

# **OVAC** pins **MAC** stars

 Continue to dominate 'Clash of Champions' with 41-22 win

CORAOPOLIS, Pa. - The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference flexed its muscles once again with a convincing, 41-22, decision of the Midwestern Athletic Conference in the 22nd annual "Clash of Champions" All-Star wrestling match Thursday night inside the Moon Area High School gymnasium.

The OVAC won five of the first six matches in building a 19-3 advantage. With the victory, the OVAC leads the alltime series 16-6. It was the third consecutive triumph for the bi-state conference, and it was the 10th victory in the last 12 meetings.

"It's always fun when you get some of the best kids in the OVAC to come up here and wrestle the best of the MAC, OVAC and Steubenville head coach Mike Blackburn said. "The last 5-6 years we've really competed and put some good teams out there.

"You could see it meant something to the kids. They want to represent the OVAC the best they can and their respective school's for the last time," he added. "So, they went out and took care of business."

A 14-2 major decision by Oak Glen's Ty Logston over South Side's Austin Seik at 106 got the OVAC off to a good start. Shadyside's Greg Quinn, who finished second in the state in Division III last weekend in Columbus, completed his outstanding high school career with a 1-minute, 45-second pin of Baldwin's Amir Muhammad, who was the Most Out-

Steubenville's Timmy Young made it 12-0 OVAC when he scored a takedown 19 seconds into overtime in outlasting Pine Richland's Alex Salas, who finished seventh in the prestigious Powerade Tournament and is committed to wrestle at Drexel University. Young, who was seventh last weekend in Division II, trailed 3-0 after two periods and 4-2 late before securing a takedown with 15 seconds left to force the extra 1minute session.


