"This is our goal for the entire year and they worked so hard for this goal and they achieved it. I could not be more proud of them.





Tomlan is in her 17th year as coach for the Red Devils. A I Blankenship, will serve as choreogra-







"We have moved up a division this year (from Class 2A to 3A). It will be exciting to face some new teams in our quest for the title," Becker said.



"This year's routine is a different tone than what we are used to," Strain said. "We're very excited for the changes. Our routine is filled with collegiate aspects


due to the format change.
