Bid to oust Young makes no sense

WHEELING - It's safe to say the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has had better weeks.

Turmoil quickly surfaced Thursday when Diocesan officials announced the closing of Bishop Donahue High School at the end of the academic year. The news blindsided the Donahue Nation.

The move was called a merger with Wheeling Central. The Bishops got nothing out of the so-called merger except a tuition stipend. Everything else remained Wheeling Central

- school colors, nickname, staff and venue.
While the Donahue community was still reeling from that life-changing edict, the Diocese wasted no time in dropping a second bombshell just a day later — terminating Wheeling Central head football coach and

athletic director Mike Young.

The move was a bigger stunner in Ohio Valley circles than Donald Trump winning the presidential election.

Young is not only coach and athletic director at the East Wheeling school -- he is the face of the school. He is a born and bred Maroon Knight.

He played football for coach George Strager in 1963 and coach Andy Urbanic from 1964-66, winning state titles every year. He then assisted coach Jim Thomas on four more state title teams (1979, 2000, 2002 and 2004).

Thomas died in 2004. Young quickly and seamlessly filled the void. His tenure has been marked by great success - and doing so in class fashion. He has guided the Knights to state championships in 2005, 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2011 while accu-

mulating more than 100 wins.

His gridiron coaching work was so highly regarded that he was featured on a recently completed school mural alongside Stager, Urbanic and Thomas. He will be a first bal-

lot OVAC Hall of Fame selection. There are three basic reasons you fire a

- head coach. 1... Not winning enough;
- 2... Morality issues; 3... Criminal activity.

Young has obviously won enough. He is morally rock-solid and has no criminal background.

So why the ill-fated witch hunt? Obviously someone in high places has some clout to go with their own agenda.

But what is refreshing about the disturbing episode is how quickly and passionately the Maroon Knight Nation rallied around Young. Assistant coaches were poised to quit as well as some booster officers. Parents and staff members were outraged.

The united outpouring of support yielded quick results. Just hours after being terminated, Young was reinstated as head coach and athletic director.

The Diocesan Superintendent of School Vincent de Paul Schmidt issued a statement about a "misunderstanding with school leadership." Where is the misunderstanding? You are either fired or not. There is no gray

Such a response is weak, if not laughable. The last few days must have been bitter-

sweet for Young and his family. He still has the two jobs he loves. But he also knows a person(s) close to his program is wielding a knife aimed at his back.

A new week commences with a good man and championship coach still in two positions he relishes. For those responsible for Friday's night's Maroon tumult, maybe they should be removed from theirs.


WHEELING - Martins Ferry has 329 alltime placewinners at the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament — the most of any school. The final four placers helped lead the Purple Riders to their 12th Class 3A team championship late Saturday night as the 64th annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament ended its three-day stay inside Wheeling's WesBanco Arena.

Martins Ferry and Linsly were locked in a battle for the title as the night wore down.

The Purple Riders' Dalton Hoover defended


his 195-pound title with a 7-4 repeat victory over Parkersburg South's Justin Allman. The win gave Martins Ferry a slim lead over the Cadets with both having an entrant in the 285pound weight class.

Dom Wallace prevailed 1-0 over South's Louden Haga to claim third place. That meant Linsly's Gage Giovengo had to pin Steubenville's Tyler Ely to give his school the title. However, the Cadets senior won 4-1 to remain unbeaten in 31 matches. See, **HOOVER**, Page B2

"He fought off that just like he always does," Valentine noted. "He's a tough kid.







LaMotte Named Mr. Mat

WHEELING - A 1965 graduate of Bridgeport High School, Chick LaMotte was a two-time OVAC and Eastern District Champion. In fact, his senior year as captain of the "Bulldogs," he reached the Ohio State Wrestling Tour theme were limited during a time than theme were finals during a time when there were no divisions. Today, he would have placed at least 6th in the championships.

Upon graduating from Bridgeport High, Chick enlisted in the United States Marine Corps during the Vietnam Conflict. Coach LaMotte was seriously wounded in Vietnam and spent 10 months at Bethesda Naval Hospital recuperating from his wounds. For his bravery in combat, Andrew "Chick" LaMotte received the Purple Heart, the National Defense Ribbon, the Combat Action Ribbon, and two Campaign Ribbons. After four years of service, he was most honorably discharged from the Corps as a Sergeant.

Returning home, Chick initiated the Bridgeport "Bulldog" Youth Program in 1979, which complimented his brother Dave LaMotte's scholastic mat program at Bridgeport High. As a matter of fact, Coach Dave LaMotte was quoted as saying, "My older brother Chick had so much to do with introducing many members of our 1987 Ohio State Runner-up and 1988 Ohio State Championship Teams to the

sport of wrestling as youngsters."
While coaching at Bellaire's St. Johns

Central Catholic High School, Coach Andrew "Chick" LaMotte won two OVAC Division Titles in 2004 and 2006. His 2006 squad won the Eastern District Team Championship where Chick was named district coach of the year. Not only did this team place in the top 10 at the Ohio State Tournament, Coach Andrew "Chick" LaMotte also produced the school's first and only state titliest in Joseph Skoff at 135 pounds as a senior.

Later, Chick LaMotte produced a state champion, Wheeling Central Catholic High School's Zach Basich at the West Virginia State Championships in the 145pound weight class during the 2008

wrestling season.

Chick LaMotte's efforts as a high school wrestling coach for 29 years was by no means unnoticed by those who love the mat sport. In 2011, Coach LaMotte was inducted into his alma mater, Bridgeport High School's Athletic Hall of Fame. Most recently in 2014, Coach Andrew "Chick" LaMotte received the "Courage Award" and inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame - Ohio State Chapter. His accomplishments are enshrined at the Hall's museum in Stillwater, Oklahoma. What an honor!

Andrew "Chick" LaMotte and his devoted wife Joyce reside in Bridgeport. They have two wonderful children: Lynette and Chick, Jr. and five beautiful grandchildren: Shane, Madison, Amber,

Haleigh, and Chickie.






WHEELING - Harrison Central's Todd Dare dares to compete.







"I've also done numerous regionals, dis-








An overview of action at the 64th OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships at Wes Banco Arena in Wheeling.










Doyle said Sunday's seeding meeting went great.








ing his fourth championship.

WHEELING — Wheeling Park is a very well respected wrestling program, both in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference and the state of West Virginia.

The Patriots will be seeking their seventh overall title and second Class 5A championship when the 64th annual Ron Mauck OVAC Tournament gets under way Thursday for a three-day stay inside downtown Wheeling's WesBanco Arena.







Whether it is the intensity at which they competed or the level of preparation that carried them into matches, wrestling seems to be the one sport that good wrestlers become good coaches.

Such is the case at Buckeye Local, where success during the Dan Doyle, Jay Michael and Brian Davis eras has fallen off and now has a former Panther state champion trying to rebuild and regenerate a program in need of a reconstruction project.

Willie Saxton is in the midst of his second year as the head coach at his alma mater and in just that second year it appears that Saxton may just be on the right track.




I challenge anyone to prove me wrong that wrestling is the most strenuous scholastic sport. Should you try to do so, you better do your homework, because I have for over 60 years.









Along with Meadows being slowed by injury, Shadyside is also without the services of D.J. Hoge and Wyatt Schrader.



Red Devils could surprise some people this weekend

ST. CLAIRSVILLE - As it pertains to this weekend's 64th annual Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling Tournament, St. Clairsville is a team that many of the pundits aren't expecting much from as it pertains to the team race.

Head coach Joel Sansone, who is in his seventh season at the helm of his alma mater, is OK with that, too.

"We're not ranked very highly, but we have some guys who many people have never heard of that have a chance to make a name for themselves and I know they're looking forward to the opportunity," Sansone said.

The Red Devils actually have nary a competitor this weekend who has stood on the OVAC podium or took part in last season's Division II district tournament.

'We're a very, very young team with five freshmen and three sophomores in our lineup," Sansone said. "I actually think we've overachieved to this point."

The Red Devils are currently 3-1 in duals and only took part in an invitational at Atwater Waterloo and their own America's Best Value, Inn Tournament during the Christmas break prior to last weekend's Buckeye 8 Tournament.

"Since we have such a young team, we

decided not to schedule anything between our tournament and the Buckeye 8," Sansone said. "We wanted to reassess and break down some things in terms of what we need to improve on. We've been working hard in the (practice) room since our tournament to get better.'

The Red Devils finished ninth out of 23 teams at Waterloo with five individual placers and then finished fourth in their own event with nine grapplers earning a place in the top six.

"Honestly, I like where we're at right now," Sansone said. "Each time we've competed, we've exceeded expectations. Our kids are young and hungry to win. They give everything they have each day and when they put the ankle band on and the whistle blows, they're ready to go."

The Buckeye 8 tournament - and this weekend's OVAC event, which opens Thursday at WesBanco Arena in downtown Wheeling - started quite the finishing stretch for the Devils.

"Everything we've done up until the Buckeye 8 was basically like the pre-season to get ready for what's ahead," Sansone said. "We still have the OHSAA Duals and the OVAC Duals and then the sectional, so we have a lot of big events left. This is the point in the season where we want to start getting better."




