## • Steubenville wins Class 5A

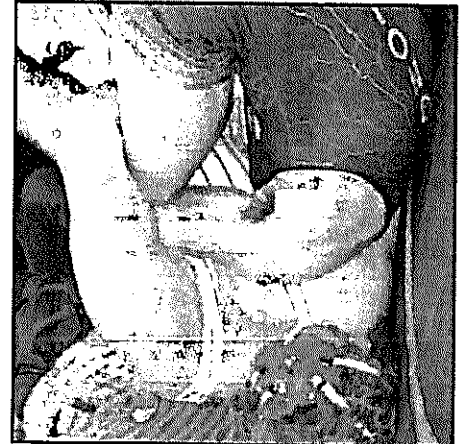

Redskins win first title

STUBENVILLE - For the

second time in two nights, the Shadyside wrestling team has returned to Belmont County with championship hardware.

Twenty-four hours after winning the Ohio High School Athletic Association Division III, Region 21 team dual meet title at Caldwell High School, the Tigers captured the Bill Hinegardner Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 1-A/2-A Dual Meet Championship on Thursday night.

Shadyside, the No. 3 seed, doubled up second-seeded Madonna, 48-24, in the semifinals before rolling past top-seeded Caldwell, 52-27. The victory against the Redskins avenged a loss in last year's championship match.

"The kids came out and wrestled well again," Shadyside coach Sean Grinch said. "We were a little undermanned not having (heavy-weight) Donnie (Meadows) in the lineup, but the kids answered."

"This group just keeps surprising me."

Senior Brett Kahl, who missed most of last season with a knee injury, put the caper on the title when he pinned Caldwell's Cody

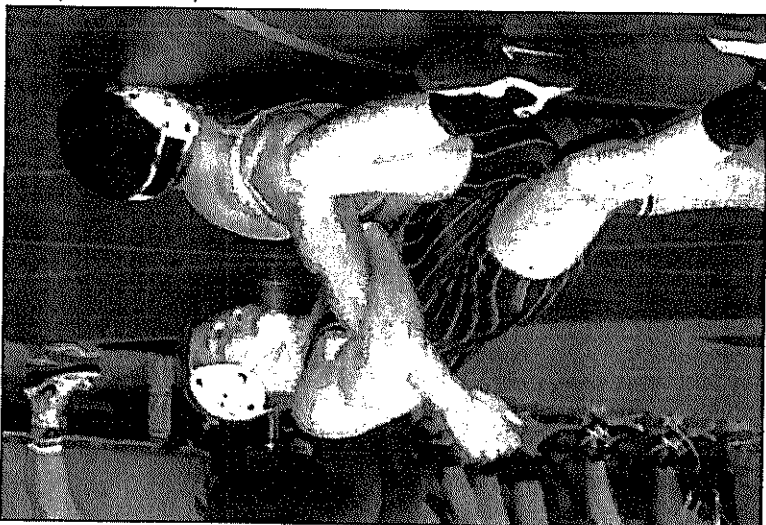

This week will be a busy one for the Harrison Central and Shadyside wrestling teams as they prepare for not one dual-meet tournament, but two.

The Huskies and Tigers will meet each other in an Ohio High School Athletic Association Division III, Region 21 Dual Team Tournament semifinal at Caldwell High School on Wednesday. One night later, the same two squads will compete in

the Bill Hinegardner Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Dual Meet Tournament semifinals inside Steubenville High School's Crimson Center. Harrison Central will vie for the Class 4-A title, while Shadyside is in Class 1-A/2-A.

"It's going to be a tough week," Shadyside coach Sean Grinch said. "But if we wrestle like we are capable of, we'll be OK."

At Caldwell, Shadyside finished as regional runnerup to Massillon Tuslaw last

winter, but has a good core of young wrestlers back. That group is led by junior Greg Quinn who won the 120-pound weight class earlier this month at the 63rd annual Ron Mauck OVAC Tournament. The two-time state placewinner was awarded a pair of forfeits last week to improve to 38-0.

Seven other Shadyside wrestlers won two bouts during the quarterfinals, including Cody Hawthorne who captured both of his matches by pins. One of his falls came

in 30 seconds. Others were Jason Muldrew (113), Collin Hunter (126), Josh Kahl (132), Brett Kahl (145) and Donnie Meadows (285). Prevailing in their only match were Bailey Chaplin and Will Brown, who split duties at 138.

"It was good to get some of those kids back in the lineup, especially Cody," Grinch said. "He was injured and didn't wrestle at the OVAC Tournament, but he



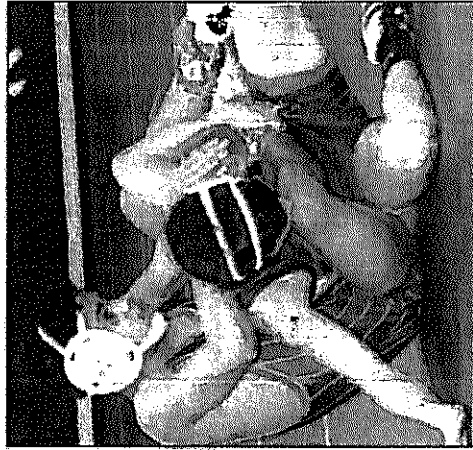

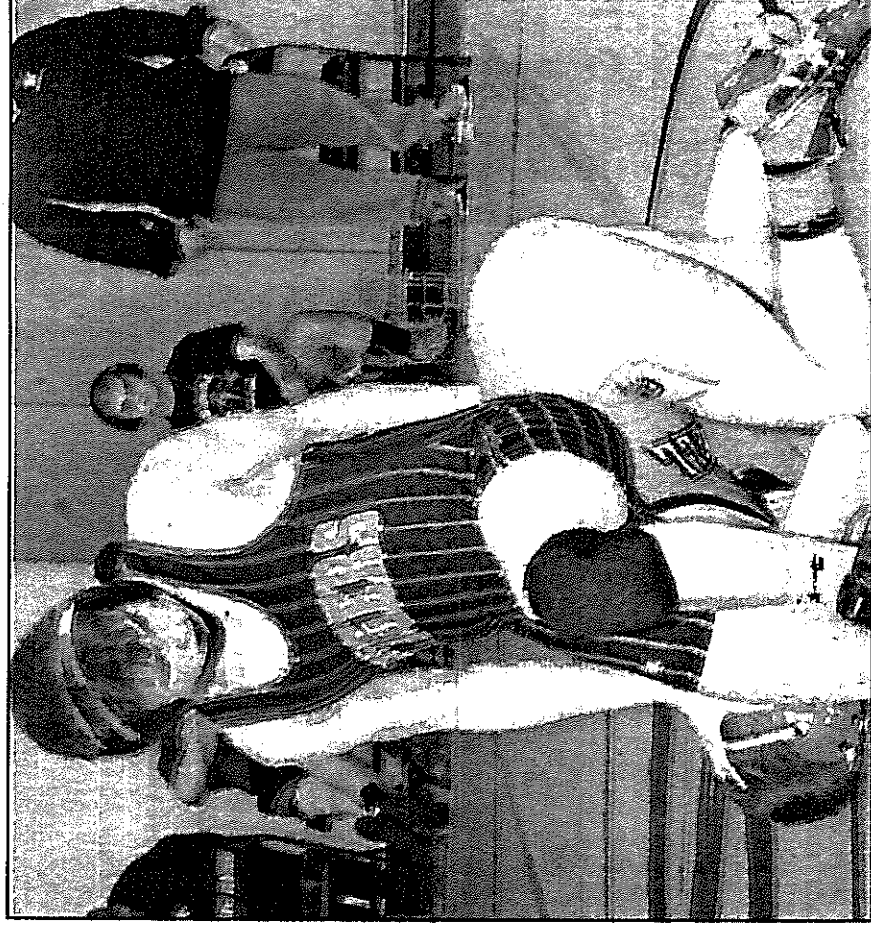

After the three-straight wins, the Indian Creek message to its wrestlers was, "keep it hot."

Well, Oak Glen's Robert Bozek cooled down the Redskins with his 100th career win at 132 pounds. At that point in the match, Indian Creek still had a 21-9 advantage.

"They're following the gameplan and I like that," Pendleton said.

Miles Mazik (138), Devon Eakle (145), Nathan Thomas (170) and Richie Jarman (195) also earned wins for the Redskins. Alex Shuman (157), Devon Chadwick (160) and Stevie Cool (182) also earned wins for the Golden Bears.

This was Indian Creek's first year in 4A after spending the past couple decades in 5A. In January, the Redskins won the 4A title at the OVAC tournament in Wheeling, too.

"It's our first year down in 4A and I'm glad we could make some noise right away," Pendleton

said. "This season, we knew that we had a good team that was young. They've developed well through the year. We had a great OVAC tournament and hopefully we can peak at the end of the season."

Indian Creek is now 9-1 in dual meets this season. It will wrestle again Saturday at the Panther Classic at Buckeye Local.

Oak Glen is now 15-11 in dual meets this season. It will wrestle again Saturday against John Marshall and Madonna.

The Golden Bears face Brooke on Feb. 13, then will gear up for the region-als at tournament, which begins Feb. 19 in Fairmont.

"We have a good shot at sending a lot of kids to the state meet," McGillian said. "We are in a very tough region, so we'll have to earn it. They're going to have to wrestle and fix some of the minor mistakes."

Harrison Central earned third place in 4A after beating Edison, 41-28, in the consolation bout. Oak Glen beat the Huskies to advance to the finals.
