

The OVAC rules

· Holt, Reisz, Skoff post victories in 13th annual Clash of Champions

EAST LIVERPOOL - The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference is one of the most respected prep sports leagues in the nation.

And one of the sports where the OVAC shines the brightest is in wrestling, thanks in large part to the giant Ron Mauck OVAC Tournament that's held during the third weekend in January each year.

The OVAC once again demonstrated just how strong it is in wrestling here Tuesday evening when the bi-state league took on the heralded Midwestern Athletic Conference from Pennsylvania in the 13th annual Clash of the Champions held inside the Potters'

gymnasium.

Despite dropping two of three early matches, Team OVAC relied on its strength in the middle and upper weights to post a 41-12 victory over the MAC in front of a large

"It's definitely nice to be on the winning side," said Ohio and Caldwell head coach Dustin Robison. "These kids have put a lot of time (to wrestling) and it's nice that they can go out and represent the OVAC, their school

and themselves so well tonight."
The OVAC's victory gives it a 9-4 upperhand in the series, which began in 1988, but ceased for nine years during the middle and late 90s.





"Our middle and upper weights were pretty solid," Robison said. "Everyone battled and no one gave up bonus points. Even though we lost four matches, those kids battled and didn't give up bonus points, so that was big, 'too.'

The MAC had won three of the first four matches before East Liverpool's Cagney Springer recorded a pinfall.

That was just the beginning for the

Martins Ferry's Derrick Holt - who saw his senior season of grappling cut short this winter due to a late-season football injury – continued the momentum started by his teammate from the Potters.

Holt who narrowly missed out on qualifying for the state got some redemption in his final prep match as the OVAC's 130pound entrant.

He made the most of his opportunity inside the Potter gymnasium when he blanked Montour's Rocco Ragano by a 9-0 count for a major decision.

"I am really happy with how I performed tonight," Holt said.

"I didn't know very much about my opponent, but I knew it was an all-star meet and he had to be pretty good. I knew I had to wrestle on my feet because we had heard (Pennsylvania) was really good on the mat.

Another area grappler - Beallsville's Jimmy Reisz – whose quest for an Ohio State championship was denied in the district - got a chance to make a little bit of redemption.

Reisz represented the OVAC at 140 pounds and met Ryan Taylor of Moon in

Reisz - the Ohio Valley's all-time winningest wrestler with 178 victories scored an early take down and squeezed out a reversal in the second period to post a 4-2 victory.

"I didn't finish the season as well as 1 would have liked to obviously," Reisz

"Coach Abbott kept on me about ending my season with a victory, so I was happy to get this win tonight.'

Bridgeport's Bryan Skoff - who finished seventh in the state of Ohio two weeks ago - added another check mark to his lengthy list of wrestling accomplish-

He fell behind West Allegheny's Mark Vuono by a 1-0 score after an escape, but managed to get a takedown and a reversal to post a 4-1 victory.

'It was a great feeling to be able to go out with a win," Skoff said. "For me the main objective was for this team to win the dual, but to get a win for myself feels great too. It's a great feeling to make this team and know you are one of the best in





Another highlight of the event is it gives each wrestler one last high school match.

"It would be great to have them all end their career with a win," Robinson admitted. "Some of them may not have done that in their last match and this gives them a chance to go out on a winning note."

Hailing from Belmont County in Tuesday's all-star event will be Martins Ferry's Derek Holt (130) and Bridgeport's Bryan Skoff (160).

Holt managed to earn an invitation into the all-star event with a third place finish in the OVAC tournament. The Purple Rider's senior finished his senior campaign losing in the Heath district tournament as he checked out in the consolation quarter-finals round with a final season record of 23-6.

Skoff brings in a handful of accolades into his final prep match after earning a seventh place finish in the Ohio state tournament. The OVAC champion finished his final prep season with a 51-4 ledger and a career record of 156-35, which ties the school record with assistant coach Brian Roskovich.

Joining Holt and Skoff from Jefferson and Monroe County in competition will be Buckeye Local's Mike Kendjorski (119) and Beallsville's Jimmy Reisz (140).

Kendjorski and Reisz are both hungry to end on a winning note as the two checked out early on the trail to the Schottenstein Center in Columbus this past month.

Kendjorski, who finished the season 36-7, finished third in the OVAC and checked out of his respected Ohio Division II district tournament in the consolation semi-final bout.

Reisz, who passed Wheeling Park's Abby Rush in all-time wins for an OVAC wrestler this year, managed to earn an OVAC title, but his success didn't go much farther. The Blue Devils' standout finished third in his Ohio Division III sectional and checked out in the consolation semi-finals by a score of 5-2.

A brother combination that will help anchor the OVAC squad will be Andy (135) and Nick Stine (145) of Edison

Both OVAC champions, Andy's campaign trail ended on a higher note as he was a district champion and made it on to Columbus. Unable to find the podium, the Wildcats' senior ended with one of the

most successful careers in Edison wrestling history.

Nick's season ended came in the Steubenville district as picked up a sixth place finish which didn't make the cut to head towards the state tournament. Nick's

ended his senior campaign with a 40-8 ledger.

Bringing in the largest OVAC delega-

tion from one school is coach Tom Moore as three Cambridge Bobcats have been preparing for one last six-minute match. Paul Rose (125), Chad Teague (171)

and Kirk Wetherell (215) were all Division II state qualifiers for Moore's high-powered Bobcats.

"I have been with these guys since grade school. They are tremendous athletes, but they are also good kids. They do whatever is asked of them," Moore said.

Rose finished his senior year with an

Rose finished his senior year with an eighth place state finish that moved his record to 37-7. He also was an OVAC champion.

Teague - an OVAC champion - went the distance in the Ohio state tournament after losing his opening round match. The senior Bobcat wrestled all the back through the consolation rounds to pick up sixth place finish and round out his senior year with a 42-9 record.

"He lost to the state champion in the first round," Moore indicated. "You have to win two matched to place and he came back and won three and got into the fifth-sixth place mat. When you lose at the state tournament it's hard to rebound, but he got his head on straight and got it done."

Wetherell - the third OVAC champion for the Bobcats - was no pushover this season. The high-octane Wetherell fed off the success of his teammates as he captured a district title and a chance to compete in the state tournament. After sneaking by in the first round of the state Wetherell checked out losing the next two.

Other Ohio wrestlers making the squad include Meadowbrook's Ed Lehotay (103), East Liverpool's Cagney Springer (125) and Caldwell's Derrick Hesson

(215)

Lehotay battled a tough group of underclassmen this season to earn a fourth place OVAC finish. The Mustangs' featherweight snuck into the state tournament after finishing third in district competition, but wasn't as fortunate in the state tournament. Lehotay checked out after three matches to end the season on a 42-9 record.

Springer - an OVAC runner-up - was the glue that held the Potters' mat program together with his work ethic and leading by example, according to East Liverpool coach Todd Smith. The Potters' senior turned in the singlet following a sixth place finish at the Steubenville district with a 43-5 record.

Hesson - an OVAC runnerup - hit stride at the right time this season. The Redskins' grappler chose to bump up a weight late in the season and it proved to be a positive decision as Hesson ran the table in the state tournament for a silver finish. Along the way Hesson captured a sectional and district crown to finish the season 45-3.

From the Mountain state in Tuesday's all-star dual meet will be Brooke's Brent Fluharty (112) and Drake Kowcheck (285) along with Oak Glen's Cody Miller (152).

Fluharty - the only non-OVAC place winner in the group - is looking for redemption this week. The Bruins' senior qualified himself into the West Virginia Class AAA tournament, but only managed to stay for three matches before checking out.

Kowcheck - a fourth place OVAC finisher - hit stiff competition from southern West Virginia in his Class AAA bracket. Kowcheck managed to bounce back from an early loss to finish sixth in the Mountain state tournament.

Miller - an OVAC runnerup - was a key grappler as the Golden Bears repeated as Class A/AA state champions this year. Miller finished his senior campaign with a 41-1 record an individual state champion.

Tuesday's event is the brainchild of then-East Liverpool wrestling coach, Nick Trombetta, and his high school coach and mentor, Ed Driscoll, at Quigley Catholic in Baden, Pa., and was first held in 1988. Coach Driscoll continues in his capacity as meet director to this day.



EAST LIVERPOOL -Everyone wants to go out a winner.

Several local wrestlers got one last chance to step onto the mat in search of a final victory Tuesday in the 13th annual Tri-State Clash of Champions at Potter Fieldhouse.

The postseason wrestling meet features top seniors from Pennsylvania's Midwestern Athletic Conference (MAC) and the OVAC.

Everyone from the OVAC squad can consider themselves winners as they cruised to a 41-12 victory over the MAC.


"I told them that for a lot of kids this will be their last match," OVAC coach Dustin Robinson said. "You remember your last match for the rest of your life."

The magnitude of the event was not lost on the competitors. They all seemed fully aware that this would be their final opportunity to have their hand raised as the victor.





Springer, who finished his career with 107 wins, kept with his winning ways earning a win by fall in 2:26.

In the 135-pound bout, Edison's Andy Stine squared off against West Allegheny's Zach Kelly, who secured his four-time MAC champion.

Stine, who won an OVAC title this year and was a state qualifier, won a dramatic 5-3 overtime decision, earning him OVAC MVP honors.


"This was big," Stine said. "I'm very thankful to get the opportunity to get one more shot. It feels good to end with a

In the evening's next match, Oak Glen's Cody Miller was against pitted West Allegheny's Mitch Cleric at 152 pounds.







n't as lucky.



most wins in school history at 147, said. "What's most important is when you go out on the mat, you go full tilt. If you do that, you always walk off a champion."


In a 171 pound match, South Side's Justin Herder lost a 10-1 major decision to Cambridge's Chad Teague.
