The Blue Dons' routine will be a little bit different this year according to Bo-


"It's action-packed with non-stop choreography & more "fierce" than previous years," Bologna said.

New jail facility to benefit Harrison

The new facility will not only save the county money from housing prisoners in adjacent counties, but could also provide the county with an additional source of income by outsourcing space to surrounding counties.

CADIZ - Harrison County officials are looking forward to a new facility that will benefit the entire county once completed.

The Harrison County Sheriff's Office will soon have a new facility to house its staff and the county's offenders. The SSG George J. Conaway U.S. Army Reserve Center, located on East Market Street in Cadiz, was given to the county at no cost. In June, the county officially accepted the property in hopes of converting it into a new jail and law enforcement center.

A feasibility study is underway that will determine the size, location, cost and potential funding sources for the new justice center. The architecture and engineering firm DLZ was hired to perform the study on the jail population. Sheriff Ronald "Joe" Myers said the study should be complete by March.

WOODSFIELD - Monroe County residents and officials are seeking funding and raising awareness as the county participates in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library for all eligible county children.

The first meeting on the plan occurred last week at the Monroe County District Library Children's Reading Room in Woodfield. Librarians, retired teachers and others had ex-

pressed an interest in taking part.
"It's been around for awhile," county Commissioner Mick Schumacher said of the program prior to the meeting. "Not only plan to raise funds, but also figure out a plan to identify all of those who are eligible for the program. They are hoping for an outpouring of local support and enthusiasm. We really need some local faces."

Schumacher added that the program meshes with Ohio first lady Fran DeWine's goal of spreading literacy.

He said there are more than 30 county children enrolled in the program. According to census records, there are about 800 eligible

children in Monroe County.
"It is for every child, birth to the age of 5," he said. "They get a free book sent to them each month. Income eligibility is not an issue. It's just to try to raise literacy. ... Statistics show that most of the brain of the child is formed, the biggest part of your capabilities are formed, when you reach the age of 5. It is to get these kids stimulated, to get a book in their hand and encourage people to read to them."




