

# Riders Own WesBanco

## Ferry finishes **OVAC** sweep

WHEELING – Martins Ferry coach Scott Roth came into Wednesday night's inaugural OVAC Dual Meet Championship with a good idea that his Purple Riders could get the job done in Class 3A.

His idea turned into reality in less than two hours as the Purple Riders climbed back to the top of the OVAC wrestling mountain, winning the school's seventh dual-meet crown, but first since 2002 when they captured two victories at WesBanco Arena.

The Riders used their depth to cruise past Monroe Central, 52-12, in the semifinals and then handed Barnesville, which dispatched Shenandoah in the semis, a 51-18 setback.

'If you look at 3A, it's pretty rough all the way around," Roth, a former state and OVAC champion himself at Ferry, said. "We have a pretty full lineup all the way around. so it gives us an advantage right off the bat. It was a

good day, but there was nothing too exciting." Roth's Riders were the

beneficiaries of three forfeits against the Seminoles and then five more against the Shamrocks.


Regardless of how they got to the crown, the Riders proudly accepted their championship trophy without a second thought. Ferry's victory completes the conference sweep as it captured the tournament

title in 3A last month.
"If we can somehow get numbers up for wrestling, I think this will become an even more interesting event and evening," Roth said.



 Buckeye Local Panthers dropping out of OVAC Dual Championship Tournament

CONNORVILLE - Buckeye Local has decided to drop out of the inaugural OVAC Dual Championship Tournament, which gets under way this evening.

Panthers' brass contacted OVAC officials Tuesday afternoon at approximately 2 p.m., informing them of its decision, citing one confirmed case of MRSA (Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus), which is defined by the web site PubMed Health as, "a highly contagious type of staph infection, which doesn't respond to the usual antibiotics, which are used to treat staph infec-

Buckeye Local, which was seeded second in the Class 4A tournament, shut down wrestling practice both Monday and Tuesday as each of its wrestlers and coaches were examined by the school's training staff.

"As soon as it was brought to our attention, we were concerned," Miller said. "We brought the entire team in and had them looked at. If there was anything to be concerned about, we immediately contacted those kids' parents and urged them to see a doctor."

Miller said any student suspected with MRSA wouldn't be permitted to return to class until he was medically cleared.




