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

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



ented Wheeling Park (10-5) awaits. The Patriots, who rolled past Parkersburg South for the title last year, have also won three titles on the OUE court. In its history, Park has won 13 OVAC titles, which trails only St. John Central's 15 for the most of any school.

The other half of the bracket finds what will be a rematch. Two Rivers Athletic Conference foes Brooke and Parkersburg South will clash on the Bruins court in Wellsburg for the second time in three days. South comes north on Saturday for the regular-season meeting.

Brooke earned the two seed at 12-3. The Bruins have never played in the championship game and have only escaped the consolation pool in the inaugural season of the event.

As for South, the Patriots are a solid 13-3 on the season. They've been to OUE on the regular, qualifying four times for the final in their relatively short history with the OVAC. However, South has just one title (2014) to show for it.

#### CLASS 4A

Cambridge, which dropped down to 4A this school year, wrapped up the top seed on the strength of an impressive 14-2 record. The Bobcats, who are led by standout senior Lily Ritz, have never won an OVAC title in girls' hoops. This is only the second time the Guernsey Countians have qualified for the top four.

To get to its first title game, they'll need a victory against fourth-seeded St. Clairsville. The Red Devils got into the field Monday evening with their win over Steubenville and Harrison Central's loss to Brooke. Coach Stacey Agnew's team, which is the only team of the 20 to reach the semifinals to have a sub .500 record, reached the 4A final last season, falling to Union Local. St. C., which hasn't won an OVAC title since 2007, has played in three finals.

Second-seeded Buckeye Local is aiming for its second trip to OUE. The Panthers, who are led by their dynamic back-court duo of Emily Holzopfel and Alaire Destifanes, are currently 11-6 on the season. Buckeye won its only title in 1992.

A semi-final date with Steubenville awaits the Panthers. Big Red is currently 8-8 on the season and is coming off the aforementioned loss to St. Clairsville on Monday. They have claimed five OVAC titles, including one in the playoff format in 2013.

#### CLASS 3A

Arguably the strongest field in the OVAC resides in this class with all four teams having at least 11 victories.

For the second straight season, Bellaire is the top seed. The Big Reds have been impressive, posting an 18-2 mark en route to a point average of 63.2, which trailed only Indian Creek in the entire conference.

Coach John Farrier's team was upset by Linsly in the semifinal last season. The Big Reds haven't won an OVAC title since 2006 and have never played in the championship game.

The path to a crown isn't easy once again. Buckeye Trail, which knocked off the Cadets in that title game last season, qualified for the tournament after Union Local fell to John Marshall Monday night. The Warriors are 11-5 and have played a challenging schedule inside the Inter-Valley Conference as well as against its OVAC opponents. All told, Trail owns three OVAC titles.

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A perennial playoff entrant awaits, however, in Fort Frye. Coach Dan Liedtke's well-drilled squad is the third seed at 14-3. The Fort owns five tournament OVAC titles

#### **CLASS 1A**

A new champion is guaranteed in the small-school division since Frontier failed to qualify.

Cameron grabbed the top seed thanks to an impressive 14-1 record. The Dragons haven't reached the semi-final round of the OVAC since 2010 and have never won a conference title.

The Dragons will host Madonna, which is 8-9 on the season. The Blue Dons own 11 championships, but they won only once in the new format despite four title-game appearances.

The other half of the bracket finds Beallsville as the two seed. The Blue Devils have a solid 11-5 mark and are seeking their fourth trip to OUE. Of the six pennants they've claimed in hoops, two have come under this format. They went back-to-back in 2009 and 2010.

A challenging task with 8-8 Trinity Christian awaits the Monroe Countians. Trinity won its only OVAC title in 2012.

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#### CLASS 2A

With Wheeling Central having moved up a class, 2A will also have a new champion.

Steubenville Central, which has been ranked in the Division IV Associated Press Poll most of the season, garnered the top seed with a 15-3 record. The Crusaders are seeking their first OVAC title since 1989. They fell to the Maroon Knights in last season's title game. That was their second appearance in the final.

To make it a third trip to OUE, the Crusaders will have to contend with River, which has gotten hot late to propel itself into the field as the fourth seed. The Pilots are 10-7 and fought off Clay-Battelle for the final bid. River, which hasn't won an OVAC title since 2004, has come up empty in three trips to the title game.

Shenandoah pocketed the second seed after completing the pre-OVAC portion of its schedule with a solid 13-5 mark. The Zeps won their only OVAC title in 2006 and have never played in the conference final in three appearances in the top four.

The Zeps' path to St. Clairsville won't be easy as Shadyside earned the third seed with a 14-5 record. The Tigers own seven OVAC titles and claimed hardware twice under the current format (2011 and 2013).

Neither of the semifinal matchups in this class occurred earlier this season.





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

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




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# Steubenville Cruises To **Dual Meet Championship**
