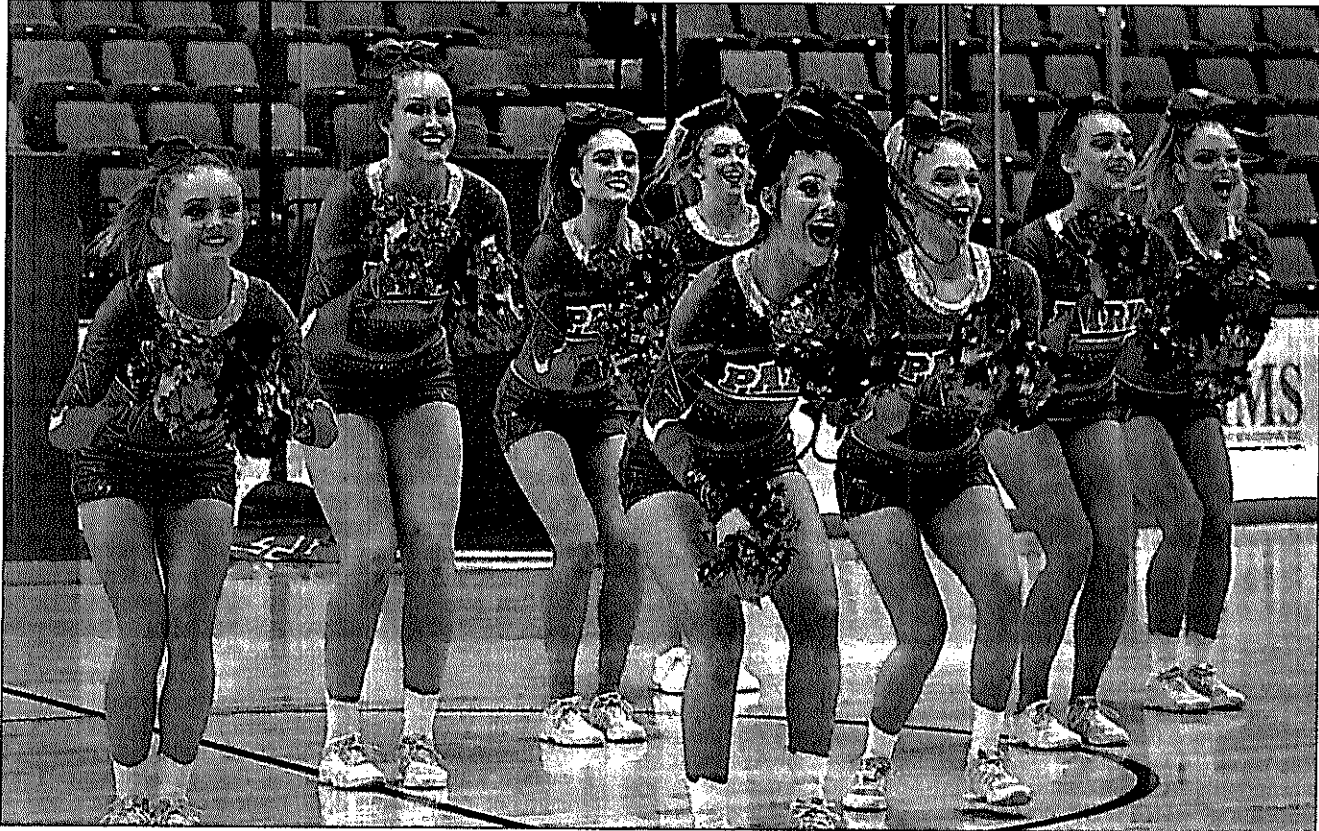


Park, St. C., Toronto Continue Cheer Legacy

Madonna Goes Back-to-Back; Linsly Wins 3A

WHEELING — There was an increase with the amount of teams participating Saturday at the OVAC Cheering Championships at WesBanco Arena. With more competition, the final results had little difference.

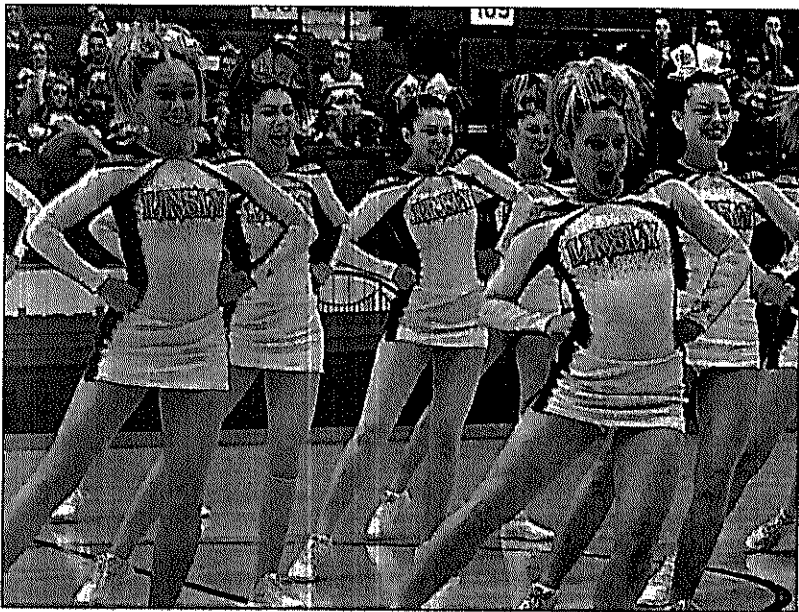
Wheeling Park secured the "triple crown" in cheerleading claiming the 5A title while St. Clairsville won the 4A championship for a record 12th year in a row.

In the 2A Division, Toronto completed a four-peat and Madonna repeated as 1A champions.

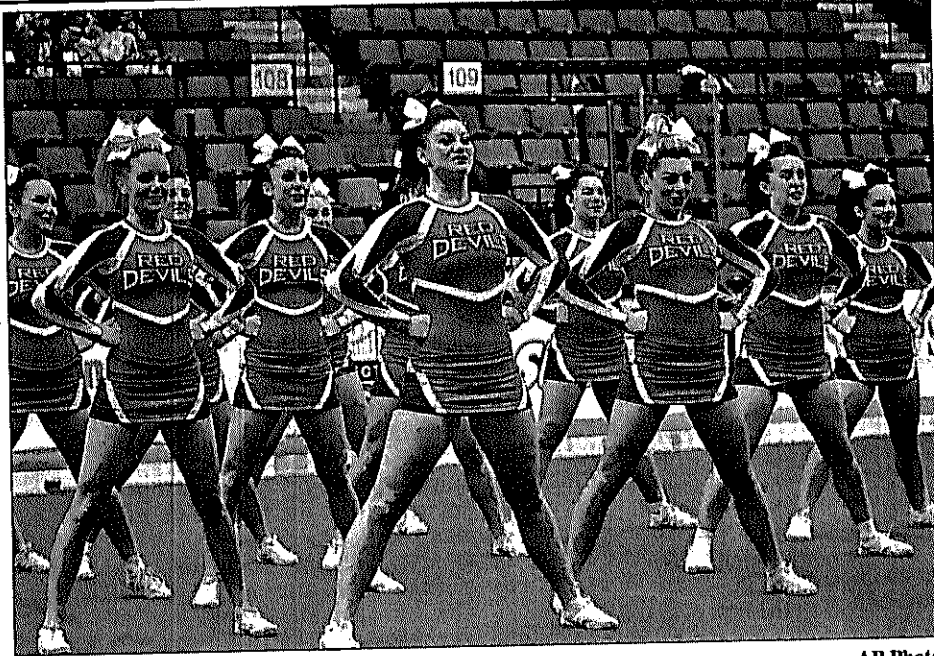
Linsly was the lone new champion as the Cadets secured the 3A title.

After securing a regional championship and claiming a state title, it was business as usual for Wheeling Park.

"This is the first time in school history we've won the triple crown," Wheeling Park coach Shawna Shepherd said.

"We're really excited. My seniors have never lost OVACs, so we really wanted to finish the year off well."

The Patriots claimed their seventh straight OVAC title and 22nd in school history. The Patriots also have the most conference championships.

"We put a lot of time in the gym. We start in August and we don't finish until basketball season," Shepherd said. "We're six days a week. We put the pressure on them and they live up to it."

Linsly is no stranger to hoisting the hardware in cheering as it is the Cadets' ninth overall OVAC title and seventh in the past 10 years.

"They're hungry for it," Linsly coach Kylie Harris said about her team winning. "They want it and they know its not always theirs. They practice as hard as they possibly can and they never ever leave thinking they have it in the bag, which I think is a really, really good thing that they're able to do. It's not something that's going to be handed to them. They work really hard for it."

Usually for a performance, a team has a set routine they practice for quite some time to perfect for a big show. While for the Cadets, that's true for the most part, however, there was some minor changes they did earlier in the week and it sure paid off.

"They were absolutely amazing," Harris said. "We made quick changes at the end of the week at the end of our routine. They were nervous about it, but they came through, stuck it and they were phenomenal."

St. Clairsville, continued its domination

of Class 4A. The Red Devils were the first to perform for 4A and they set the tone high.

After claiming the hardware for the 12th year in a row, coach Shawn Tomlan didn't realize that it was a record.

"That's what they just said to me," Tomlan said. "I was not aware of that. That's really amazing and it's a great group of girls. They deserve that."

"I think they did well. We had a few little mistakes in there, but they came ready. It's always tough being that team on top. That added pressure every year gets to be really difficult."

Toronto was able to celebrate for the ninth time in school history. Not only that, but the Red Knights were able to send their senior leaders out on top. Those seniors never tasted defeated at WesBanco Arena.

"We had four seniors and we went for our fourth OVAC title in a row," Toronto coach Natalie Mousourakis said. "They just worked together, busted their butts and we're really excited for everything."

It's been a long time coming for Madonna. Prior to 2018, the Blue Dons were in a dry spell as they had not heard their name announced since 2006.

Looks like times have changed and now the Blue Dons have put a streak together as they secured back-to-back championships.

"Victory is sweet," Madonna coach Maria Canella said. "We had a big drought there for a while, but I told the girls that they need to be building on a legacy and they understood the meaning of hard work and dedication. They really, really wanted it. They proved that they can do it."

Defending its OVAC title will be no easy task for Wheeling Central.

The Maroon Knights moved down to Class 2A this season after winning the 3A title last year.

Also, after winning the West Virginia Region One title and finishing as state runners-up in December, it is a quick turnaround to prepare for OVACs. But, Central coach Jessica Becker has been at the helm since 2008 and knows all too well about the challenges surrounding the OVAC Championships.

"A big obstacle for us each year is to change our routine to fit the OVAC format," Becker said. "A large part of our regional and state routine is focused on stunting, which is not permitted at OVACs."

"Only having a little over a month to prepare for the OVAC competition while dealing with weather and a packed gym schedule is always a challenge, as well."

Despite the level of difficulty of prepa-

ration, the Knights won't back down from the challenge.

"We are extremely proud to enter this competition with the West Virginia Region One title and the West Virginia state runner-up finish under our belts. We are eager to defend our 2018 OVAC title."

The transformation of Central's routine is in large part because of the work of choreographer Joshua Wolfe and assistant coach Corey Pietranton, along with Becker.

"Our routine showcases the many strengths of our multi-talented team," Becker said. "It is a great combination of flashy and fast-paced choreography and advanced tumbling."

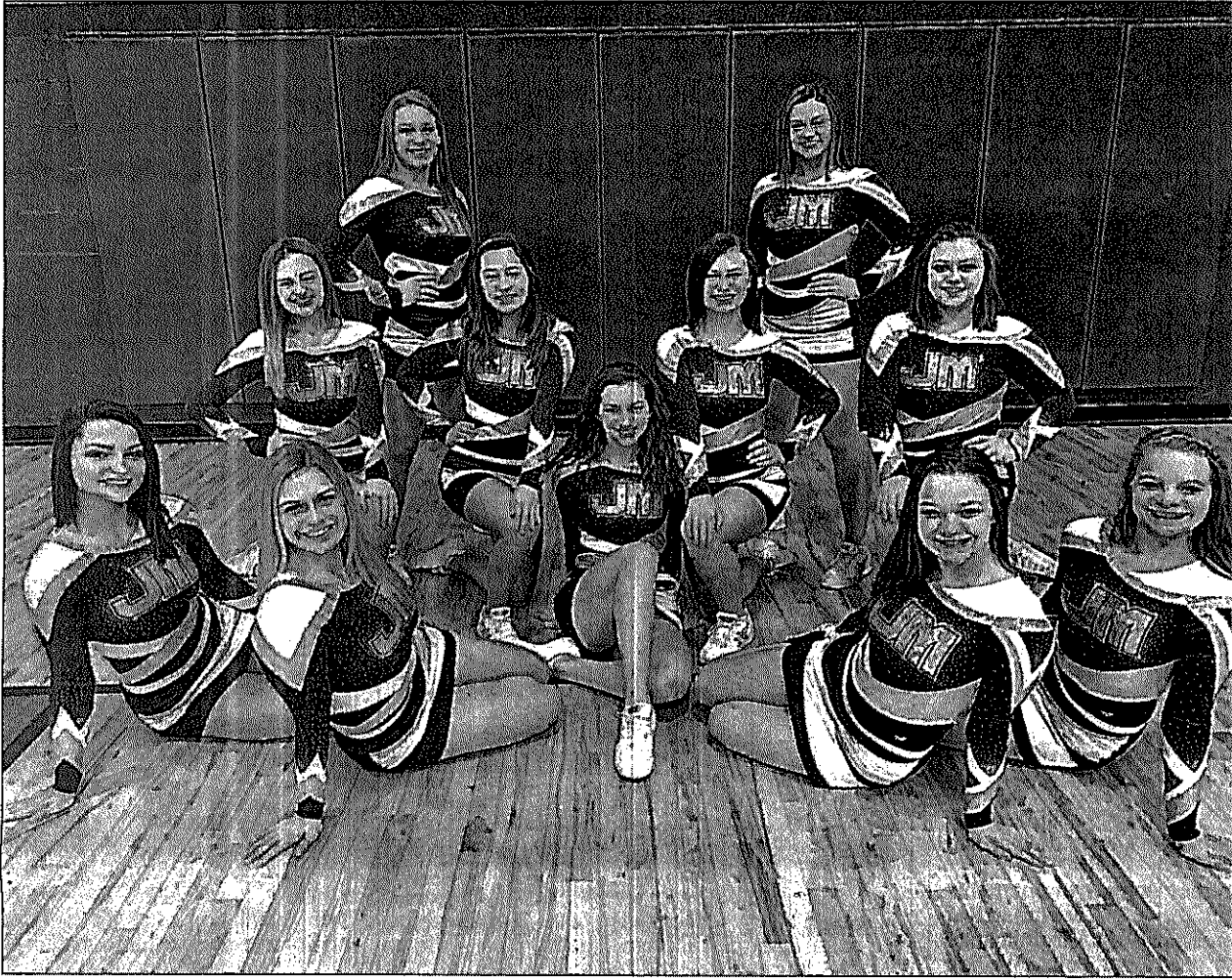
Taking the mat along with McDonald and Leonard are Emma Brown, BraeLynn Little, Courtney James and McKenzie Lewis.

"It's very high-energy and fun," Robbins said. "You can tell just watching the girls that they love this routine and that they're having fun doing it."

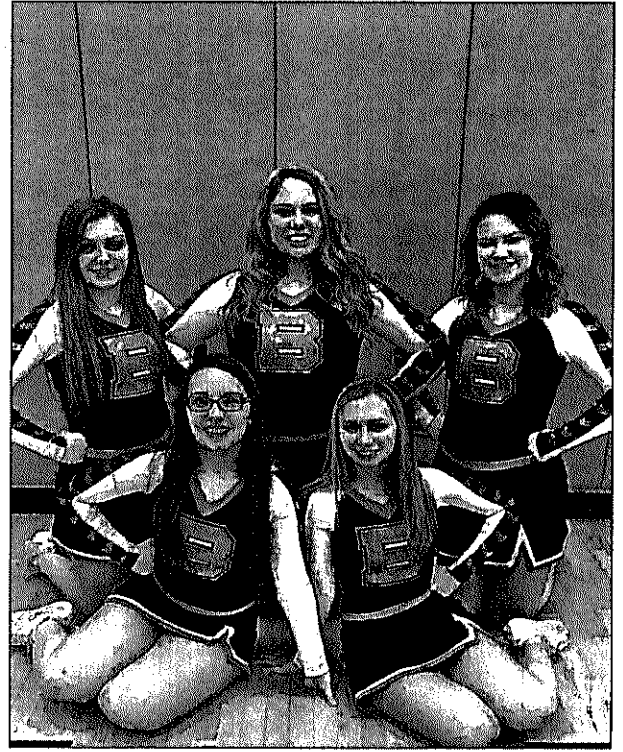
"It also has a lot of great tumbling."

Bridgeport has never won an OVAC title in cheering.

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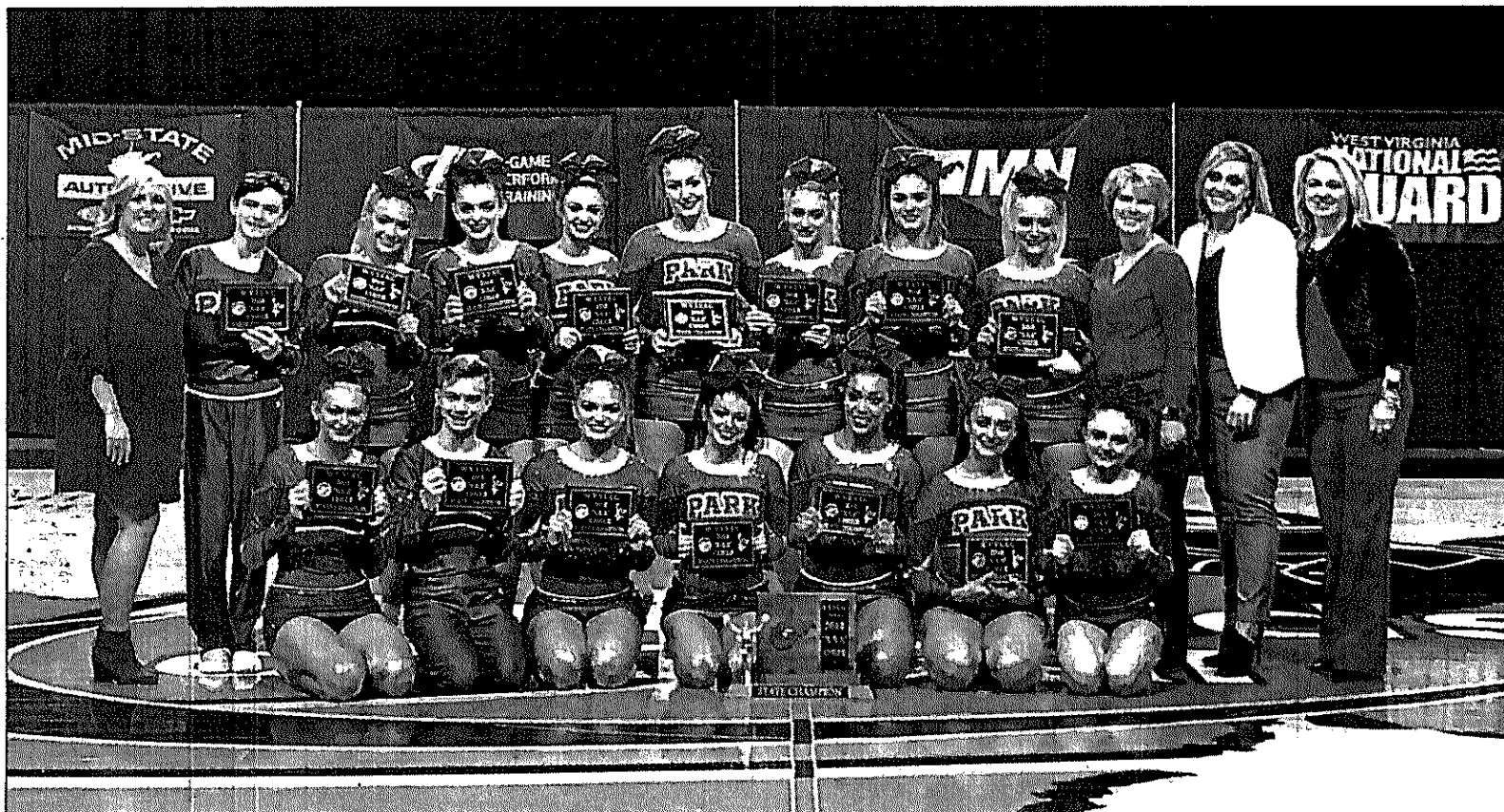
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Wheeling Park Patriots

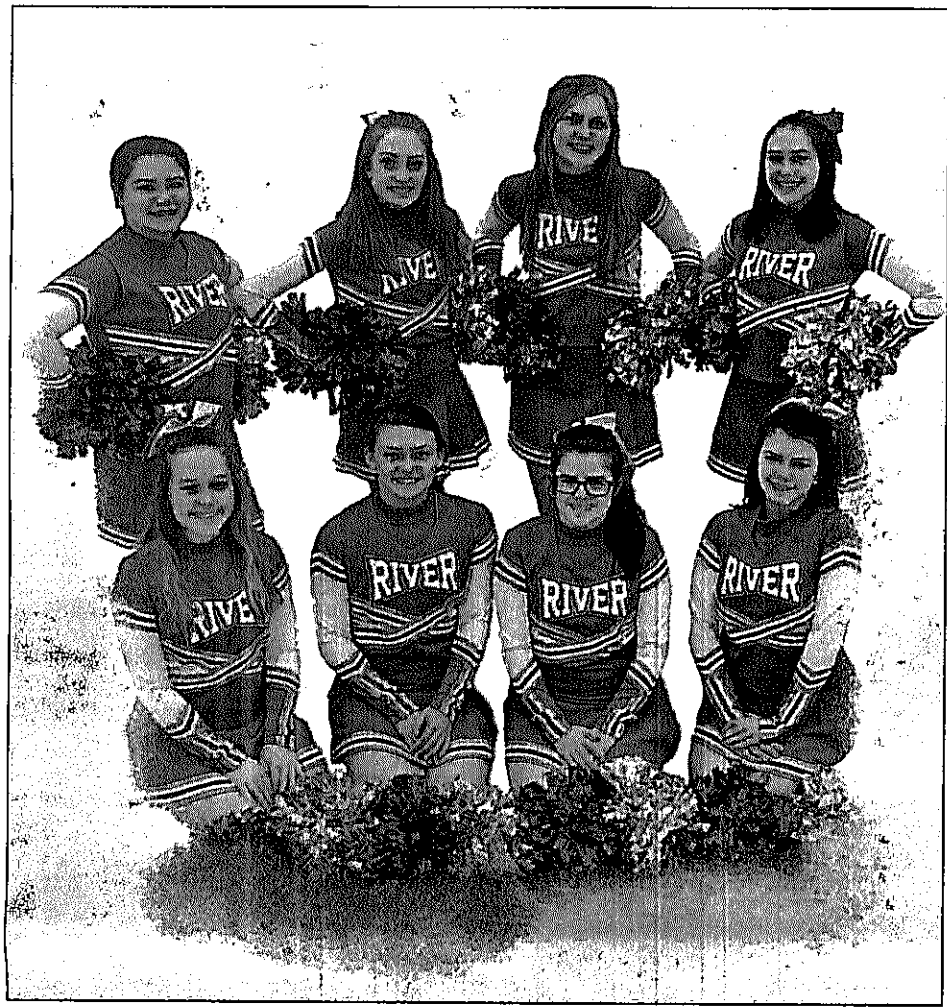

The fans in attendance for this year's competition should expect a high-octane show from the Pilots.

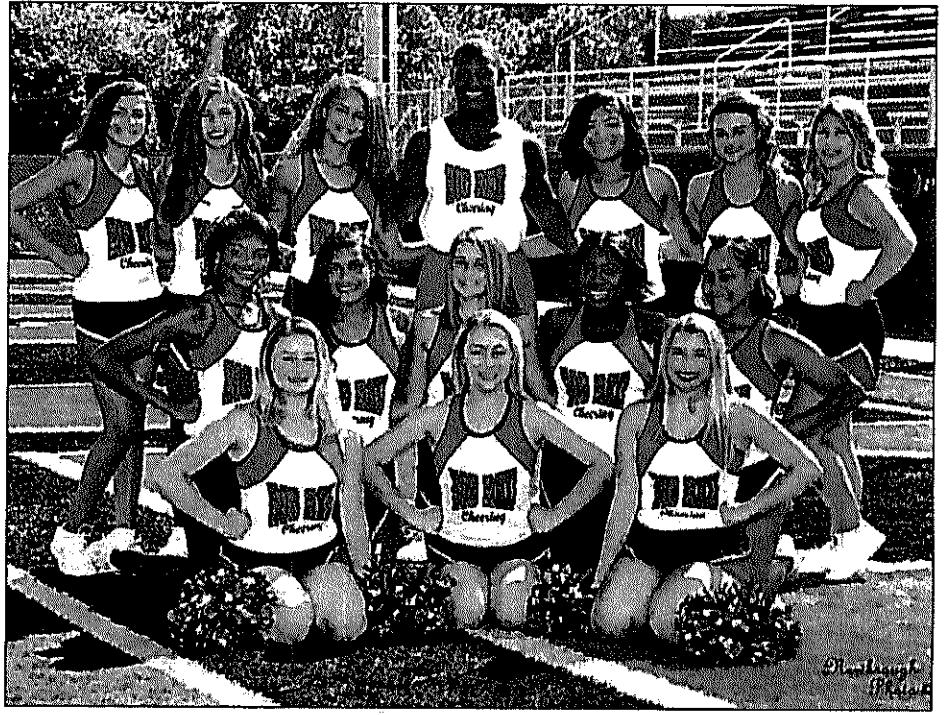
"Our routine this year is high-energy," Collins said. "The speed of the dance has been challenging but the girls have been up for it."

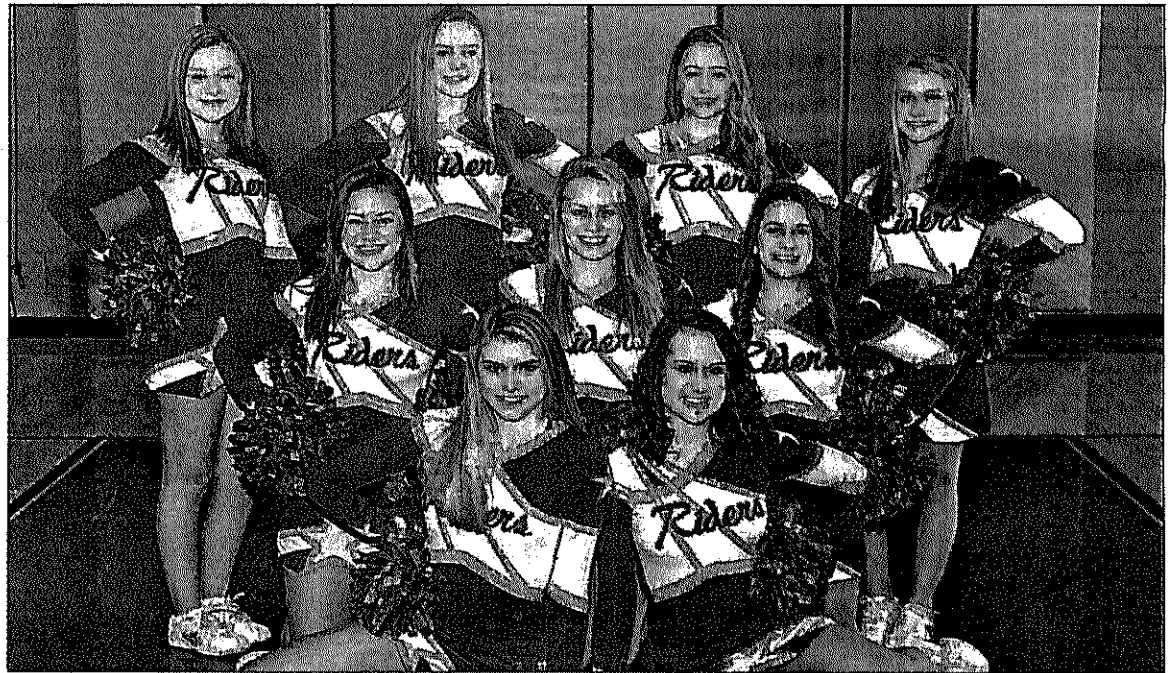

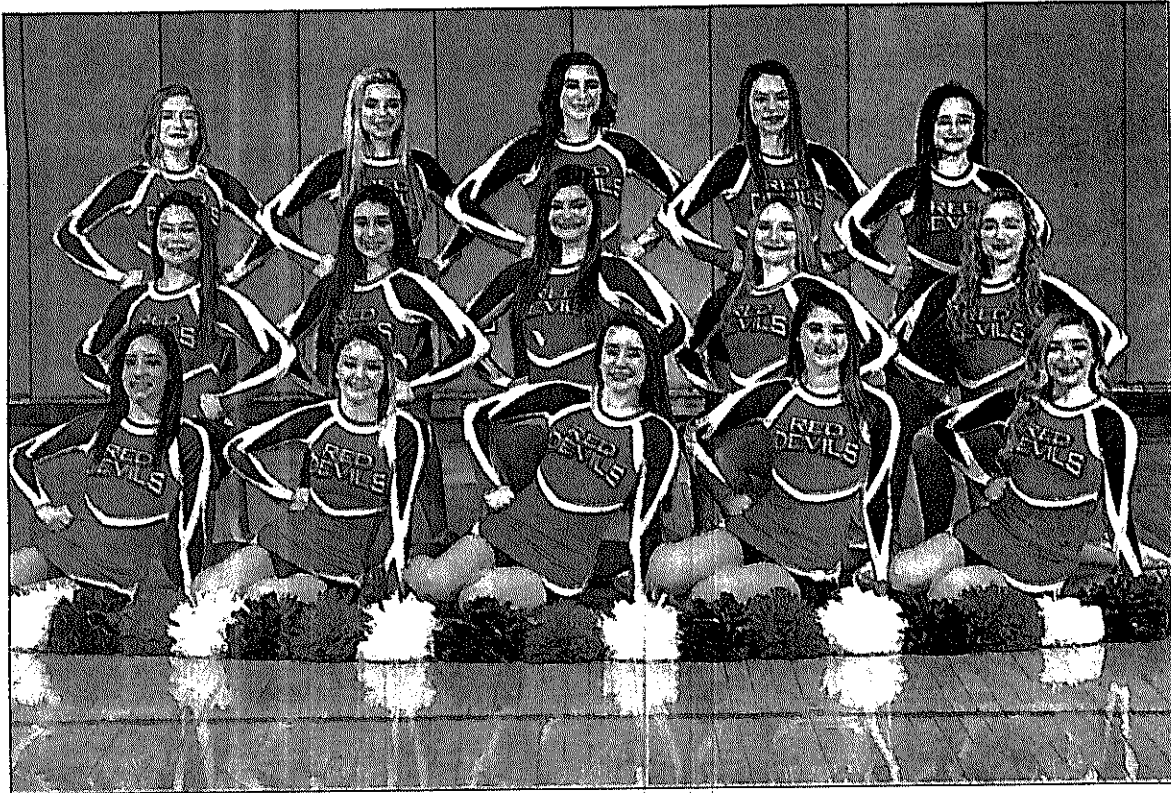

"Caitlyn Underwood started as a freshman and went to regionals but that was it. Now, she is a senior."

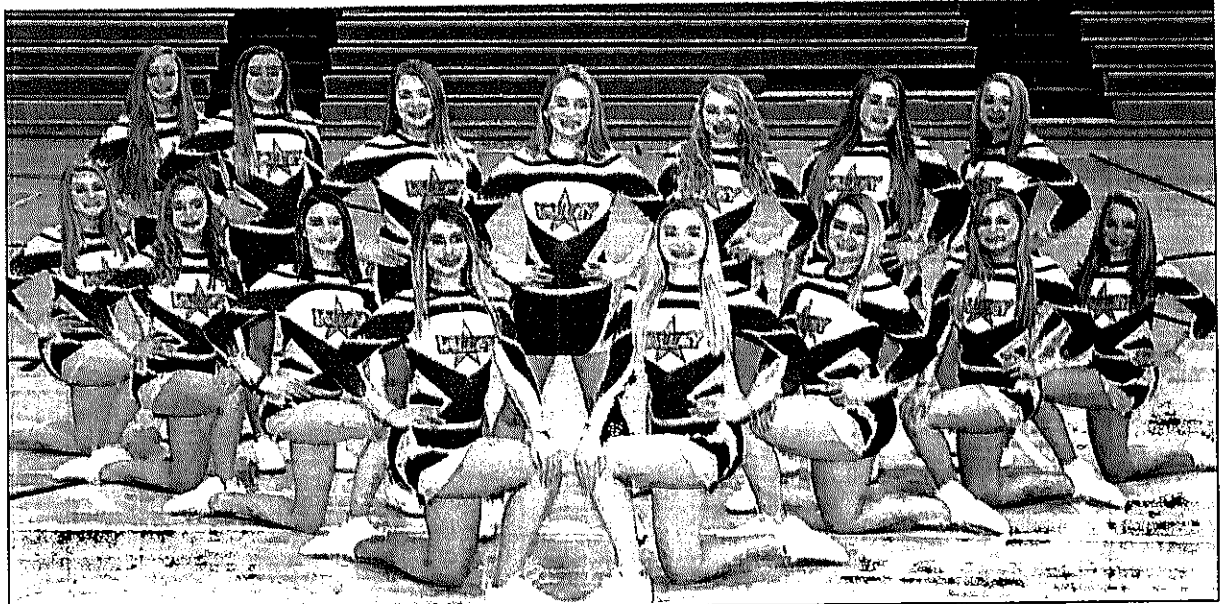
Joining Underwood on the mat are Miriam Kin-

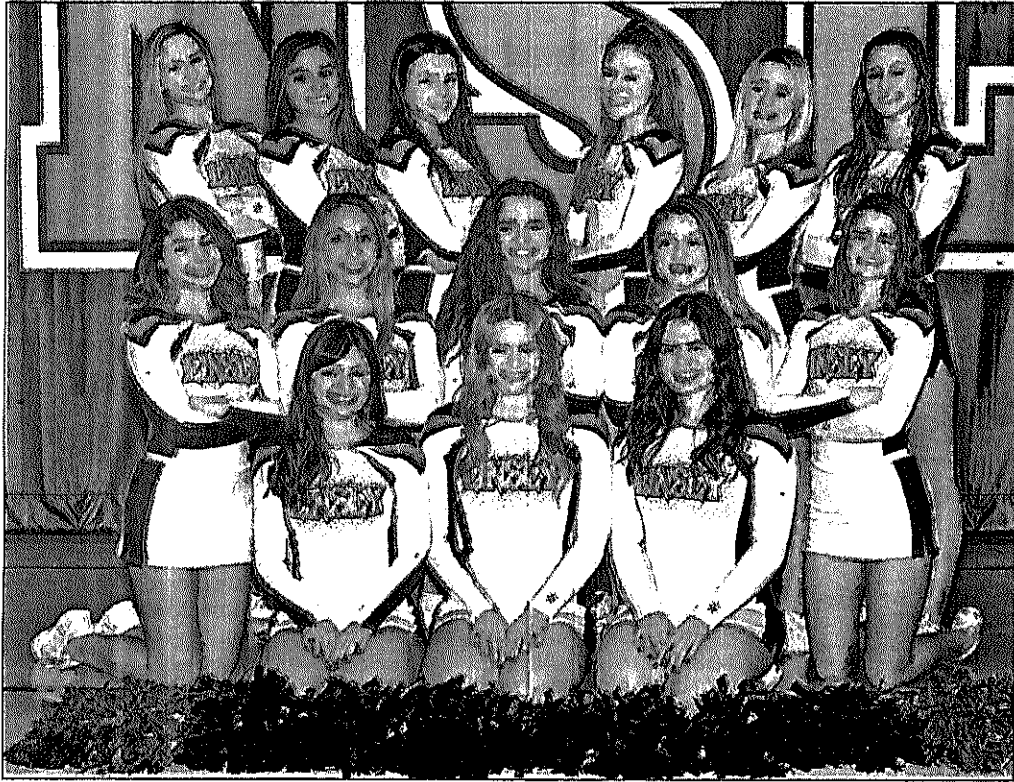
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Linsly Cadets

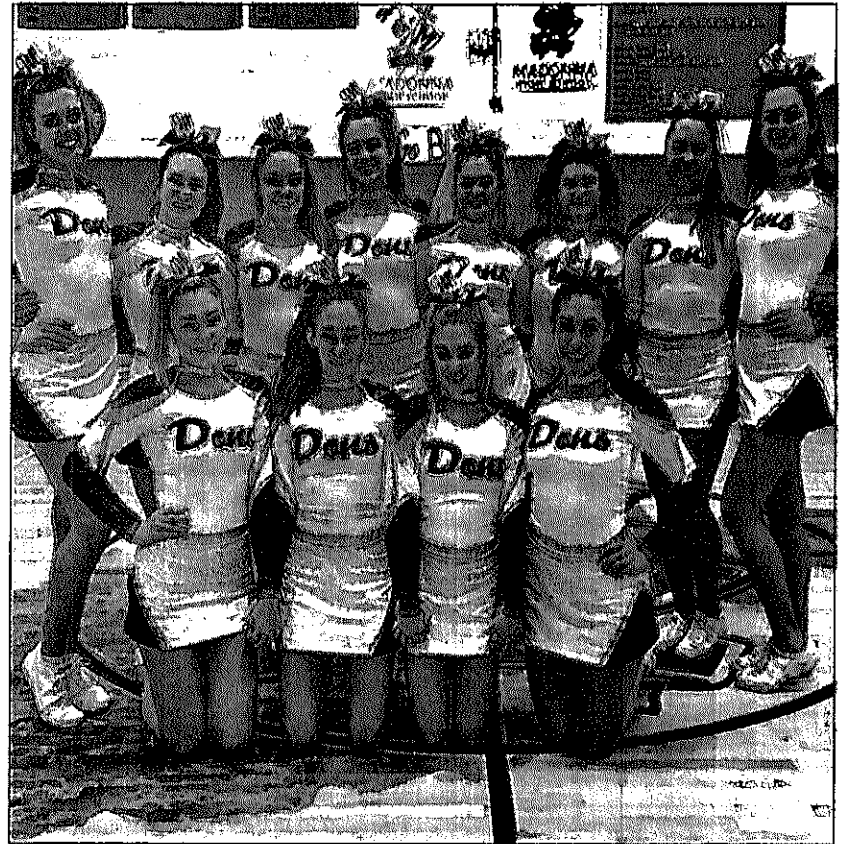
While it has been a season filled with positives, that certainly was not the case at the beginning of the season.

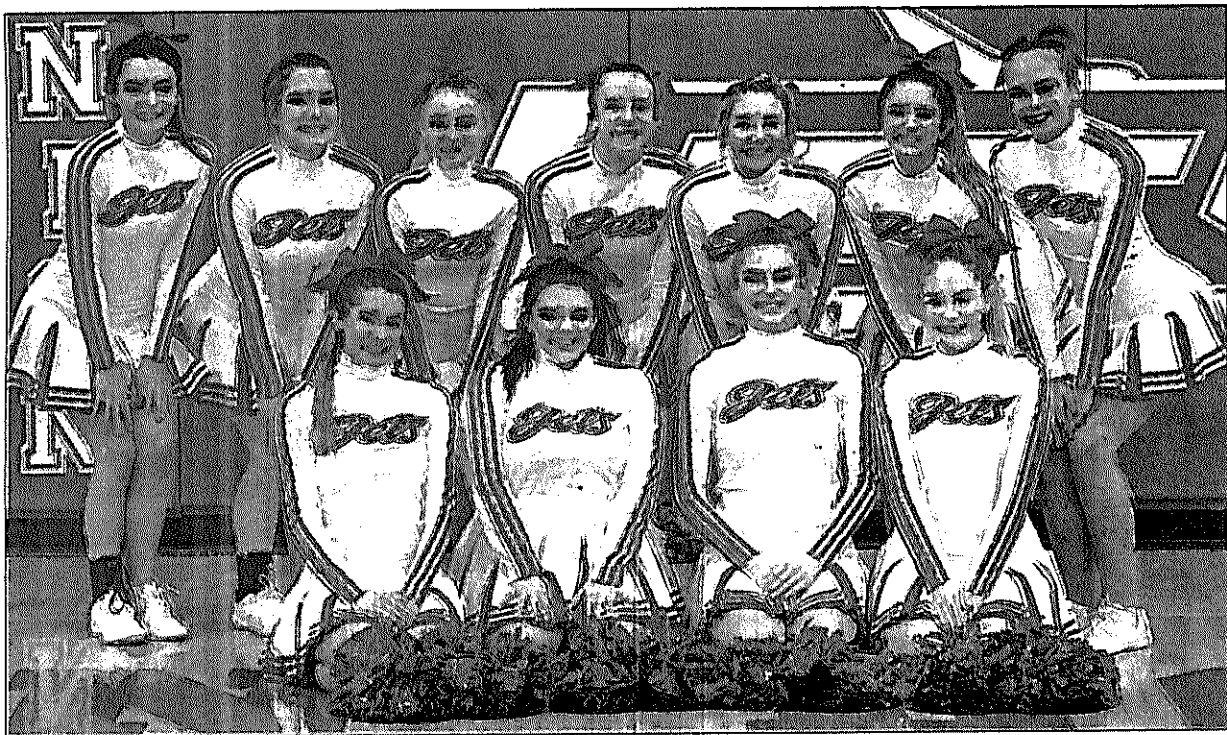


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**Union Local Jets

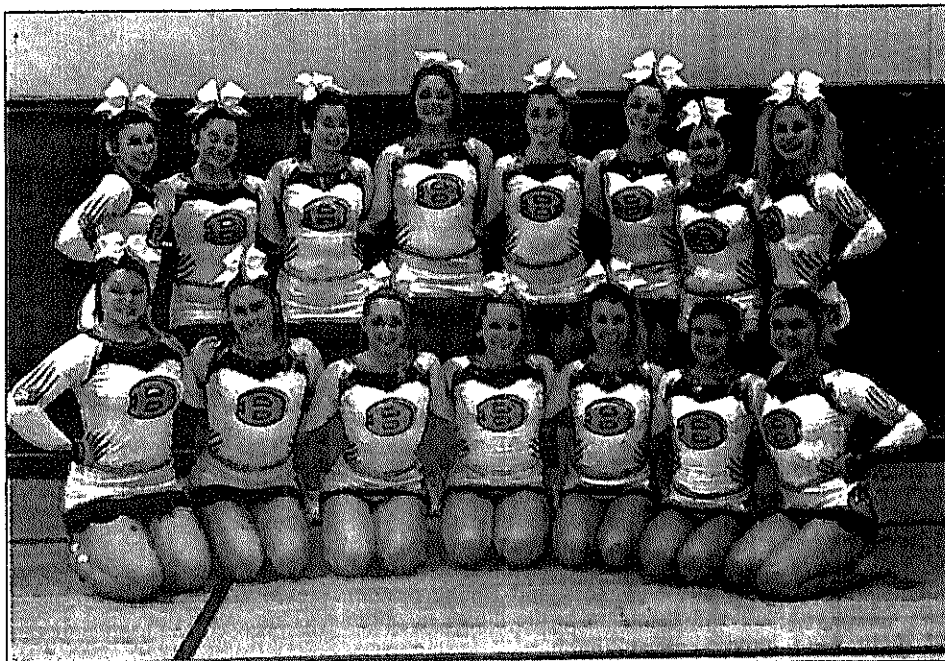
Helping Felton will be assistant coach Lindsay King and volunteer coach Julie Rogers, while Joey Takacs and Shane Sanders are the choreographers.

"It's been a great season so far and this is our first time participating in the OVAC's in a very long time so we are anxious to compete,"

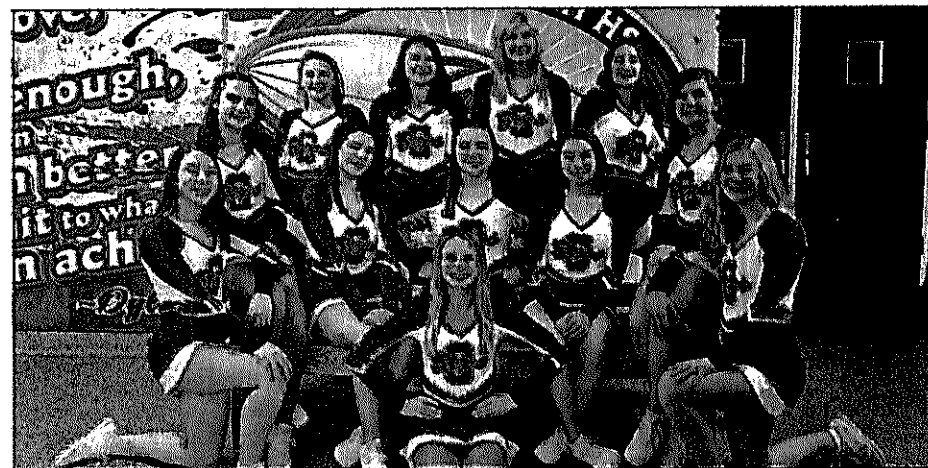
Vulgamore said.

"This will be only the second competition for us," Shenandoah coach April Giesey said. "We have been busy cheering from the side-

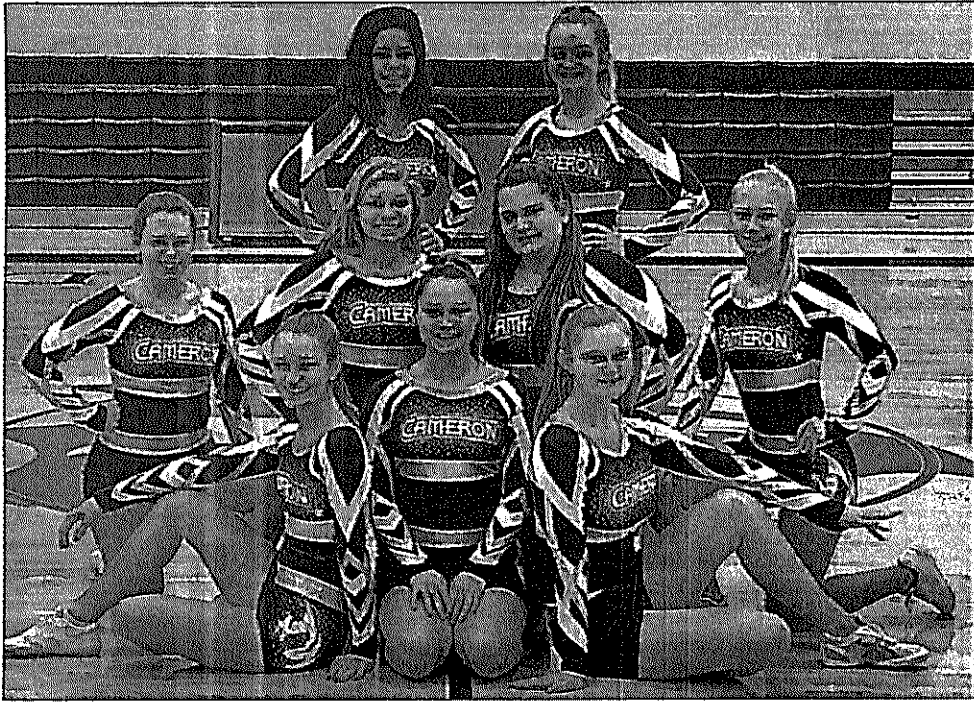
lines for our football team and basketball team, which is our first priority."

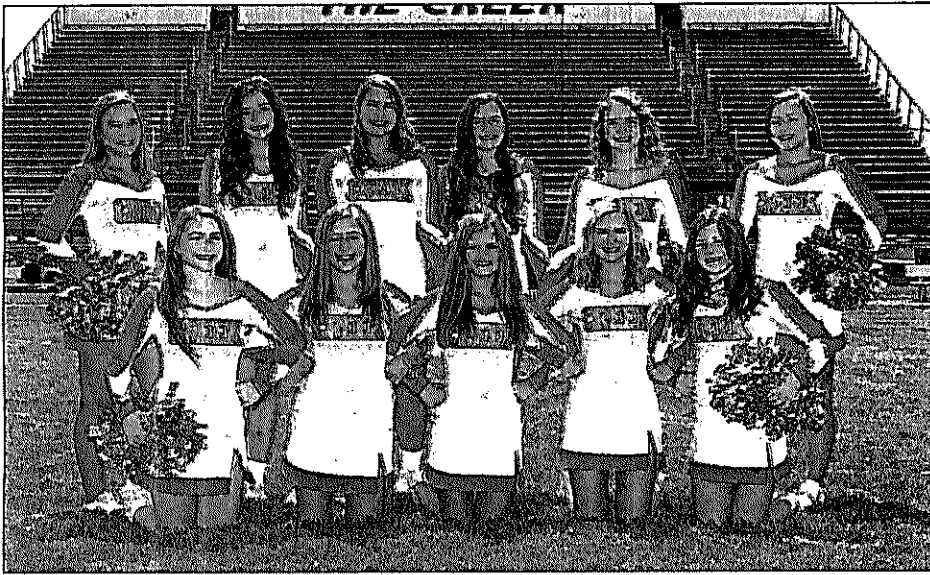

Skender, Tiffany Taylor, Ashley Kuczykowski, Madolyn McDonald and Jordan Hiles.

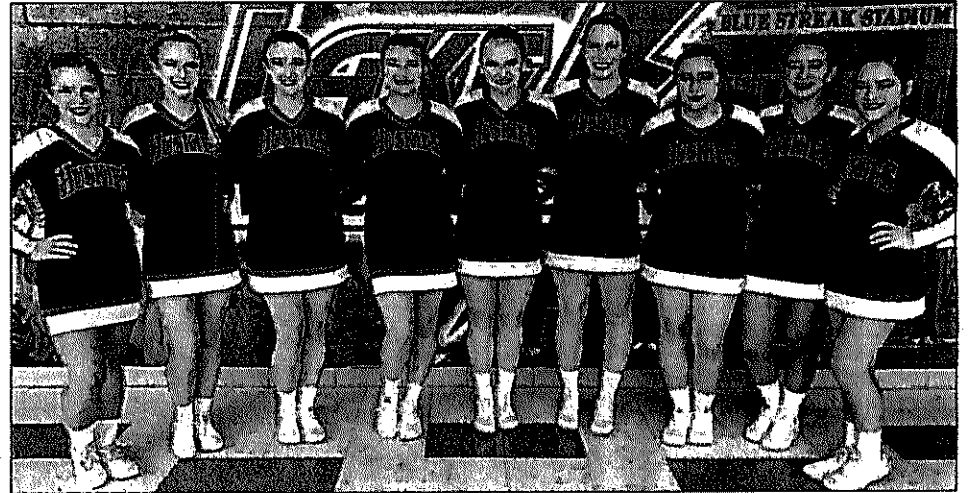
“This is an amazing group of student athletes, these girls work countless hours to improve and better themselves,” Giuliani said.

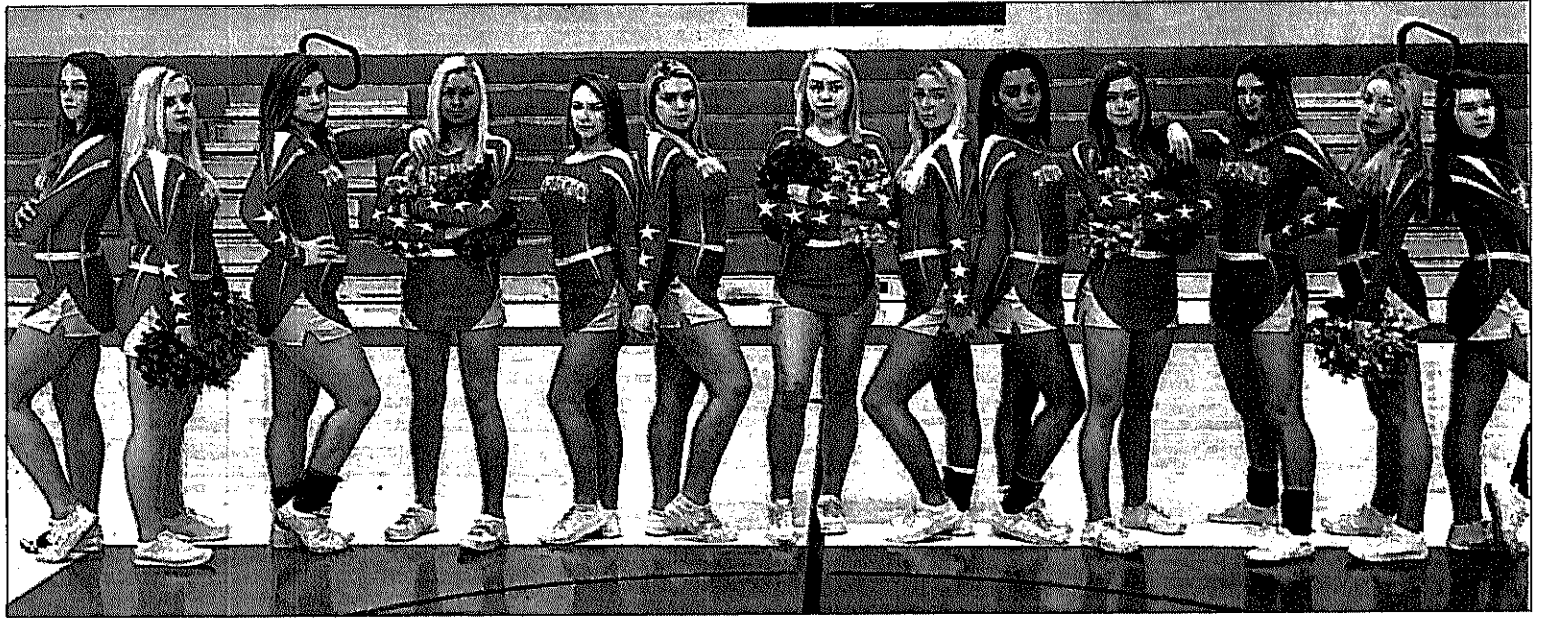

"This year we have a really tal-

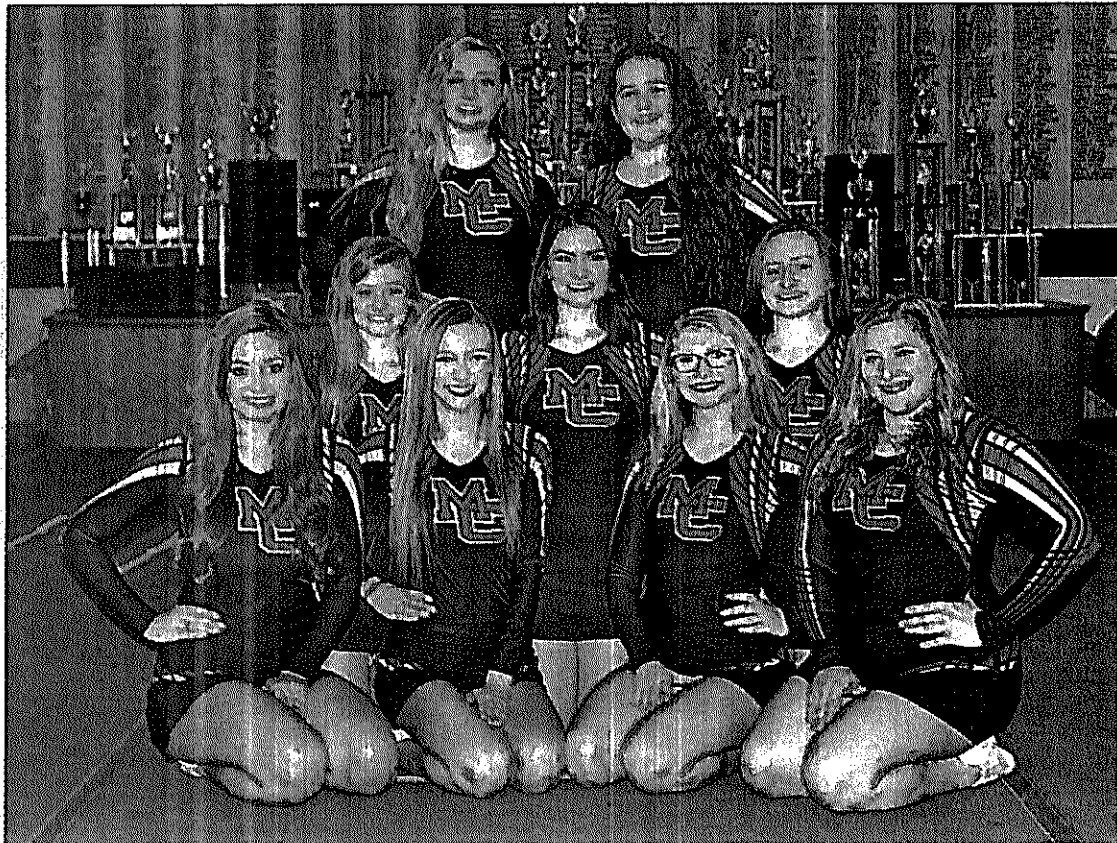
ented squad," Mousourakis said.

"Modern. We have some unique motions that the assistant coach came up with this year as well, and it's a little sassy," Lohr said about their routine they will

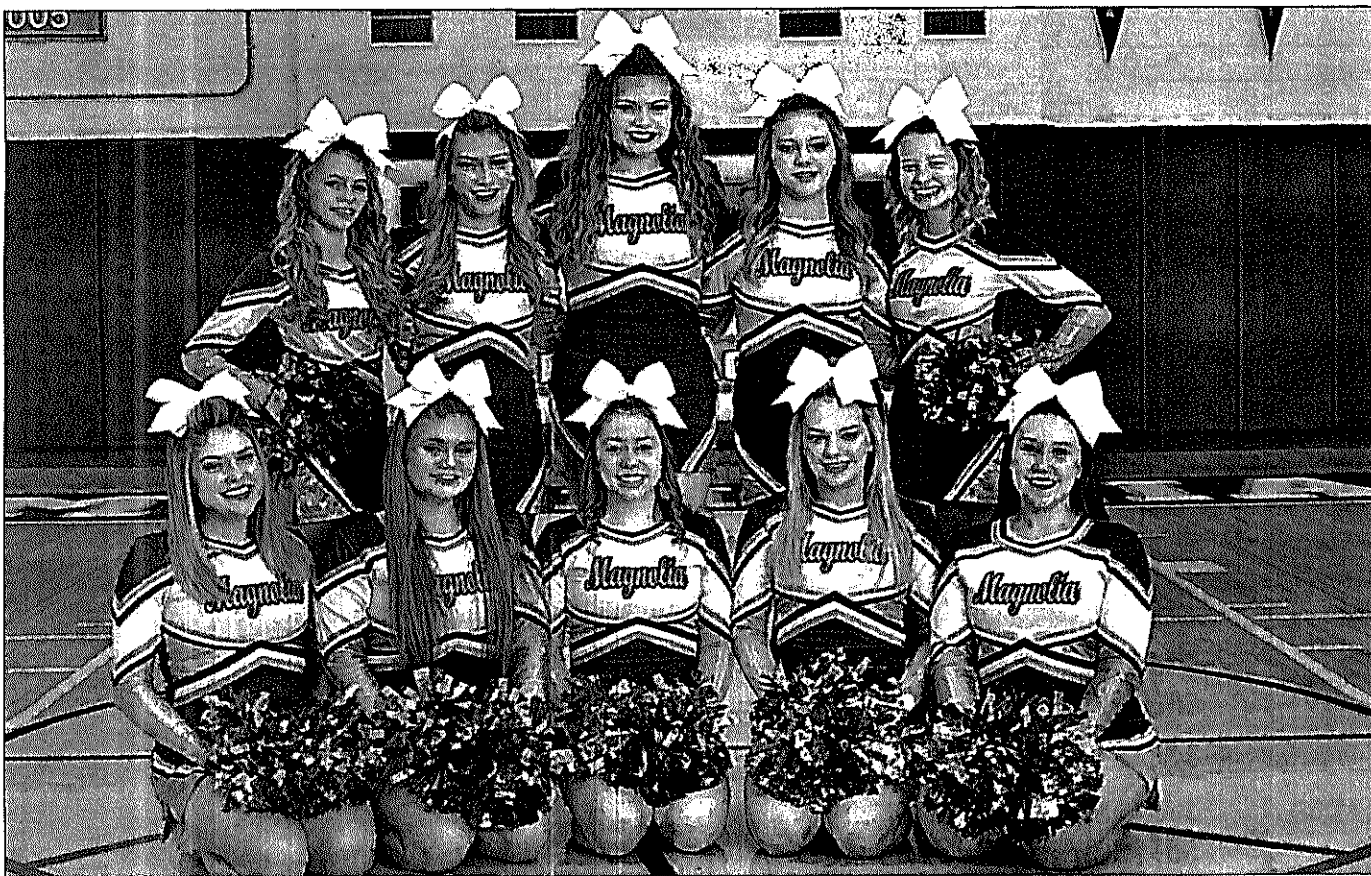
perform at WesBanco Arena.

returned in 2018.

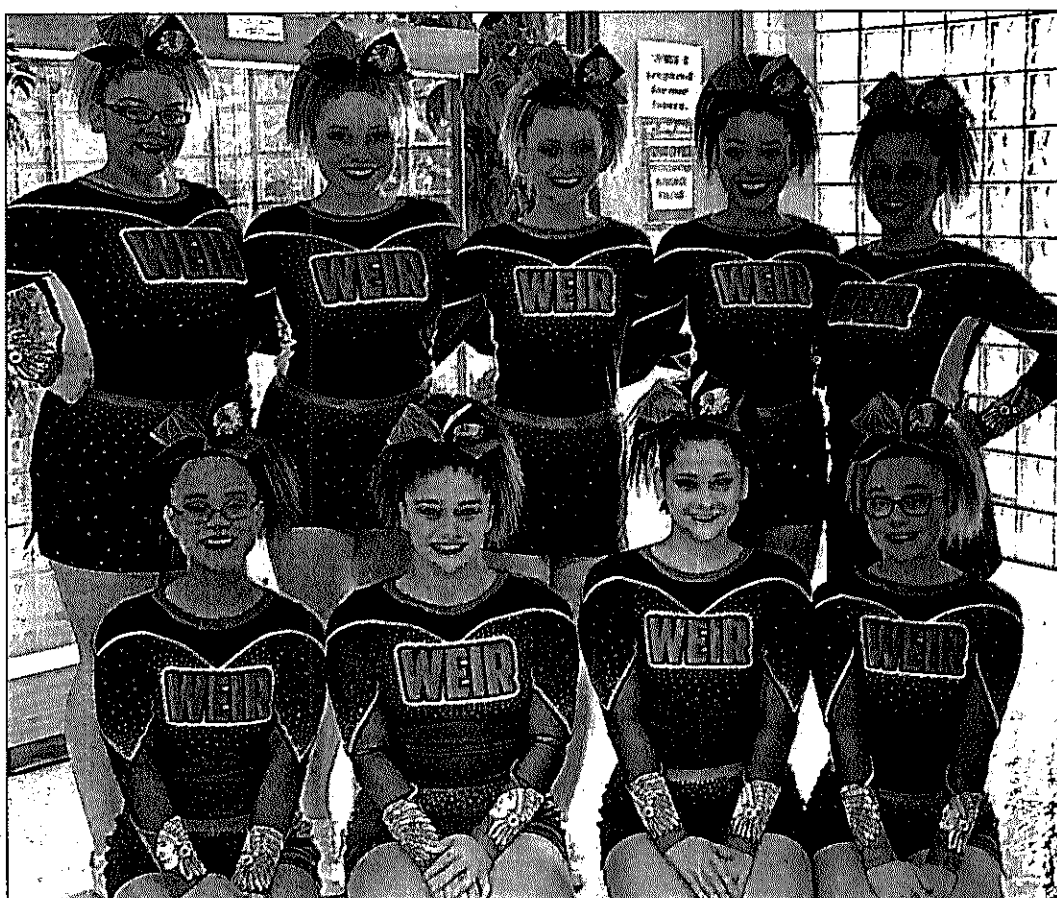
Walter-Alkire is assisted by Melissa McLain while Brian Faulkner is the choreographer.
