TO OUR FOLKS IN THE SERVICE May 1945

Dear Friends-in-Uniform,

I was just reading a section in the Christian Rural Fellowship paper for January 1945. It struck me as something that might apply to many of you. It comes from "A Rural Manifesto." "2. We believe in the philosophy of abundance and not of scarcity; in production for use and not for profit; and in our moral obligation to feed and clothe the people as our stewardship of industry." Particularly the last part of this interests me and I hope it will interest you. As Christians do we not have an obligation to use our occupation for God and for others no matter what that occupation may be.

Along this line I am asking Charlie Nelson to enclose with this Messenger a leaflet that I trust you will consider carefully. We are also including a devotional booklet. Now that some of you are going to have some months of idle time. now that V-E Day is here, you will have time to think on some of these things. I hope you will find help in this little booklet.

Since Easter the pastor has been "farmer." There are over 100 pine trees and several other kinds of new trees and shrubs down in the hollow; there are several new fruit trees around the manse and a berry patch has been started. The garden is in so far as early vegetables are concerned. The weather has been so cool that one man told me his garden seed had rotted in the ground, he thought. On April 8 a Memorial Service for Chester C. Braun, Jr., was held in our church with Rev. Fuller in charge. Immediately following the regular service, the church filled with Chester's acquaintances and friends who came to pay tribute to his memory. Chester gave his life for his country on January 3, 1945.

Sgt. James Allietta, reported missing on December 16, and later reported to be a prisoner of the Nazis, was liberated and has now returned to the United States.


"I'm living in a German apartment house located in the outskirts of a small town. We have practically all the comforts of home here except for a maid."
