

Bengals rout Bills in AFC

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. (AP) - Joe Burrow and the Cincinnati Bengals threw a big wrench into the highly anticipated travel plans of the Buffalo Bills, their fans and perhaps even the NFL offices.

Burrow threw two touchdown passes and Cincinnati's defense swarmed Josh Allen on a snowslicked field in a 27-10 win Sunday to send the Bengals to the AFC championship game for the second straight year.

And it'll be in Kansas City again

instead of in Atlanta, the neutral site where the game would've been played if Buffalo had beaten Cincinnati.

"Better send those refunds," Burrow said, referring to the 50,000 or so tickets already sold for a game that will never be played.

"See y'all in Atlanta," one Bengals player was heard yelling sarcastically while the team made its way to the locker room, where cornerback Eli Apple and a couple of teammates conducted interviews







Toronto's Karaffa gearing up for his first pro season in the Phillies system

Nate Karaffa is about to embark on a life that most only dream about.

The Toronto High School and Ohio State University graduate can hardly be-lieve it himself when he takes a step back and thinks that in less than a month he'll be taking part in his first professional

baseball spring training camp.
"This whole process has been unreal,"
Karaffa said. "I've really not had a lot of time to simply slow down and really think about it, but I consider myself extremely blessed to be in this position. Each opportunity you have to keep chasing your dream is a reason to be excited."

Karaffa was drafted in the 20th round of last July's MLB Draft by the Philadelphia Phillies after a strong career with the

"To be hand-picked and considered one of the very best in your sport is incredible to even think about," Karaffa said during a recent phone interview. "Now, though, it's a matter of putting in the work to make sure you're on top of it, so you don't get passed up.

Karaffa has been in Clearwater -- at the Phillies spring training home -- basically since early this month, continuing his rehab from an elbow injury that didn't re-

quire surgery. "I've just been building up getting ready for spring training," Karaffa said. "I was injured when I got drafted, but I am finally able to really start throwing and we will be ready in a couple of weeks when spring training starts.

The Phillies drafted Karaffa as a pitcher, which was surprising because Karaffa became a pitcher at Ohio State because the Buckeyes needed arms to eat innings.

"Going to Ohio State, I had no plan to pitch," Karaffa said. "It just happened and

Karaffa finished his Buckeyes career with only 28.1 innings worked. He posted a 3-1 career record with an earned run average north of six. But, he did fan 36 hitters.

Karaffa had met with some MLB clubs. in the fall of 2021 and continued conversations going into the summer, but opted not to play summer ball because of the injury. He was able to go through some workouts.

Still, though, he didn't know what was in store until that summer afternoon when he was actually driving back to Toronto from Columbus and saw an alert on his

"I hadn't even gotten a call from the Phillies or anyone when I saw it on my phone that I had been (drafted)," Karaffa recalled. "I honestly didn't know how to react."


With that part out of the way, Karaffa and his family still had some major decisions to make. Picked 602nd overall, Karaffa debated going back to Ohio State for an additional season. However, in the end, the opportunity to give pro ball a try was simply too much to pass up.

"Ît's not that I didn't think I was ready for pro ball, but I had some doubts on signing," Karaffa said. "I spent about a week at home (in Toronto) before the deal got done. I feel really good about the de-

Karaffa, who went to Ohio State following a brilliant prep career with the Red Knights that culminated with a state championship in 2019, thoroughly enjoyed his time with the Buckeyes.

"I've got so many memories and I'm so thankful for the opportunity to have played at Ohio State," Karaffa said, "I was able to build so many relationships and I still talk to those guys all the time. It was simply a dream come true to play there. What a fun thing.'

Ultimately, Karaffa -- like every player who heard his name called in the draft -- wants to make it to the big leagues. However, obviously, Karaffa isn't putting a timetable on it. Actually, he's not even really speculating where he may play this





Thompson cards 3 more eagles, has 2-shot AmEx lead

LA QUINTA, Calif. (AP) - Rookie Davis Thompson made three more eagles Friday for a total of five through 36 holes to tie the PGA Tour record for the most in a 72-hole tournament since 1983, and he still didn't put any more distance between himself and Jon Rahm at The American Express.

Thompson also carded his first bogeys of the tournament, which were hardly enough to slow him down. One day after making consecutive eagles in shooting 10-under 62 at La Quinta to take the first-round lead, Thompson carded an 8-under 64 on the Nicklaus Tournament Course at PGA West. He had three eagles, four birdies and two bogeys.

The 23-year-old who played college golf at Georgia was at 18-under 126, two strokes ahead of Rahm, who also shot 64 on the Nicklaus course.

"I just had some good numbers into par-5s and was able to execute my shots," Thompson said. "I had some putts drop. So it was nice to make some eagles.' Actually, it's his entire game that's going well in







WHEELING - There's a logjam atop the team standings after one round of the 69th annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament inside WesBanco Arena.





OVAC Swimming Championships Starting Tonight At Brooke High

Gold medals - OVAC style - will be handed out tonight at Brooke High School.

The first conference champions of the winter sports season will be crowned when the Class 1A through 4A swimmers hit the water at the Brooke Aquatic Center to take part in the OVAC Bill Brubaker Swimming Championship.

This marks the first time in the history of the event that it's a twoday event. The 5A schools will compete on Saturday, crowning separate champions in all 22 events. As for the team awards, there will be three classes for both boys and girls handed out this year. Obviously, 5A has its own. Brubaker did point out this format change "is a trial to see how it goes."

"There are pros and cons," Bru-baker said. "More athletes will get to compete, each meet will run half the time that last year's single meet did. we'll have a good meet and then sit back and evaluate it."








"Dakota is a very hard and physical worker in the wrestling room," Coach Stephen said. "He is focused and wrestling better every week to be the best.'

"We are way off from competing for any team titles this year. But this group works hard in the practice room and it is starting to show a bit on



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



"I wouldn't say we've been up and down, but we've competed well in waves," Nestor admitted. "There's times we looked good, like when we beat Harrison, and went down to Logan and finished third as a team.

"We were first heading into the finals and kind of fell apart a bit."

"The Park Duals were a bit of an eye opener."

Facing a number of much larger schools, Buckeye fell in dual action to teams like Wheeling Park, University, and Hurricane while beating Preston, and Buckhannon Upshur.

"University, by far to me, is the most technically sound team and they will do some work on people in this tournament," Nestor said. "They looked really good."

"Truthfully, we are still in transition, but these next two years, we're on the climb up."

The Panthers' roster is some 15 wrestlers strong.

But of that total, there's only one senior – Logan Dentz – along with three juniors. The remainder is comprised of sophomores and freshmen that, while talented, still need some seasoning and forging in the fires of major tourneys like the OVAC.

That being said, Nestor still has some expectations for his youthful squad.

"Our goal is to have some placers, and get a taste of wrestling on Saturday," Nestor said. "We have a few guys I expect to place, or to get close to it. They've all wrestled well this year."

"We want to get a win on Thursday, Friday, and Friday night, and then head into Saturday and figure out how high we can finish."

Buckeye isn't entering a wrestler at 106, but Aiden Dentz (15-7) will compete at 113. Freshman Tristan Palmer, younger brother of graduated state champion Bub Palmer, takes his 16-8 record to the 120 class.

Sophomore Seth Driscoll (11-12) slides in at 126, while Logan Dentz, the team's elder statesman, enters the 132 class with his 16-9 record.

Landon Durbin (4-9) will compete at 138, and Nestor is still trying to determine if Gavin Edgell (6-14) or Dallas Sproull (11-13) will rep the Panthers at 145.

Denvar Nelson (14-10) comes in at 152, while Chase McFadden (15-8) got down to 160 to compete at a lower weight class.

Rounding out the final three wrestlers at Merrick Hickman at 195, either Ayden Luyster or Bryce Horvath at 215, and heavyweight Brendon Stillion (14-8), who Nestor believes could have a solid run once he starts putting it all together.


The surprise comes in the form of 18-4 freshman Andrew Cox, who's already making a name for himself at 132 pounds. Cox finished





Five young wrestlers – two sophomores and three freshmen – will take to the mats at WesBanco Arena for the Seminoles.



McFarland has fashioned a superb 21-4 mark this season. He is ranked ninth by OVAeC and 23rd in the Buckeye State.




River's strength lies in the heavier weights

Cincinnati beat Baltimore 24-17 on Sunday night, winning a playoff game in consecutive years for the first time in franchise history.

The Bengals likely lost a third starting offensive lineman in the space of a month when left tackle Jonah Williams departed in the second quarter with a left knee injury.

The Ravens sacked Joe Burrow four times on Sunday, the most since he was sacked five times by the Browns on Halloween in the most recent game Cincinnati lost before its current

"We'll see who's available and do our best to rep them and get them going." Bengals coach Zac Taylor said.






