck Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Wrestling Tournament Friday. The Patriots totaled 163.5 points, which is a little more than 40 ahead of second-place Steubenville.

The Wood County contingent has 13 of its 14 wrestlers still alive for places, with seven of those competing in today's noon semifinals at WesBanco Arena.

"We're going to keep wrestling hard and hopefully have an even better day (today)," first-year Parkersburg South coach Shaun Smith said. "We want to try and place everyone as high as we can. That's our goal."

Seeking championship finals berths for South are freshmen Tueler Windland.


Seeking championship finals berths for South are freshman Tucker Windland (103) and Louden Haga (285), along with sophomore Luke Martin (113), juniors Ryan Taylor (145), T.J. Lambiotte (170), Hunter DeLong (182) and Justin Allman (195).

"I wouldn't say surprises, but I'm extremely happy with the way some of the younger guys have stepped up, especially our freshmen," Smith added. "I'm glad they're where they are at because it has helped us as a team."


DeLong is a returning champion at 160, while Martin and Allman were second at 106 and 182, respectively. Lambiotte was third at 145.



## **Union Local's Coach Jim** Crosier Named Mr. Mat

WHEELING - Coach Jim Crosier graduated from Steubenville High School in 1967, where he was an OVAC runnerup at 175 pounds under OVAC Hall of Famer and Mr. Mat Bob Hedmond. He later earned his bachelor's degree from Ohio University in 1971.

Crosier was an outstanding educator

for 40 years, retiring in 2011.

Crosier taught and coached at Steubenville for two years (1971 to 1973). The next 38 years he taught, coached wrestling, and was an athletics director and administrator at Union Local High School. Crosier was also a wrestling official for 29 years.

As head coach for nine years, Crosier's mat teams won two OVAC AA team titles and one OVAC AAA crown. He produced four OVAC champions: Mike Gregg, Kelly Wallace, Randy Simpson, and Jeff McCormick. Wallace placed fifth at states in 1975.

Crosier was named OVAC AA Coach of the Year in 1974 and 1975, as well as OVAC AAA Coach of the Year in 1980.

Coach Crosier also founded the Ohio

to as the junior high/middle school OVAC Tournament, though not affiliated with the conference. Many middle schools in the Ohio Valley consider it the premiere event of the season. The competition is still going strong today.

But most wrestling enthusiasts in the Ohio Valley know him as an arbiter of the mats. As a member of the Ohio Valley Wrestling Officials Association, Crosier has refereed many Ohio sectional, district, regional, and state tournaments. He was also invited to officiate the 1979 NAIA National Wrestling Championships held at the Wheeling Civic Center (now

Wesbanco Arena).
In 2001, Crosier was named the Larry Deaton OVAC Official of the Year by the OVAC Wrestling Coaches Association for his exceptional efforts as an overseer of the mats.

Crosier's most recent honor was his induction into the Ohio Wrestling Officials Hall of Fame in 2014.

Crosier was married to Deborah Crosier for 41 years before her passing in 2013. They have two sons, Brian and


Shadyside junior Greg Quinn (120) is also no stranger to big bouts.



"I caught him in the hallway one day and asked him if he wanted to wrestle for me,' Brinker said in a recent telephone interview. "He got this strange look on his face, but he developed into an outstanding wrestler and an outstanding young man in a hurry."
Jason echoed those thoughts.

"Terry was the one who approached Norman about wrestling. He told him it would be a good way to stay in shape for football," Jason explained. "The football coaches at that time thought it was a good idea, and so he did it. It became his No. 1 passion. Out of all the sports he played - football, wrestling and track - wrestling, by far, was his No. I sport at the end."

When Norman Ayers graduated from Bellaire High School in 1992, he was the noted. school's winningest wrestler; had the most pins and quickest pin. All of those marks have since been broken.

"Records are meant to be broken," Jason said. "They stood, however, for a long time before they were broken."

He is also the Big Reds only back-to-back OVAC champion, although the school has had numerous two-time champions.

He was set to be the junior high wrestling coach when tragedy, unfortunately, struck. He passed away on Aug. 6, 1993, just three weeks shy of his of his 21st birthday.

"He died from a brain tumor that was found after an incident that he had," Jason man,

"I had been in the hospital at Shriners for said. "They went in to operate, but when they opened him up it was too late.

"I really think he would still be involved in wrestling at some level today," Jason admitted. "It started as an innocent sport to keep him in shape for football and it became his No. 1 love.

"His dream was to go to college and to what he wanted to do, but was unable because of things that happened that he couldn't control.'

Not only was Norman Ayers a two-time OVAC champion and a three-time placewinner, he was also a four-time Ohio state tournament qualifier, placing twice. He was a Division II runnerup his junior year when he was pinned by Columbus DeSales standout Luke Fickell, who is Ohio State's defensive coordinator. His senior season he finished third in Division III.

He lost in the second round but came back to defeat that kid in the wrestlebacks for third place," Brinker said. "He was upset his senior year when we moved down a division because he couldn't face Fickell again."

Brinker recalled a running joke between the two during his Ayers' career.

"He always wanted to know where the

turnbuckles were?" Brinker also said if it hadn't been for

Jason's situation, his older brother might have taken another path after graduation from high school.

"He really cared a lot for Jason," Brinker


Jason also credits his older brother for his love for the Bellaire School District. He is entering his seventh year as a member of the Bellaire Board of Education.

Individual class leaders are Parkersburg South (5A); Indian Creek (4A); Magnolia (3A); and Caldwell (1A/2A).

"Overall, I thought we wrestled OK, but there were a couple of matches that could've went either way," Steubenville head coach Mike Black-burn said. "But that's what happens when you wrestle good competition.'


Shadyside head coach Sean Grinch was pleased with the way his Tigers performed as they had 10 of 11 advance to the second round.







Small schools Shadyside and Madonna were third and fourth, respectively, with 152.5 and 126. University rounded out the top 5 with



sion of Madonna's Casey Recrosio at 113. Martin was a runnerup last season at 106. The other titlist was junior Hunter DeLong (182) who captured his third straight championship when he outpointed Meadowbrook's Jud Ramage, 11-5, in a battle of the top two seeds. DeLong is 22-4 and has a chance to become the ninth fourthtime champion next season.

Big Red made a frenetic challenge as senior standout Tariq Wilson became the eighth wrestler in the 63-year history to win four consecutive titles. In an unprecedented decision by tournament organizers, the 126-pound championship bout between Wilson and Univer-sity's No. 2 seed Jackson Henson was moved to the final match of the night.

It certainly lived up to its billing as Wilson put on a takedown clinic in posting an 18-10 decision. He has now won at 106, 113, 120 and 126 and is 27-0.

"It really hasn't sunk in yet," Wilson said moments after winning his match. "Eventually it will, but right now I'm just living in the moment. I still can't believe

In addition to Wilson, other Big Red champions were Timmy Young (106), Jashon Hubbard (132) and Shawn Livingston (170).

Young earned a 12-3 major decision against John Marshall's Jordan Wood to improve to 22-3. He was fourth last year at the same weight.

Hubbard, now 4-1, became the first No. 1 seed with a

losing record as he entered the tournament at 0-1. He scored a major decision, 13-4, over Oak Glen's Robert Bozek. Hubbard won last year at 106. Livingston, who was fifth two years ago and sixth last year, handed Union Local's Matt McFarland a 6-2 loss.

Wheeling Park's John Nash, the No. 3 seed, brought home the top hardware at 152 when he pulled a 5-1 upset of top-seeded Hobie Howiler of Barnesville. The Patriots sophomore had knocked off No. 2 Alex Shuman of Oak Glen in the semifinals.

"I feel like I'm on top of the world," Nash said. "I had lost to the No. 2 seed earlier in the year, so I knew I just had to go out there and wrestle my match.'

Wheeling Park oach Clay Tucker, one of the four-time champions during his days at Martins Ferry, was pleased with Nash's performance.

"John looks at wrestling as a way of life," Tucker said. "He eats, drinks and sleeps this sport. All the time that he puts in pays off. He's been getting better and better as the year goes on."

Magnolia's Caleb Nice made school history with his victory at 220 pounds. When he defeated Caldwell's Clay Poling in the finals, 6-2, he became the first Blue Eagle to win an OVAC Wrestling Tournament championship.

"It's pretty cool," Nice said. "My first two years I made it to the semifinals, but I always lost by one point, two points. This year there was no way I was losing this

"I came in here prepared and my coaches, family and

girlfriend are all a part of this.'

Shadyside's top-seeded Greg Quinn (120) improved to a tournament-best 36-0 with a 5-2 decision against Weir's Caleb Rea. Quinn is a three-time placewinner, having finished second as a freshman and third as a sophomore. He lost to East Liverpool's Alex Potts both

Indian Creek's Miles Mazik, the No. 6 seed, completed his run through the 138-pound bracket with a 5-2 victory against Beaver Local's top-seeded Jason Keyes. It marked the third consecutive year that Keyes has fin-

Union Local senior Bobby Stewart ended his career in style with an OVAC title. He doubled up Steubenville's Dakotah Goff, 4-2. Goff was a defending champion who fell to 21-5. Stewart was second as a sophomore and third as a junior and is 30-3.

Madonna's Dillon Shaw, the top seed at 160, lived up to that billing, but barely with a 4-3 decision over Meadowbrook's Bailey Jenkins, the No. 2 seed. Shaw, now 24-1, was second last year.

Martins Ferry sophomore Dalton Hoover (195) improved on his fourth-place finish with a championship after edging Parkersburg South's top-seeded Justin Allman, 3-1, in overtime. Hoover is 24-2

St. Clairsville's Michael Furbee, although undersized as a neavyweight, prevailed in the 285-pound class. The No. 1 seed defeated Caldwell's No. 2 Chance Rucker, 5-3. Furbee improved to 27-1 and is a four-time placewinner.

Wilson was the Bierkortte Award winner, symbolic of the Most Outstanding Wrestler. Young captured the Hercules Award for most pins in the least amount of time in the championship bracket.

DeLong is a returning champion at 160, while Martin and Allman were second at 106 and 182, respectively. Lambiotte was third at 145.




accomplish that feat.



WHEELING - On the surface, the

numbers seem impressive.

During this weekend's Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling Tournament, which wraps up tonight at WesBanco Arena, there are 40 schools and 445 athletes tak-

However, if you do the math, there's a

slight cause for concern.

On average, each team has entered just a little more than 11 wrestlers, but there are 14 weight classes in prep wrestling.

"A couple of years I would have definitely said I was concerned, but really the numbers this year are up," OVAC Tournament Director Dr. Dan Doyle said. 'We've had schools that have had teams that have come in and out and that affects

Wrestling fans - and those who follow the sport closely - can point to a myriad of reasons for the downward trend in numbers.

Doyle, who has been affiliated with wrestling in basically every way imaginable, thinks the downward trend in numbers could be cyclical.

Pointing out examples such as Toronto, Steubenville Central, Fort Frye, Clay-Battelle, Doyle can find examples of teams going up and down or still in the early stages of building their programs.

"It takes a lot of hardwork and a lot of dedication to be a wrestler," Doyle said. 'I think often some kids just aren't willing to give the commitment to the sport that it requires. It's not easy.'

lt's not just a 'small-school' problem. Martins Ferry and St. Clairsville both barely fill half of the 14 weight classes.

The obvious reason is easy to find. Population up and down the river - on both sides - is declining. Therefore, fewer kids in the schools means fewer kids involved

Magnolia, which is the only school to have a full complement of wrestlers below Class 4A, has benefitted because head coach Dr. Vince Monseau isn't ashamed to 'recruit' within his own school.

"Being retired, I got to the lunchroom and recruit. I also get the kids to help recruit other kids to be on the team,"
Monseau said "It's one of those tireless things. I know
some (coaches) won't ask a kid to wrestle, but sometimes you need to ask them, so the kid opens his eyes to the sport and gets involved."

Wrestling tournaments — similar to track meets in the spring — are long. There's no way getting around it. Even when you're running eight mats like the OVAC Tournament, it's still a three-day, five-session event to crown the champions.

"The time factor plays a role," Doyle said. "Two-day tournaments are the norm and here we are for three days. Some of it is our society because everything is so fast paced these days.

Because of the decline in numbers and fanship, the true wrestling fans stress the dual matches. Obviously, they don't last as long and it gives fans a chance to create an atmosphere, which the bigger tournaments often times

lack.
"Those duals are critical," Doyle said. "They also help

When he was coaching at Buckeye Local, Doyle learned the benefits of a dual first hand. While sitting in the stands, Mike Wilt, who eventually served as an assistant coach at Buckeye Local, enjoyed it and sought out Doyle about joining the team.

To help grow the sport, Doyle cited football as an example of one that could promote wrestling more to its players because the two sports can prove beneficial to one

"There should be a lot of give and take, but unfortunately, the football programs don't always promote

wrestling," Doyle said. "They promote the weight room."

Monseau, who pointed out his Blue Eagles have only three competitors who also played on the state championship football team, regrets that he doesn't have more.

"If I had to identify what I thought my biggest failure has been since I've been at Magnolia it's not being able to convince the football kids that they'd benefit from wrestling," Monseau said. "I can't seem to do that and I can't get the football coaches to push wrestling. I don't think they talk against it, but there's no one pushing the foo!ball players to wrestle."

# OVAC Wrestling event blossomed under Ron Mauck

WHEELING — It is a rite of winter — possibly the second largest OVAC event and usually a lightning rod for some nasty weather.

It is the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament, and the 63rd edition unfolds Thursday at WesBanco Arena.

The Rudy Mumley OVAC Football Charity All-Star Football Game is the unquestioned pinnacle of conference events. The Ron Mauck wrestling showcase is not far behind.

Some 40 teams and several hundred grapplers will be featured on the eight mats. Winning an individual title is a grueling task, as a grappler must prevail in five successive matches in a 48-hour time frame.

Parkersburg South enters this year's tourney as defending champion. The Patriots will be challenged to retain their title from a host of formidable teams.

The tourney is named in honor of Mauck for his long and passionate work with OVAC wrestling as well as for his countless years of overseeing the tournament. Dr. Dan Doyle now serves as the tournament director.

"George Kovalick built the foundation for this tournament and Dan Doyle is currently leading the event, but let there be no doubt that Ron Mauck built the tournament to what it is today. That's why it carries his name," OVAC Executive Director Tom Rataiczak said. "Ron was so careful to observe everything Kovalick did to create the event and spent his life making certain that George would be pleased. I have heard him say so many times that 'Coach K' would be pleased or that's not the way George would want it done.

"Years after his death, the tournament still carries so many of his ideas. And Ron has been very cautious to see that Dan Doyle was and is being groomed to follow those same principles. Ron and Dan both have worked diligently to see that the right people are placed in the right spots," he added. "Ron is so meticulous in details. One only has to stand in the storage room and look how everything is organized, accounted for, checked back in ready for the next year. There are items being used that have been with the tournament for decades that are still as good as new. Before the tournament is closed out, Ron makes certain that everything is in I working order, ready for next year."

The actual wrestling commences Thursday evening after an Olympic-style ceremony. But the tourney takes shape well in advance, starting with today's seeding meeting.

"It's a long week. A very long week. Starting on Sunday (today) with the seeding meeting and ending early in the morning the following Sunday, it takes its toll on the athletes, the coaches and the workers. But everyone works for a common cause: The best wrestling tournament possible," Rataiczak said. "I sit at the tournament and watch it for three days. I hear the guys who run it discuss problems and concerns, but you can't find them. That's how well-oiled the machine is, how solid the event is. From start to finish, problems are seen, discussed, and corrected before the average fan can even tell it existed. That's a credit to how well it's organized.

"The wrestling community is one of the tightest-knit groups I have ever witnessed. I think much of that is due to the fact of the amount of time they spend competing together during the season," he added. "They are quick to share, quick to assist, quick to suggest improvements. They realize what it takes to produce something of this magnitude and go out of their way to assure its success."

No one knows or appreciates the OVAC tourney better than Mauck. He has been involved with the mat spectacle for half a century.

"We have been blessed with a lot of

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No one knows or appreciates the OVAC tourney better than Mauck. He has been involved with the mat spectacle for half a century.

"We have been blessed with a lot of great people who have taken interest in. the tournament. They have provided great leadership that still has a lot of impact today," Mauck said, whose wrestling roots date back to 1966 when he coached Follansbee High. "It has been a great ride. We still have great people involved and that is the key. New leadership leads to new and better things.

OK, but there were a couple of matches that could've went either way," Steubenville coach Mike Blackburn said, "But that's what happens when you wrestle good competition.


Shadyside coach Sean Grinch was pleased with the way his team performed as it had 10 of 11 advance to the second round.






