since Coach Jay Cartwright's Linsly baseball team had played a game before Tuesday afternoon, but the Cadets sure didn't miss a beat in their 2021 season-opener against a young, but talented Bellaire team.

Linsly excelled in all facets coming out of the game with excellent starting pitching, powerful hitting and great fielding in rolling to a shortened victory over the Big Reds.

Kobe Hill was nearly perfect on the mound for four innings, allowing just a walk and a single while fanning six and walking one, while the Cadets put their first eight runners on base, batting around and scoring six first inning runs, in cruising to a 12-2, five-inning, triumph over Bellaire at Holloway Field.

"We really had a great pre-season," Cartwright said with a smile. "And it was a luxury for me as a coach to be able to teach the game for four weeks before starting the season. These kids came out here every day, worked and enjoyed what they were doing getting ready for this. It's just great to be back on the baseball field again."

After Hill had set the Big Reds (1-6) down in order to start the game Linsly came to the plate with a purpose.

Hill was hit by a pitch to get things started before Zac Taylor singled to right to put runners on the corners. After Taylor took second, Hunter Kelley ripped a two-run double down the left-field line, which was followed by a Brodie Selmon single to left that plated Kelley, before Selmon was thrown out trying to stretch the hit into a double.

With one out Gionni Ferguson worked a walk with Adam Och and Trey Prather each following with RBI doubles before Collin Powell blasted a run-scoring triple to deep center. That was it for Big Reds' starting, and losing, pitcher Chance Maffee before Lex Wilhelm entered in relief and fanned the ninth and 10th batters of the frame to stop the bleeding at 6-0.

However, as good as the first two hitters went for Wilhelm, he struggled coming back out in the second, issuing three consecutive walks on 3-2 pitches to load the bases. Ferguson brought home the first run of the inning with fielder's choice before Och's bloop double to right plated the second and Linsly made it 9-0 on a two-out base hit from Paull.

Kelley added a sacrifice RBI in the third with Alex Taylor bring home the final Cadet run with a sacrifice fly in the fourth.

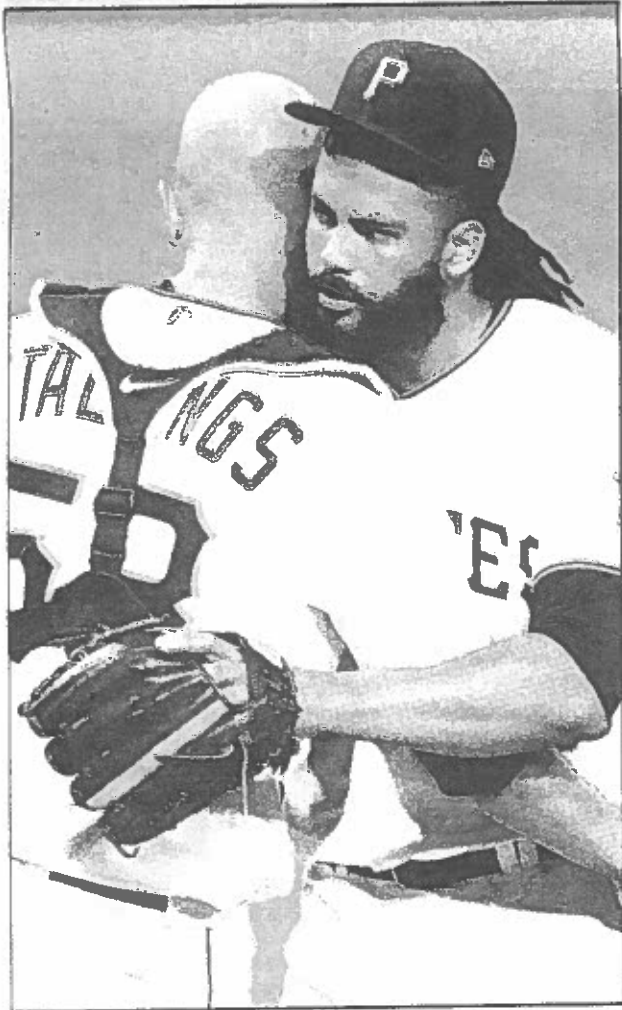
Bellaire was able to take advantage of Hill being removed to start the fifth, getting three consecutive hits, including RBI singles from Kaden Banal and Andrew Lamotte, but Kelley managed to avoid any other trouble and got out of a jam to end things.

"Kobe (Hill) is such a competitor and has three pitches he can really command," Cartwright added.

"And he is a tough kid that got hit by a pitch in his first at bat and then fouled a pitch off his foot on his second trip but kept on going.

"Again, these kids have been working hard. We had a good scrimmage last week and seen some good arms against Wheeling Park and these kids have had to hit off of our pitchers as well, which isn't easy. I also have a great group of assistant coaches that know the game and work so well with our players."

## Pirates double up Padres by 8-4 count

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — Jacob Stallings had three hits and three RBIs, and the Pittsburgh Pirates chased Blake Snell in the first inning of an 8-4 victory over the San Diego Padres on Tuesday night.

The game lasted 4 hours, 7 minutes, and included 17 walks, seven hit batters and 27 runners left on base.

Stallings hit a two-run double off the top of the left-field fence in the first inning, then added an RBI single in the second. That helped the Pirates take a 5-3 lead en route to their third win in four games.

San Diego had its four-game winning streak end as Snell retired just two of the eight batters he faced. The 2018 AL Cy Young Award winner had his worst outing in three starts since being acquired from the Tampa Bay Rays in an offseason trade. He has pitched a total of 10 1/3 innings.

Pirates starter Chad Kuhl had a career-high seven walks in 3 2/3 innings. He was charged with four runs, three earned, and has 15 walks in 10 2/3 innings over three starts this season. Chris Stratton (1-0), the fifth of seven Pittsburgh pitchers, worked a scoreless seventh inning and was credited with the win.

Erik Gonzalez had three of Pittsburgh's 12 hits. The Padres' Trent Grisham led off the game with a homer to right-center. He has connected in three straight games.

After San Diego went ahead 2-0, Snell lasted 38 mostly ineffective pitches. Stallings scored on a double by Gonzalez to deep center field that made it 3-2.

The Padres tied it in the second when Grisham scored on a wild pitch by Kuhl. Pittsburgh went ahead for good in the bottom half against Nabil Crismatt (0-1) when Bryan Reynolds hit an RBI single and scored on Stallings' base hit.

Crismatt helped save the Padres bullpen by pitching five innings, allowing four runs.

Pittsburgh pitchers issued 13 walks. The Padres, though, stranded at least two runners on base in six innings.

The Red Devils didn't shy away from competition. In fact, they were a last-minute replacement at the Division II State Duals in Steubenville and took the request to face nationally ranked St. Paris Graham. Although things didn't go so well, Sansone said his team learned from that experience.

"We wrestled against good competition all season," he said. "That's the only way you are going to get better, and I think, as a team, we got better as the season progressed."

Martins Ferry's title is its first since winning Class 3A in 2011-12. The Purple Riders also prevailed in 2001-02 in 3A.

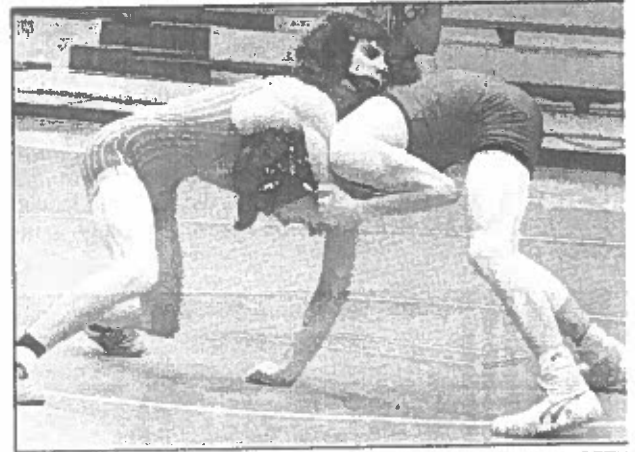
