



# Tigers defend crown

 Shadyside nips Madonna, 36-33, in Class 1A/2A

WELLSBURG — The "Big Orange Machine," aka the Shadyside wrestling team, continued its successful season as it rallied past top-seeded Madonna, 36-33, Thursday night at Brooke High School to capture its third OVAC Bill Hinegarder Dual Meet Championship in the last four years,


"Coming into this match I knew it was going to be tight," Shadyside head coach Sean Grinch said. "We didn't have Billy (Johnson) in the lineup today, so I knew it was going to be nipand-tuck and it was probably going to come down to the heavyweights.

"We needed to win every head-to-head match, and we had some tough matches."

Donnie Meadows' pin at 4-minutes, 57-seconds of the 285-pound match decided the match in which Shadyside led 21-6 after six of the 14 weight classes, only to watch the Blue Dons take a 33-30 lead with one bout left. The Tigers' senior standout, who has missed most of the season with injuries suffered in football, trailed 2-0 after two periods before getting an escape to start the third period. He then recorded a takedown and put Madonna's Ryan Ekey on his back.

"It was pretty intense. I knew all I had to do was pin him," Meadows said. "There was a lot of pressure on me, but I'm used to it. I've been in that situation before and came through."





### Big Red blanks **Devils** in 4A

WELLSBURG Steubenville wrestling team earned its 28th dual meet victory of the season on Thursday, More importantly, it was Big Red's seventh conseuctive Bill Hinegardner OVAC Dual Meet title.

After capturing the 5A crown a year ago, Steubenville shut out St. Clairsville, 70-0, in the 4A championship at Brooke High School.









