WELLSBURG — It was a good day in the pool for Wheeling-area teams on Saturday.

Wheeling Park edged defending champion Parkersburg South to win the boys Class 5A title and John Marshall out-pointed Morgantown on the girls side of things Saturday afternoon to take home the hardware on the second day of the OVAC Bill Brubaker Swimming Championships inside the Brooke Wellness Center.

JM's girls racked up 269 points to win the girls title, besting Morgantown (222) and Parkersburg South (207) to top the podium. The Park boys team netted an impressive 297 points to top South (263) and Morgantown (222).

Locally, on the girls side of things, Brooke — the host and defending champion — tied for fourth place on the day, while Big Red placed in eighth. On the boys side, the Bruins were seventh, one place better than Big Red.

In addition to winning the team titles, Park and JM also left with individual honors.

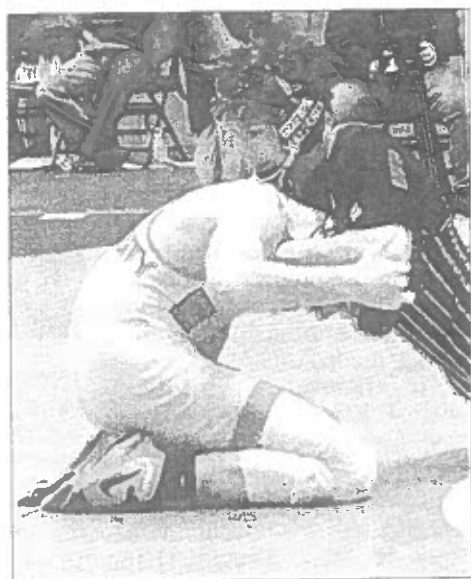

University Wrestlers Earn First OVAC Title

Several Local Competitors
Crowned Individual Champs

WHEELING — It was a night of firsts for the University High wrestling team as the 71st annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships closed out its three-day stand Saturday night inside WesBanco Arena.

The Hawks — despite going just 2-5 in the finals — won both the overall and Class 5A titles with 281 points, which was nearly 100 more than runner up Beaver Local (183). Steubenville was third with 182.5 and Parkersburg South fourth at 177. Defending overall champion Barnesville was fifth with 161.5.

Vrotsos, Former St. C. Wrestling Coach, Named 'Mr. Mat'

WHEELING — The 2025 recipient of the prestigious Mr. Mat award is John Vrotsos, a former wrestling coach at St. Clairsville High School.

Vrotsos wrestled scholastically for Bob Bruney and Steve Kish at Martins Ferry High School. As a "purple rider" mat man, Vrotsos was a four-year letterman and team captain as a senior. An OVAC finalist at 119 pounds as a senior, Vrotsos went on to be a Sectional And District Champion, qualifying for the Ohio State Championships with a senior record of 26-4.

He attended West Liberty State College where he wrestled for one year before suffering a career-ending knee injury. After graduating from WLSC, Vrotsos coached wrestling at St. Clairsville High school for 25 years, produc-

ing 99 OVAC place winners, Wrestler Award recipients — 11 OVAC Champions and Justin Ewing (1995) and Zac two Bierkorte Outstanding Schuller (2006). Vrotsos also

produced 42 Ohio State "Red Devil" qualifiers and 15 state place winners.

Vrotsos also served as an assistant football coach for 22 years under the legendary gridiron coach of George Strager, Mike Young, and Brett McClean. He was head track coach for eight years (1998-2006) and assistant track mentor from 2009 until 2013. He teaches Social Studies at St. Clairsville Middle School.

After Coach Rick Welker stepped down as a public address announcer at the Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling tournament to reinstate wrestling at Wheeling Central Catholic High School in 2022, John Vrotsos immediately accepted and assumed the position for the last two years.

Most rewarding to the Vrotsos family is that Vrotsos

joins his father, the late John "Corky" Vrotsos, as a Mr. Mat award recipient. His father was known as one of co-founders of the OVAC Wrestling Tournament in 1954, along with the late George Kovalick and the late Bill Van Horne. John and his dad are the first father-son team to receive the highest accolade in OVAC wrestling.

Vrotsos has been married to his wife, Anne for 35 years. They have three children. John Thomas lives in Columbus where he is a C.T. and X-Ray technologist and recently got married to his wife, Allie this past July. Allie also happens to be an elementary teacher: Audra from Cleveland, where she is a marketing and graphics designer, and Eliza, who is an Intervention Specialist at Mentor Memorial Middle School.

"It feels good. We knew we were going to be the underdog in a lot of matches this round." University head coach Ken Maisel of the championship finals. "It wasn't the best of rounds for us, but at the same time, we had some guys who maybe wrestled beyond where we thought they would place. It was a good tournament.

"The championship is good for our school and good for our program," Maisel continued. "Hopefully, we can continue this throughout the remainder of the season."

University's Brock Kehler captured his third straight OVAC Ron Mauck championship with a first-period pin in the 285-pound finals of Harrison Central's Landen Thomas in 1-minute, 48-seconds. He also pinned Thomas in last year's finals.

For his efforts, the West Virginia University recruit was voted the David Bierkorte Award winner as the Most Outstanding Wrestler and he won the Hercules Award for most pins in the championship bracket in the least amount of time. Kehler advanced to the finals with four pins in less than 45 seconds each.

The Hawks had one other champion in Pepper Martin (113) repeated his 2024 crown at 106. He earned a 16-5 major decision over Oak Glen's Aiden Anderson.

The city of Wheeling finished with four titlists as Linsly freshmen Brock Humphrey (106) and George Mamkos (132) ruled their weight classes. Humphrey opened the final session with an 8-3 nod over Beaver Local's Justus Fisher and Mamkos doubled up University's Nico Maisel, 4-2. It marked the first time in program history that the Cadets had two champions in the same year.

"We're excited about our future with these two freshmen as champions." Linsly head coach Brian Valentine beamed. "We look forward to the future."

Wheeling Park's Jameson Maynard (190) posted a 16-1 technical fall over Southern Local's Johnny Bailey to re-

had two champions each and three of the titlists were repeat winners. Beavers junior Bobby Buchheit (138) won his third straight with a 21-6 technical fall over John Marshall's Zander Ward, the No. 4 seed. Buchheit has now won at 120 and 132. Big Red's Cooper Smith (144) and Brody Saccoccia (157) duplicated their efforts of 2024. Smith blanked University's Carter Pauley 4-0 for his 100th career win as a junior. Saccoccia, a Purdue University recruit, posted a 19-4 technical fall over Cameron's Eli Tedrow. It was Saccoccia's fourth trip to the finals — he won at 120 as a freshman and finished second at 132 as a sophomore. He is now 21-0.

"Both guys won again. We knew (Carter) Pauley was a good wrestler, but Cooper is getting better and better each week," Steubenville head coach Lucas Huffman said. "We told him to execute his game plan, and he did. Brody was doing Brody things. He was very dominant and is locked in at this point in time."

Cameron's Braxton Birch (126) defeated University's Colton Gillespie 10-3 for the Dragons' lone title. They had two runner ups and won the Class A/AA title.

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In the final seconds, Small — the Big 12's leading scorer — added two more free throws and a thunderous dunk when Jonathan Powell came up with a loose ball and flipped it ahead to Small.

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And then ... bedlam. The Coliseum court was flooded with WVU students. DeVries thumped at his chest and yelled joyfully at the crowd, as Small was hugged by teammate Eduardo Andre.

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“Jameson just goes out on the mat and scores points. It’s really awesome to watch him wrestle,” first-year Wheeling Park head coach Danny Doyle said. “Jameson made sure to give himself enough time to heal from football. I think that he waited the perfect amount of time, enough time to let him heal but early enough to make sure he was properly prepared for this tournament.”

Wheeling Central’s Isaac Martin (215) ran his record to an impressive 32-2 with a workmanlike 15-6 major decision over University’s Jackson Pate. Martin finished second last year. It was the Maroon Knights first champion since Zach Basich.

“I’m really excited about Issac’s improvement over the past two years,” Wheeling Central head coach Rick Welker said. “He was fourth as a freshman and second as a sophomore and lost to a pair of really talented kids that are wrestling at the collegiate level.”

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Barnesville’s Ayden King (165) topped Wheeling Park’s Isaac Sands, 2-0, for his first title after placing second last year and third the previous two seasons. The Shamrocks easily defended their Class 3A title.

“Winning the Class 3A title is something we always set out to do, but it’s not our top goal,” Barnesville head coach Jayson Stephen admitted. “We’ve got a young team this year and the kids wrestled pretty well. As a coach, you’d always like to see everyone win, but that’s not going to happen all the time.”

Union Local freshman Gamble Gossett (120) knocked off top-seeded Tristan Eckles of East Liverpool, 7-6. It was Eckles first loss and second straight runner up finish. He was second at 113 in 2024. It was the first title for the Jets since Bobby Stewart won in 2016.

“Tough kid. Works really hard,” Union Local head coach Nate Starkey said of his young champion. “He pushes the pace and he is one of those kids that you can always rely on to get points.”

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Iowa State’s 12-game winning streak was over. The feel-good story of the Mountaineers under DeVries just continues to grow stronger.

Absolutely nothing was settled in the first half — WVU held a slim 25-24 edge after trailing by as much as seven points — except for the style of game that was going to be played. Physical defense won out over flashy offense and runs by either team were short-lived and countered by a run by the other.

As Jones began to get hot — he scored 11 of the Cyclones’ first 21 points — WVU fired back with Small scoring an acrobatic lay-up or Amani Hansberry hitting a critical 3-pointer.

Everything else was pure defense, the kind that sometimes had as many collisions as a NASCAR race, and with just as much banging and positioning.

Maybe that’s the way it was supposed to be. Under Otzelberger, the Cyclones (15-2, 5-1 Big 12) have developed into one of the top defensive teams in the Big 12, while the Mountaineers (13-4, 4-2) have quickly taken on a never-back-down persona from DeVries.

Until Sunday, Gauff — a 20-year-old from Florida who won the 2023 U.S. Open as a teenager

— had collected all 16 sets she'd played this year and 24 of her past 25 dating to the end of last season, which included a title at the WTA Finals.

"In the first set, she played great tennis, and it was tough for me to be on the offense," Gauff said after grabbing the last five games against Bencic. "I just played more aggressively in the second set and then also the third set."

WVU Women Keep Big 12's Leading Scorer In Check In A 82-68 Victory Over Iowa State

MORGANTOWN — West Virginia did a defensive number on Big 12 leading scorer Audi Crooks on Sunday, showing just how far the Mountaineers have come in one year of recruiting under Mark Kellogg.

The box score says the 20th-ranked Mountaineers ran past the Cyclones for an 82-68 win behind the play of J.J. Quinerly and Jordan Harrison, both finishing with 20 points.

Yet the difference was how much better the Mountaineers (15-3, 5-2 Big 12) could match up against Iowa State's powerful 6-foot-3 center, who came into the game leading the Big 12 in scoring at 22.6 points per game.

"They beat the living crap out of her," was the way Iowa State coach Bill Fennelly put it. "That's kind of the way everyone plays her now. She's a big strong and physical kid, which I think allows other teams to be really physical. That's what people do."

In Kellogg's first season last year, WVU simply didn't have the personnel to beat the living crap out of anyone.

A year later, along comes freshman Jordan Thomas and junior-college recruit C.C. Riviere, both of whom have the size and strength to match up with someone like Crooks.

"It's not just Crooks, because when you come into the Big 12, you're going to see these dominant low-post players," Kellogg said. "We didn't quite have as much size last year as we do now. I really thought Jordan did a good job in the minutes she played. C.C. did a good job. That's the beauty of this team is we have more depth."

The difference? A year ago — when Crooks was just a freshman — the Iowa State star averaged 23.5 points and

13.5 rebounds in two games against the Mountaineers. On Sunday, Crooks was held to just 13 points on 4 of 10 shooting with two rebounds.

"Thirteen points, that wasn't the number in my mind," Kellogg admitted. "We exceeded expectations there. As a coaching staff, we talked about that a little bit, and I didn't know we could hold her to 13. It was 13 without giving up a ton of threes, too. I think that's what pleases me the most."

Crooks didn't break into double digits in the scoring column until there was 6:52 remaining in the game. By then, WVU had already built a lead that was once 26 points and was never lower than 13 points in the second half.

"It's nice having a few more post players, obviously we're bigger," said WVU forward Kyah Watson, who finished with a double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds. "We could give her different looks. We didn't allow her to just be on the blocks, where she's most efficient."

WVU's offense was efficient early, taking a 30-15 lead heading into the second quarter. Harrison got off to a hot start with 10 points in the first quarter.

"My shot was feeling pretty good," Harrison said. "I had a good feeling coming in."

Quinerly, who passed former standout Meg Bulger for eighth place on the school's all-time scoring list, got going with 11 points in the third quarter.

Iowa State (13-7, 4-3) still shot 50% (24 of 48) from the field, but WVU's defense forced 25 turnovers and the Mountaineers ended up with 23 more shots at the basket.

Addy Brown led Iowa State with 19 points, seven rebounds and seven assists. The Cyclones played without senior point guard Emily Ryan, who was out with an illness.

Ohio State wins first national title since 2014

ATLANTA (AP) — Instead of crying over another collapse, Ohio State can celebrate another national title after holding off a Notre Dame comeback Monday night to walk away with a nailbiter of a 34-23 victory over the Fighting Irish.

Will Howard hit big-play receiver Jeremiah Smith for 56 yards on a late third-and-11 to lock down a game that had been a laugh, then turned into something else.

Trailing 31-7, Notre Dame scored two touchdowns and two 2-point conversions to make it a one-score game late in the fourth quarter.

The Irish stopped Ohio State on the first two plays of the next drive and used their timeouts. But on third down, Howard found Smith in single coverage on the right sideline and dropped his best pass of the season into the hands of the second-team All-American.

"They were running man coverage and I said, 'Hey, I'm gonna let this loose and let him make a play on it,'" Howard said.

It set up a field goal that started the celebration in earnest (and helped Ohio State cover the 8 1/2-point spread at BetMGM Sportsbook). And it closed

out a seven-week climb from the depths of a program-shaking loss to 20-point underdog Michigan to the top of college football after this, the debut of the sport's 12-team playoff.

Ohio State will bring its sixth "natty" and first since the 2014 season back to the Horseshoe in Columbus.

"It's a great story about a bunch of guys who have just overcome some really tough situations, and with the point where there's a lot of people that counted us out (they) just kept swinging and kept fighting," Buckeyes coach Ryan Day said.

Howard, a transfer-portal success story from Kansas State, threw for 231 yards and two scores, but nothing will beat the pass to Smith with everything on the line.

The receiver, who had been bottled up by Texas in the semifinals then fairly quiet for most of this game, finally got loose for the kind of play he's been making all year. He finished with five catches for 88 yards.

Ohio State scored touchdowns on its first four possessions, then added a field goal on its fifth.

"The championship is good for our school

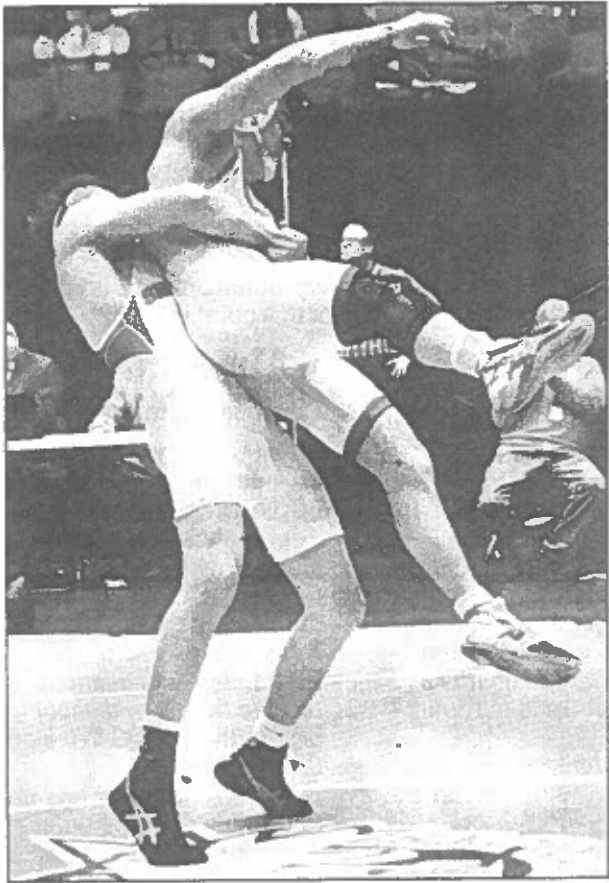

THE 2025 recipient of the prestigious Mr. Mat award is John Vrotsos, a former wrestling coach at St. Clairsville High School.

Vrotsos wrestled scholastically for Bob Bruney and Steve Kish at Martins Ferry High School. As a "purple rider" mat man, Vrotsos was a four-year letterman and team captain as a senior. An OVAC finalist at 119 pounds as a senior, Vrotsos went on to be a Sectional And District Champion, qualifying for the Ohio State Championships with a senior record of 26-4.

He attended West Liberty State College where he wrestled for one year before suffering a career-ending knee injury. 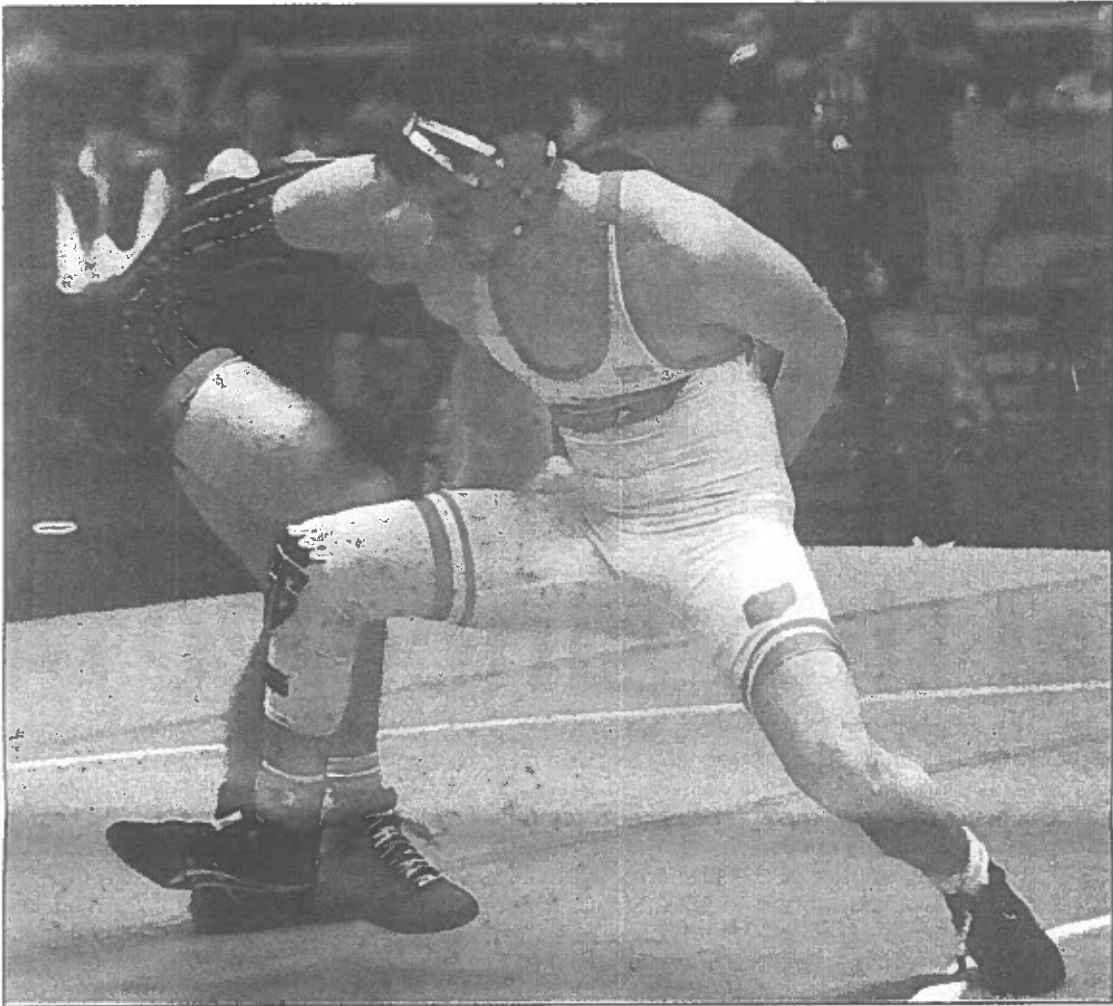

Evan Longwell, a 5-11 sophomore who missed last season with an injury, showed what he can do offensively as he led with a game-high 22 points.

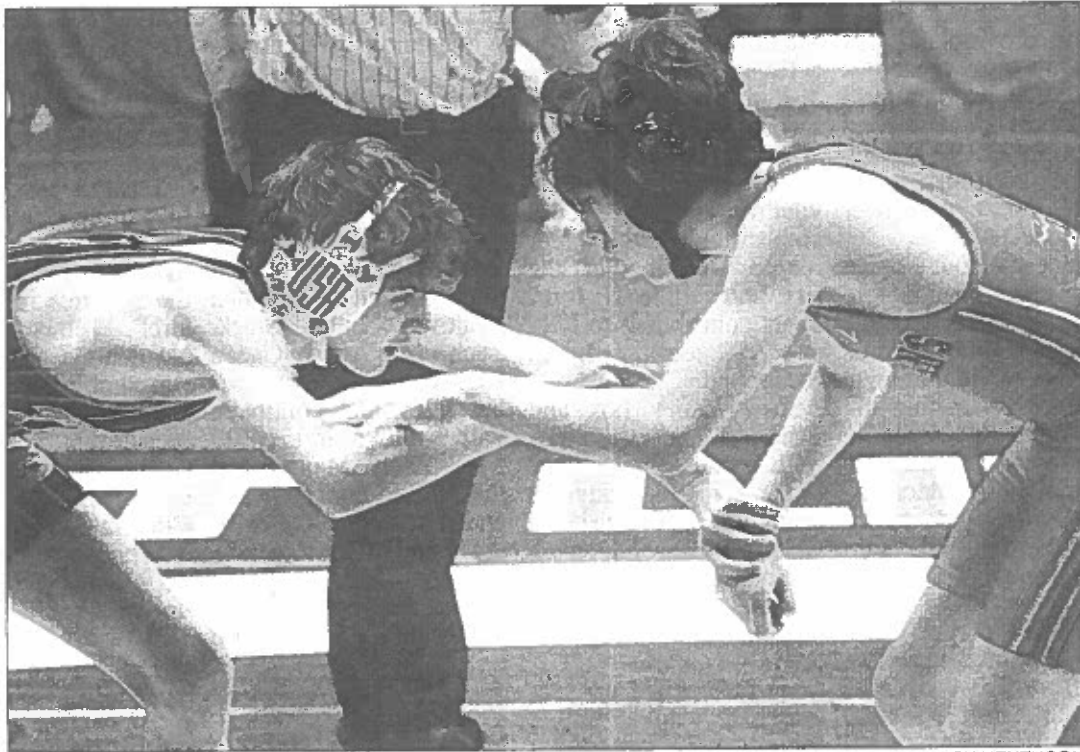

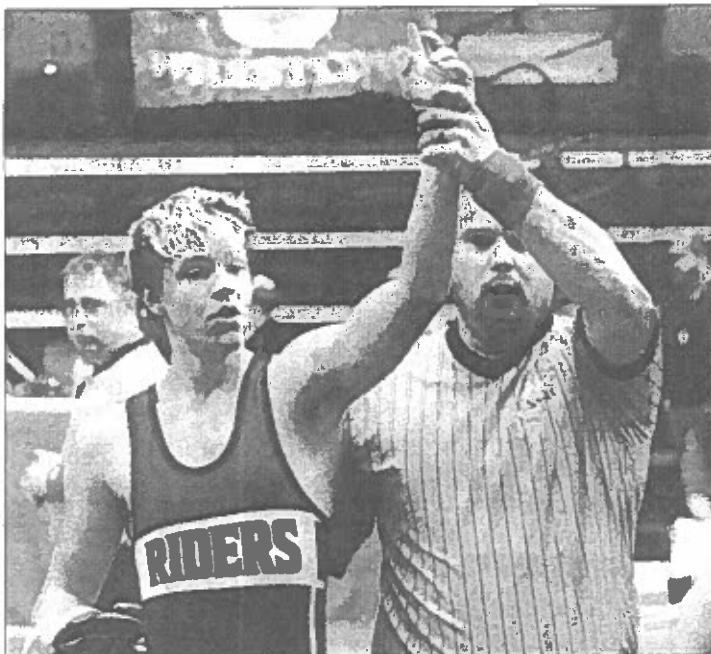

CFP title teams arrive in Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) — Ohio State and Notre Dame arrived in Atlanta on charter flights Friday as the teams moved closer to the College Football Playoff national championship game Monday night.

The Buckeyes are big favorites but the Fighting Irish might have an advantage. Coach Marcus Freeman's team has previously played in Atlanta — and in Mercedes-Benz Stadium — this season.

In a game that strengthened Notre Dame's playoff hopes, the Fighting Irish beat Georgia Tech 31-13 on Oct. 19 as quarterback Riley Leonard ran for two touchdowns.

Is the familiarity with the stadium an advantage for Notre Dame?

"We hope so," Freeman said at the Atlanta airport. "Now we are on the other side of the field and in a different locker room, but we have played here. We know what it's like. Each team will have two opportunities to go into the stadium and practice so by the time Monday gets here I think both teams will be comfortable with the environment."

The Buckeyes opened as 9.5-point favorites, according to BetMGM Sportsbook.

Atlanta is the home of the College Football Hall of Fame and is the self-proclaimed "Capital of College Football." The city hosts the Peach Bowl, Southeastern Conference championship game and such other high-profile games such as the Chick-fil-A Kickoff game.

Atlanta is a short drive from Athens and the University of Georgia, which won the 2021 and 2022 national championships. The South's claim to be the base of power in the game is up for debate as Ohio State could give the Big Ten its second consecutive national champion and Notre Dame also traveled from the Midwest.

Michigan beat Washington in last year's title game to give the Big Ten its first national championship in football since Ohio State's last title in 2014.

Notre Dame (14-1) and Ohio State (13-2) survived the first 12-game playoff to reach the championship game.

Ohio State coach Ryan Day said he believes his team prepared well for the long season.

"We talked about it all year," Day said minutes after exiting the plane. "I think we are. Our energy actually picked up week in and week out. I feel the momentum. You know, when you have momentum, you've got to keep it. I feel like we've continued to get stronger as the season's gone on."

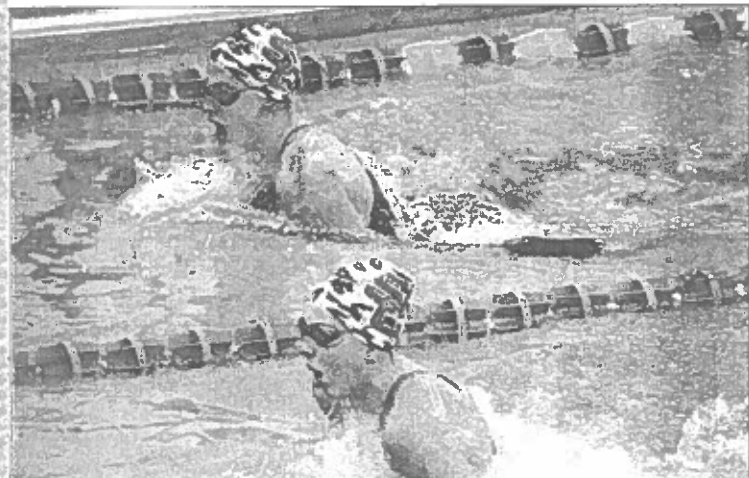

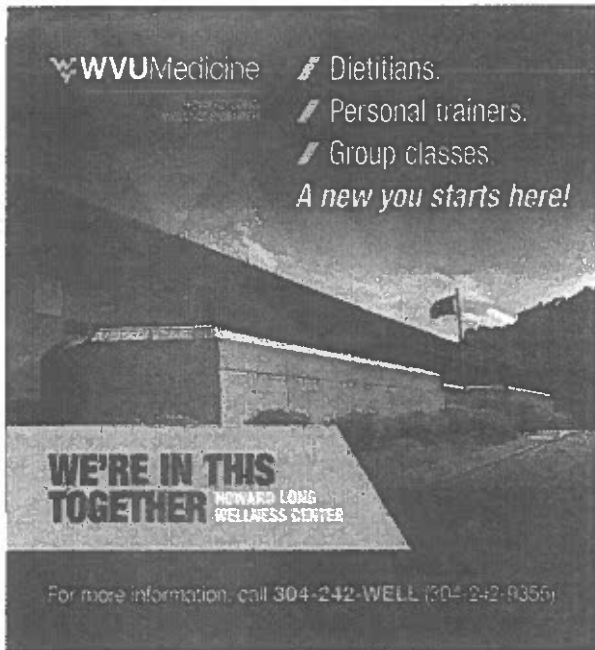

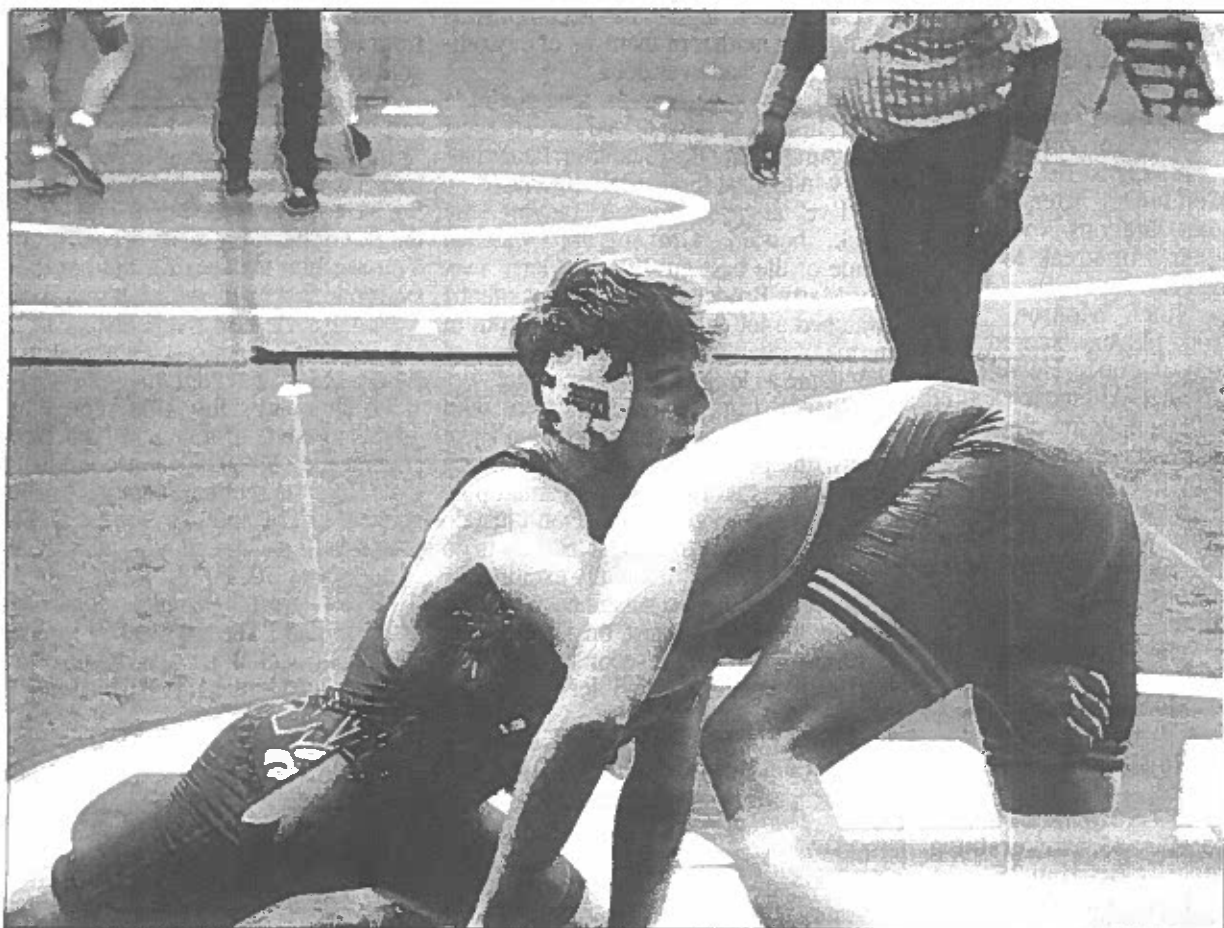

WHEELING - The stage is set for the championship round after an action-packed day two of the 71st Annual Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling Championships on Friday night inside WesBanco Arena.

After the dust settled on the penultimate day of the tournament, Cameron led Class 1A/2A with 80 points to second-place Caldwell's 47.5. Barnesville led Class 3A with 113 points to second place Linsly's 68. Beaver Local led Class 4A with 120.5 points to second-place Oak Glen's 90.5, and University led Class 5A with 160.5 points to second-place Parkersburg South's 127.

University has the largest contingent of semi-finalists with nine - Pepper Martin (113), Colton Gillespie (126), Nico Maisel (132), Carter Pauley (144), Rider Ludrosky (157), Brody Kehler (165), Emerson Murphy (175), Jackson Pate (215), and Brock Kehler (285).

a much wider margin, racking up 136 points to top Barnesville (48) and Columbiana (44).

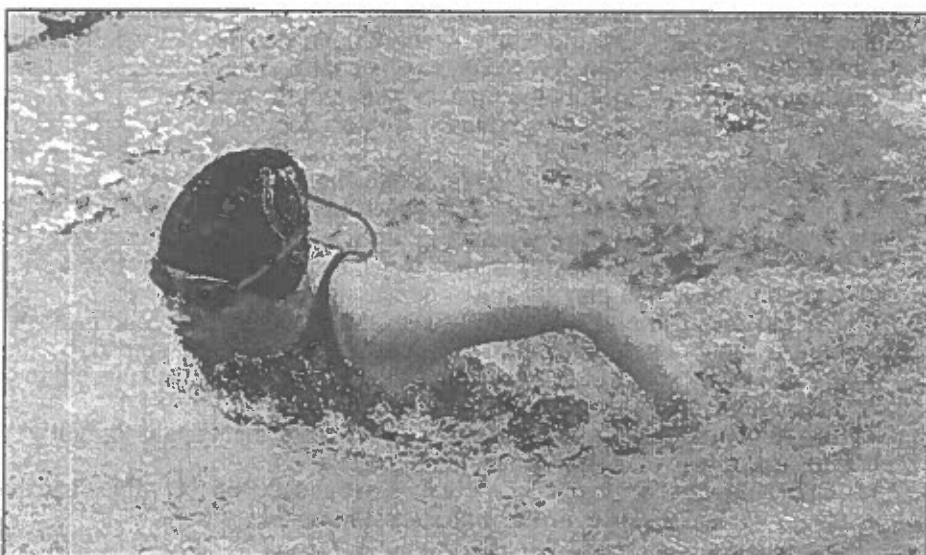

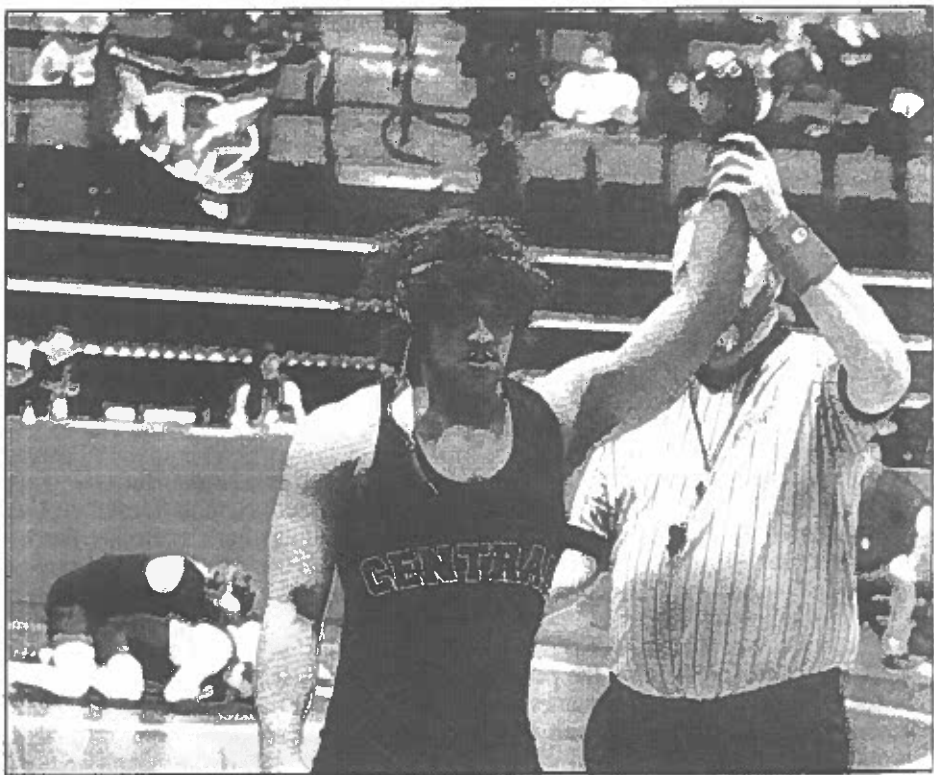

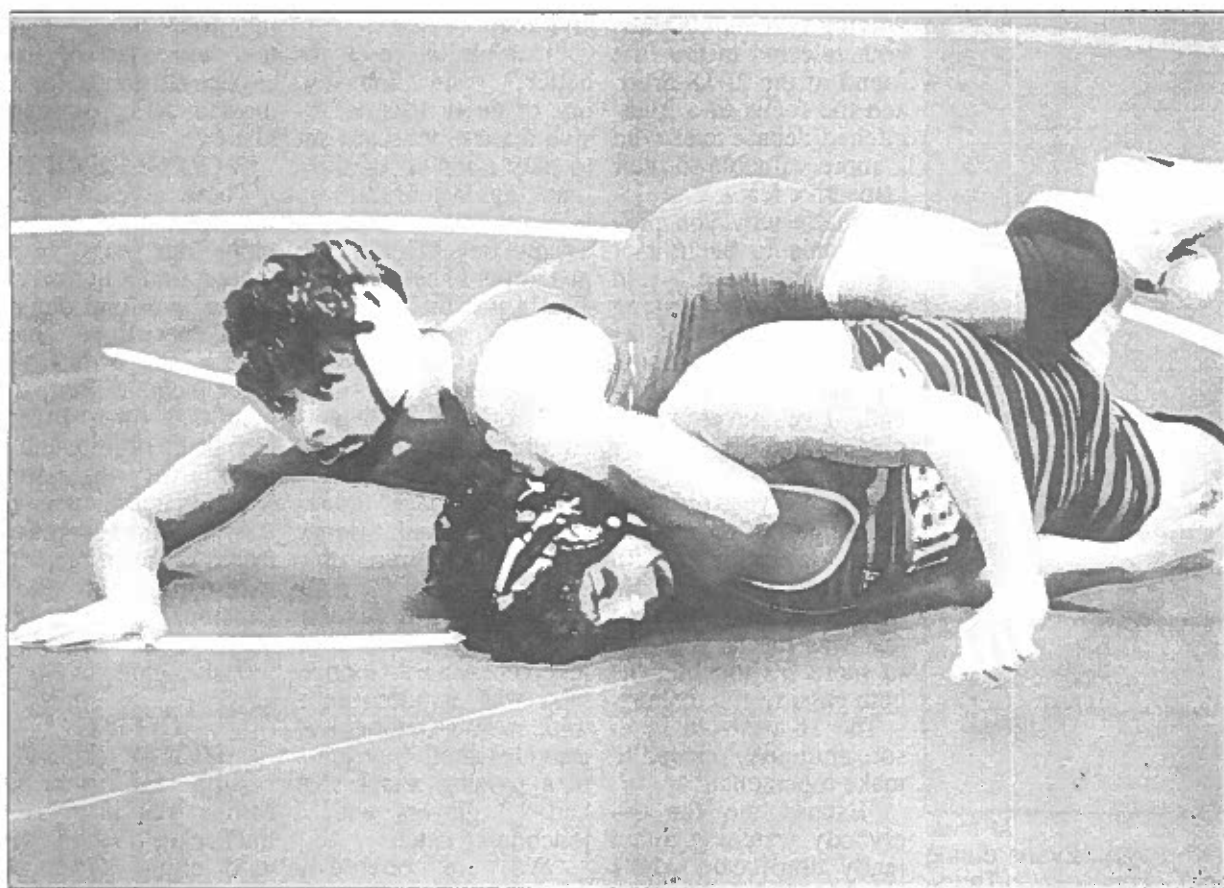

University, Steubenville Lead 71st OVAC Ron Mauck After Day One

WHEELING - If you blinked, you might have missed some of the 144 matches during Day One of the 71st annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships inside WesBanco Arena. Of those matches, 117 ended in pins, with most of those coming in under a minute.

Action resumes Friday at noon with second-round action in the championship bracket and first round of consolation action. Quarterfinal championship bouts will be contested at 6 p.m., as will second- and third-round consolation.

There were also 15 technical falls, seven major decisions, four decisions and one injury default.

Of the 168 seeded wrestlers, only four were upset, with the highest being No. 7 Braylon Leiffer at 150 who was knocked off by Barnesville's Eli Messenger

in a major decision. Two seeds fell at 157, those being No. 9 Drake Bouscher of Toronto by injury default and No. 12 Damien Shaw of East Liverpool; and No. 10 Jake Carman of Wheeling Park at 132.

Prior to the three-day event, Cameron's top-seeded Klypsan Wallace at 175 was scratched and University's second-seeded Kaden Nieman at 120 failed to make weight. Also, Conotton Valley, Magnolia and Paden City withdrew from the tournament due to adverse weather conditions.

On the mat, pre-tournament favorite University won all of its matches to pile up 47 points, which was 4.5 better than Steubenville in both the overall and Class 5A standings. Defending champions Pepper Martin (113) and Brock Kehler (285) won by pins.

"Our 106 had a bye but we got a bunch of pins and a couple of technical falls," University head coach

Ken Maisel revealed. "It was a frustrating day to start out with Kaden not making weight. That probably cost us 20 points in the tournament, but like I told the kids, if you do what you're supposed to do and everybody does that and we come up short, then so be it."

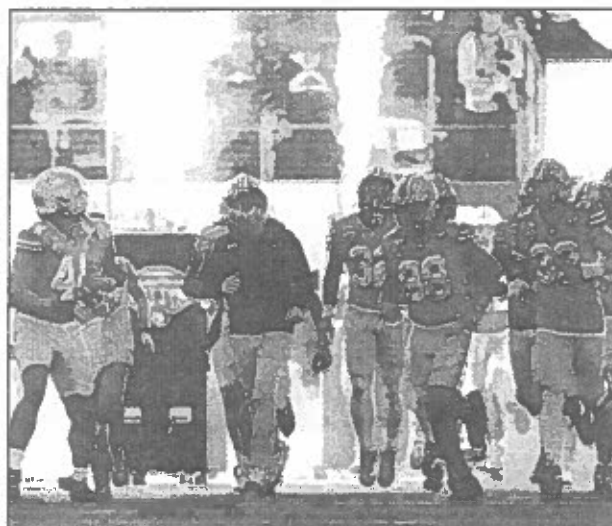
Big Red also won all of its matches, including lightning-quick pins by returning champs Cooper Smith (144) and Brody Saccoccia (157).

"We won all of our matches. Coming we knew we had a couple that could go either way, but we were able to pull those out," Steubenville head coach Lucas Huffman noted. "Hopefully, we can keep that going into tomorrow."

Wheeling Park's returning champion, Malaki Washington, won in his season debut by a pin at 215. He is seeded No. 2.

Ohio State and Notre Dame have reached the same destination with rosters built much the same way.

The teams set to play in the College Football Playoff championship game in Atlanta on Monday night sign elite high school recruiting classes year after year. That has been and continues to be their foundations.

While many teams relentlessly mine the transfer portal in hopes of finding gems, Ohio State and Notre Dame have used the portal judiciously, equally and with great success while putting together their current teams.

Both are college football royalty and can offer NIL riches to go with the exposure and coaching enhancing a player's chance of winning a championship and getting to the next level.

Notre Dame quarterback Riley Leonard said he had mixed feelings about going into the portal after three years at Duke. But he wouldn't be in the position he's in right now if he hadn't made the move.

"You don't really understand the magnitude of going to a big-time school until you kind of live it, and I tried to prepare myself for every situation possible, but you've just got to go through it to understand what it's like to play quarterback at a blue blood school," he said.

According to Associated Press research using 247Sports data, the Buckeyes and Irish both have signed 26 scholarship players from the portal since 2022. Marcus Freeman's first year as Notre Dame head coach. That's an average of 6.5 per year, among the lowest in the Bowl Subdivision.

There's the quarterback matchup pitting arguably the NFL's two leading MVP candidates in Lamar Jackson and Josh Allen.

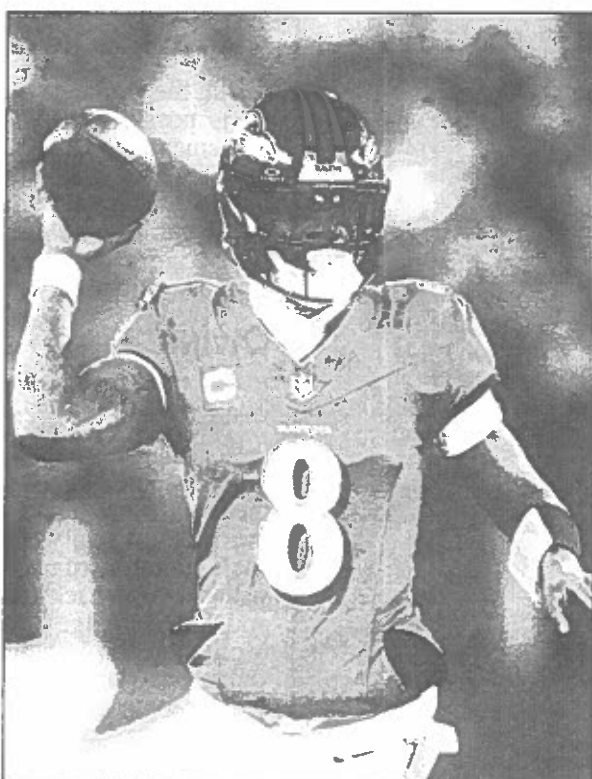
These are two division champions with a combined 27 wins two steps from a Super Bowl berth.

Brubaker also mentioned Sebastian Jayakumar, Rocco D'Aquila, Grace Norman and Sofia Azcutia.

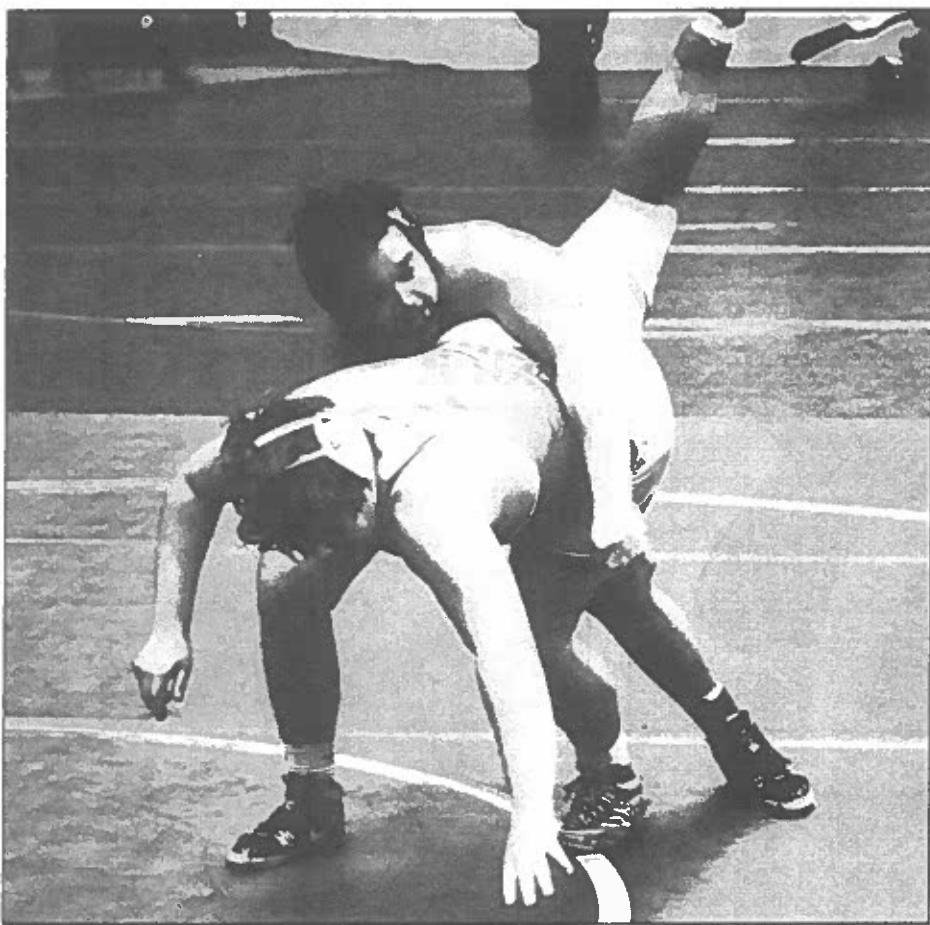
"We have quite a few who can step in and help us out a lot, especially when you put them all together in relays," Brubaker said.

The quarterback matchup alone is worthy of the weeklong hype and prime-time setting involving two dual threats, both selected in the first round of the 2018 draft, and the focus of a high-pitched debate over who is more valuable to their respective team.

"That's why you play this game to be in moments like these," said Allen, before playing down the individual aspect of facing Jackson. "In the history of football, I've never really played against another quarterback."

The 28-year-old Allen topped 40 combined touchdowns for a fifth consecutive year while overseeing an offense that was the NFL's first to score 30 touchdowns, both passing and rushing.

The 28-year-old Jackson, similarly, refused to make it personal.

"Excuse me for everybody watching, but I really don't care who's watching," Jackson said of facing Allen. "We really don't care how people feel about it. We're trying to go in there and just win."

Jackson combined for a career-best 45 touchdowns, led the league in numerous passing categories while running an offense that was the NFL's first to top 4,000 yards passing and 3,000 yards rushing.

What still sticks with Jackson is how his last visit to Buffalo ended in a 17-3 loss in the 2020 divisional round, with Taron Johnson sealing the win with a 101-yard interception return.

"Hell, yes," Jackson said. "That's all I'm going to say about that."

In Buffalo, there's an underlying theme of redemption, too, after the Ravens trampled the Bills in a 35-10 win in Week 4.

The Bills are challenged in finding a way to slow Derrick Henry, who had a season-best 199 yards rushing

against them in September, including an 87-yard touchdown run on the Ravens first offensive snap.

"I think we're a lot better," said Johnson, one of three Bills defensive starters who are set to play after being sidelined against Baltimore in September. "This it's a new day. Things are just going to be different. That's just the way they are."

The Ravens' test is understanding how Buffalo's offense has adapted while gaining a more balanced identity.

Running back James Cook matched Henry with 16 TD runs this season — 13 of them after Week 5. Buffalo also features the addition of receiver Amari Cooper, who was acquired in a trade in mid-October and provides another weapon to a passing attack that had 13 players with a touchdown catch.

"We are obviously two very different teams than we were whenever that game was," Ravens safety Kyle Hamilton said. "The biggest thing we take away from that is that it can be done, we just have to replicate that success. But I know Buffalo has a sour taste in their mouth about that game."

Sour, indeed.

Defensive tackle DaQuan Jones immediately turned his attention to facing Baltimore after Buffalo's 31-7 wild-card win over Denver on Sunday.

"It's gonna be a bloodbath," Jones said. "It's just a mindset thing. At the end of the day, you just have to have the right mindset to go into any game to be physical in order to dominate."

HISTORIC RUN

The Ravens continue to raise the bar for their running game, which set a regular-season record with 5.76 yards per attempt. The previous mark lasted six decades after the 1963 Browns

averaged 5.74.

In eight career playoff games, Henry has surpassed 150 yards rushing four times. That's tied with Hall of Famer Terrell Davis for the most in NFL postseason history.

SECOND FIDDLES

These are two teams who have spent the previous four years playing second fiddle in the AFC to the two-time defending Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs and Cincinnati Bengals.

In that time, Buffalo has been eliminated by Kansas City three times and Cincinnati once. The Ravens' last two playoff losses came in the 2022 wild-card round against Cincinnati, and last year's conference championship game to Kansas City.

HERACLITUS

Bills edge rusher Von Miller was inspired by linebacker Terrell Bernard citing Greek philosopher Heraclitus in discussing how the past doesn't repeat itself because the world is ever-changing.

"He was saying that the man gets in the river once and the next time he gets in the river, it's not the same man, and it's not the same river. The past is the past," Miller said. "We have a huge opportunity in front of us to go out there and achieve all of our dreams."

A KICK AWAY?

Both teams' kickers experienced inconsistencies this season.

In his 13th season, Baltimore's Justin Tucker was good on a career-worst 73.3% of his field-goal attempts while going 22 of 30, including 6 of 11 from 50 yards or longer. He also missed two extra-point attempts.

Buffalo's Tyler Bass closed his fifth season going 24 of 29 in field-goal attempts for a second straight year, while missing a career-worst five extra-point tries.

But, the guidance said, "it is possible that NIL agreements between student-athletes and third parties will create similar disparities and therefore trigger a school's Title IX obligations."

David Ridpath, a former president of the Drake Group, an NCAA watchdog, called the memo "not surprising, and very consistent with the law."

"There was always a

question of how Title IX applies to NIL. Now there is just more guidance," he said. "It's essentially just following the law virtually the way it's always been written."

the 11,000-plus football players across all divisions who enter the portal — the terms of some of those life-changing transactions themselves pecked out on cell phones in the middle of the night.

“At the end of the day, the kid deserves the compensation and support,” Frazier said in an interview with The Associated Press at the NCAA convention this week. “But the institution, to keep the cycle going, they deserve something as well. We’re not in the situation to continue to do that if we keep losing our best and brightest.”

EVEN WITH SUCCESS, CHALLENGES COME FOR MID-SIZED SCHOOLS LIKE NIU

Buoyed by that win over Notre Dame, and a steady string of success over the years, Frazier’s school recently announced it was moving its football program from the Mid-American into the Mountain West Conference starting in 2026.

The Mountain West, with champion Boise State in the College Football Playoff this season, is arguably the most formidable of the so-called Group of Five conferences. There are also 129 schools in the FCS — the Football Championship Subdivision that is the latest iteration of what used to be called Division I-AA.

With the House Settlement set to reshape college sports, allowing institutions to pay players directly while also reshaping roster sizes across all sports, smaller schools like NIU have decisions to make. Namely, will they opt into the revenue-sharing agreements that allow the schools to directly pay the players for their name, image, likeness deals? Or will they stick with the model of having third-party collectives broker those deals?

The schools have until March 1 to decide. Neither choice avoids the stark realities of the new college football: It’s more expensive than it used to be, and big schools will always have the resources to draw in promising players who honed their skills at small schools.

Frazier used the example of 285-pound defensive tackle Skyler Gill-Howard, who came to NIU as a walk-on, got better each year, had five sacks for the Huskies this season, then entered the transfer portal and will play his last year of eligibility at Texas Tech.

“He did a wonderful job. Our coaching staff did a great job developing him,” Frazier said. “The heartache of it is, he’s gone. From the G5 perspective,

WEST LIBERTY — The West Liberty University men’s wrestling team continues its impressive season, climbing to No. 9 in the Open Mat tournament rankings while also holding the No. 16 spot in dual rankings. Six individual Hilltopper wrestlers earned national recognition, solidifying the

Rozelle Rule,” a rule named after the late commissioner, Pete Rozelle. The rule is similar to Frazier’s idea in that it allowed the league to award draft picks (and sometimes players) from teams that signed players with expired contracts to the teams those players left.

In soccer, transfer fees have been the norm in Europe — teams essentially pay other teams for players instead of trading for them. It’s an estimated \$10 billion market, though a recent court ruling there could lead to anything from tweaks to a full-scale overhaul of that system.

LEADERS LOOKING FOR INNOVATIVE PLANS TO CALM DOWN THE TRANSFER PORTAL

Though the House Settlement brings college sports closer to a solution on how to pay players, the transfer portal remains a moving target.

The leadup to this year’s national title game between Ohio State and Notre Dame brought with it stories of massive movement of players, including from the 12 teams that made the College Football Playoff.

Among this season’s biggest headline grabbers were the early season departure from UNLV of quarterback Matthew Sluka, who said promises to pay him \$100,000 were not kept. Last year, former Florida QB signee Jaden Rashada sued Gators coach Billy Napier over an unpaid \$13 million NIL deal. Rashada now plays at Georgia.

More common are accusations of tampering that leads to programs standing by helplessly as players leave without much, if any, warning.

“I can’t believe we live in a world where people are making decisions and issuing offers in text messages,” NCAA President Charlie Baker said. “The number of kids who have told me terrible stories about misrepresentation — there’s no process, accountability, no transparency.”

Frazier, always in search of resources to recruit, develop and, now more frequently, replace players, doesn’t necessarily see his “talent acquisition” fee as a cure-all. But maybe, he says, it’s a start.

He points to the NFL, NBA and other pro leagues that have collective bargaining and drafts that set the framework for their sports.

“We don’t have that,” he said. “This is one of the guardrails that could get us to the point of acknowledging that, yes, you still can buy your team, but it shouldn’t be the wild, wild west.”

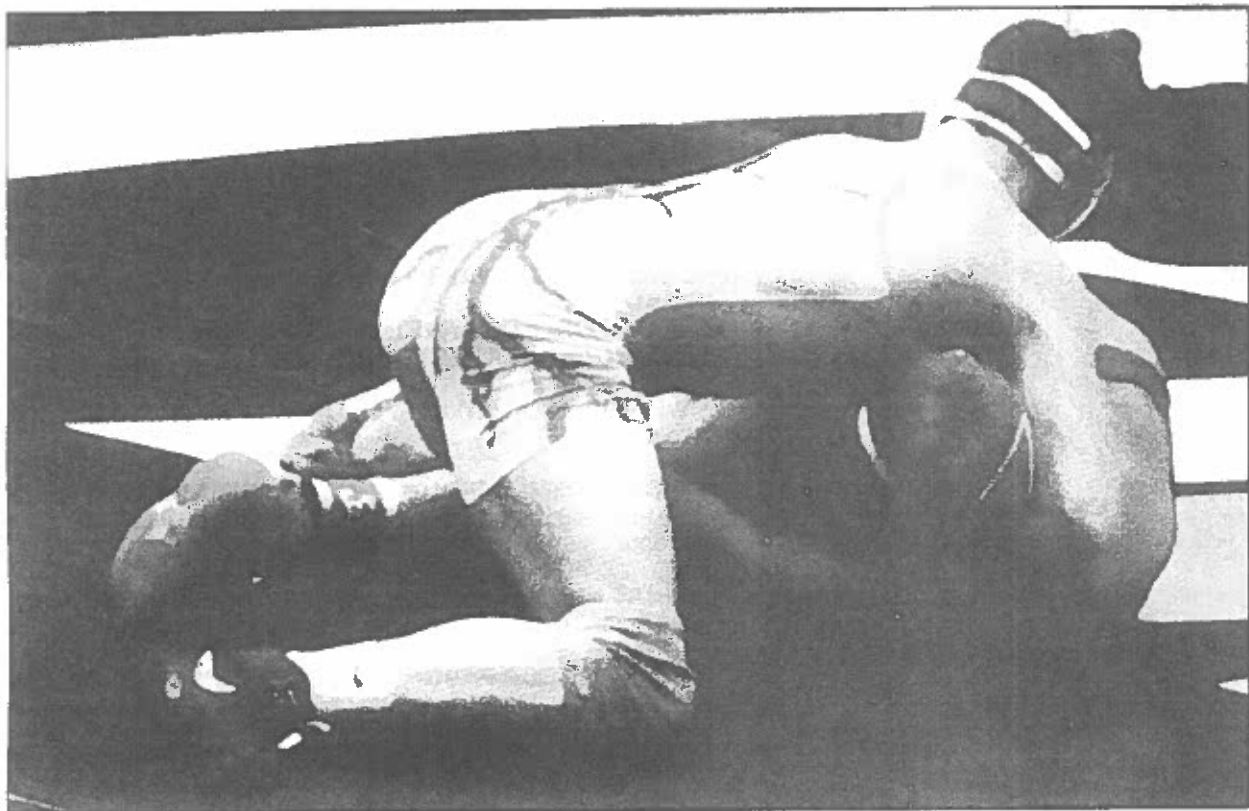

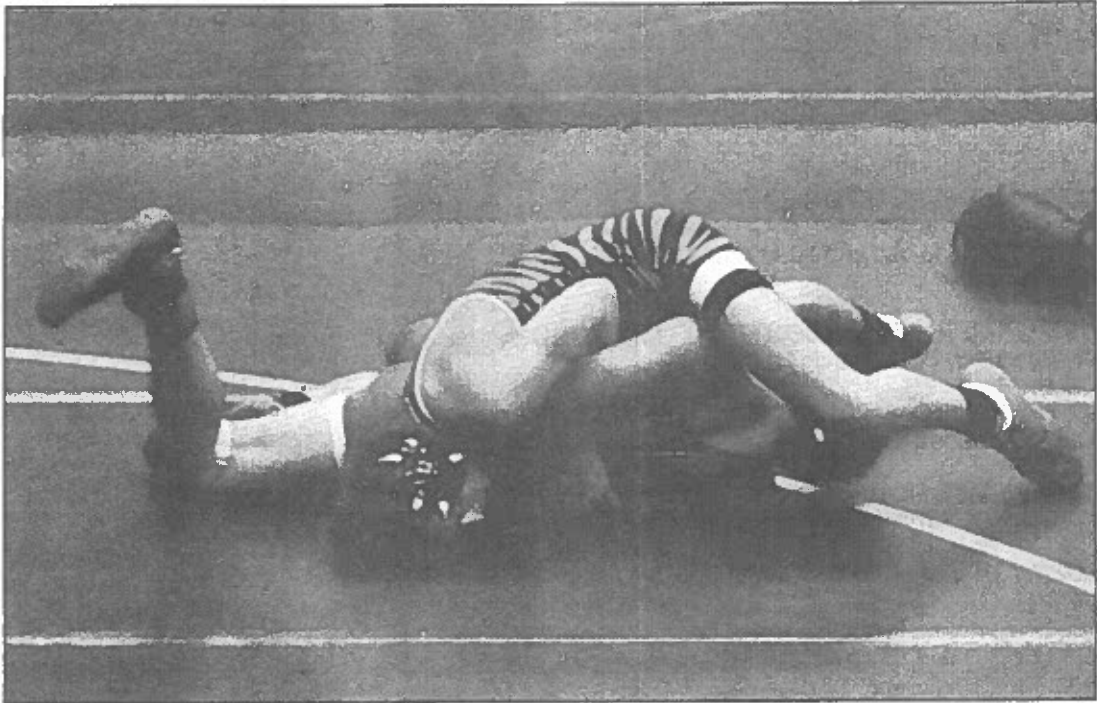
WHEELING — If you blinked, you might have missed some of the 144 matches during Day One of the 71st annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships inside WesBanco Arena. Of those matches, 117 ended in pins, with most of those coming in under a minute.

Action resumes Friday at noon with second-round action in the championship bracket and first round of consolation action. Quarterfinal championship bouts will be contested at 6 p.m. as will second- and third-round consolation

There were also 15 technical falls, seven major decisions, four decisions and one injury default.

Of the 168 seeded wrestlers, only four were upset, with the highest being No. 7 Braylon Leiffer at 150 who was knocked off by Barnesville’s Eli Messenger in a major decision. Two seeds fell at 157, those being No. 9 Drake Bouscher of Toronto by injury default and No. 12 Damien Shaw of East Liverpool; and No. 10 Jake Carman of Wheeling Park at 132.

OSU freshman star Jeremiah Smith lands in national game

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — When Ohio State faced Texas in the Cotton Bowl, Jeremiah Smith was expected to shine.

After all, he had piled up 290 yards receiving in two postseason wins and was looking like the star to stop for the rest of the College Football Playoff field.

Instead, he was double-teamed by the Longhorns and limited to a single catch for three yards as Ohio State advanced to Monday’s national championship game against Notre Dame with a 28-14 victory.

The 6-foot-3 freshman is a big reason the Buckeyes are here. It may have been hard for many younger players to stay engaged in a game where his impact was limited. But Smith, 19, knew Texas’ focus on his play would help the rest of the offense.

“It’s frustrating but it’s part of being a teammate,” Smith said. “You got to open things up.”

Ohio State and Notre Dame built rosters by mixing in a few high-impact transfers

OHIO STATE and Notre Dame have reached the same destination with rosters built much the same way.

The teams set to play in the College Football Playoff championship game in Atlanta on Monday night sign elite high school recruiting classes year after year. That has been and continues to be their foundation.

Both are college football royalty and can offer NIL riches to go with the exposure and coaching enhancing a player’s chance of winning a championship and getting to the next level.

Notre Dame quarterback Riley Leonard said he had mixed feelings about going into the portal after three years at Duke. But he wouldn’t be in the position he’s

George, a junior, has the faith of her coach going into Friday.

"Molly's a junior, and she's [team] captain as a junior which we don't do very often," Wheeling Park head coach Mike Cook said. "She's the top seed in the backstroke and she's probably one of if not the best backstroker in the valley. I really think she's going to run away with the 100 backstroke and have a huge meet. Molly, for the last three years, has done nothing but show up and deliver in big meets."

As for Miller, the senior has been one of the more prolific swimmers in the area in recent years, and looks to continue collecting medals Saturday.

"She's just had stellar performances throughout the year," John Marshall head coach Timmi Snyder said. "She's carried our 200 free relay, which is undefeated this year, and our 400 free relay also. She's crush-

ing it this year. She's put in a lot of extra hours in the pool to get where she needed to be. I'm super proud of her, she's had a great senior year."

On the men's side, Wheeling Park's Levi Parker is seeded first in the 200 freestyle and 100 backstroke, while John Marshall's Wyatt Jefferson is seeded first in the 100 breaststroke.

The Patriots are hoping that Parker, the captain of their boys team, can have a successful senior go-round at the conference meet.

"He's had a pretty good year, he actually won the 200 a year ago so he's a defending champ," Cook said. "I think he can have a really big meet for us, he's also a huge part of two of our relays."

For Jefferson, expectations are high for him as well.

"My expectations are first and second," Snyder said. "He's going to push whoever's first in the 200 IM, but I don't foresee him getting any lower than first in the 100 breaststroke and second in the 200 IM. Wyatt continues to strive to be the best swimmer he can be. Same with Maitlyn, him and Maitlyn swim in the same lane, they push each other at practice every day. Every year he progressively gets so much better. I'm so proud of both of them because they've both done the same thing."

Cook also highlighted Malachi Smith, Brady Bowie, Ronan Maxwell, Mallory Parks, Ella Landini, Eliana McCabe, Makyla Smith and El Green as swimmers to look out for.

Cook thought that his own team, Parkersburg South and Warren were among the contenders in the 5A boys meet, while the Monarchs would go into the girls competition as the favorite.

"I truly believe that John Marshall's girls are the team to beat," Cook said.

"Our team is full of great swimmers this year," Snyder said. "I'm taking 24 out of 28 kids to OVAC's. A lot of my swimmers are going to be in the top six or top 10. I couldn't be happier."

Snyder mentioned Brodie Baker, Dalton Brown, Adah Aubrey, Zoe Zervos, Avery Etzel, Ella Finley and Sarah Hess among her team's top pieces.

"These kids have come so far this year, I can't give them enough compliments," Snyder said. "John Marshall hasn't had this many kids seeded so high in years. We've had some stellar swimmers but we haven't had the depth that we've had this year."

Snyder couldn't recall exactly, but she surmised that the last time the Monarchs boys had won the OVAC meet was in the 1990's, while she couldn't remember any year the girls had won.

That could change on Saturday, especially when it comes to the Monarchs girls.

Brazil's Joao Fonseca is just 18 but he upset the No. 9 seed at the Australian Open

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Joao Fonseca definitively introduced himself to the world as the latest teen sensation in men's tennis on Tuesday night, upsetting No. 9 seed Andrey Rublev 7-6 (1), 6-3, 7-6 (5) in the first round of the Australian Open.

It was quite a debut in the main draw of a Grand Slam tournament for the 18-year-old Brazilian, who is currently ranked 112th and made it into the bracket at Melbourne Park by winning three matches in qualifying rounds last week.

The victory over 10-time major quarterfinalist Rublev, who is 27, lasted just under 2 1/2 hours and stretched Fonseca's current unbeaten run to 14 matches. That includes taking the title last month in Saudi Arabia at the Next Gen ATP Finals for top players who are under 21, and another trophy this month at a lower-tier Challenger tournament in Canberra.

Those within tennis have been keeping tabs on 2023 U.S. Open junior boys' champion Fonseca for a bit, intrigued by his big serve, booming groundstrokes and cool demeanor. All of those qualities, and more, were on display against Rublev in Margaret Court Arena, the second-biggest stage in Melbourne.

Fonseca got to match point with a backhand winner that he celebrated by raising his right index finger in a No. 1 gesture and nodding his head. Then he ended it with a down-the-line forehand, spreading his arms wide and tossing his head back.

"I mean, not bad," were Fonseca's first words during his on-court interview afterward.

That drew a smile from him and supportive laughter from the stands, where there were plenty of fans sporting his home country's green-yellow-and-blue flag.

"I just enjoyed every moment in this court, this amazing court," he continued. "My first time playing in a huuuuge stadium" — dragging out the "u" for emphasis.

Hitting serves at up to 133 mph (214 kph), Fonseca delivered 14 aces and had just one double-fault while saving five of the six break points he faced.

He accumulated 51 total winners, 18 more than Rublev, a quarterfinalist in Melbourne three of the past four years and Fonseca's first opponent ranked higher than No. 20.

"I was just focusing (on) my game, trying to put no pressure on myself, playing (against) a top-10 guy," Fonseca said. "I was just playing my game and, well, now we're in the second round."

He'll next face 55th-ranked Lorenzo Sonego, who got past three-time Grand Slam champion Stan Wawrinka in four sets earlier Tuesday.

Asked the key to his strong play in the tiebreakers against the far-more-experienced Rublev, Fonseca said he tries to employ "all the intensity in the important points." "go for the shots" and show "courage."

He also cited 20-time major champion Roger Federer as an inspiration.

"Like Roger says: 'Talent is not enough.' ... So I put (in) a lot of hard work," Fonseca said. "Just me and my team knows that."

in a No. 1 gesture and nodding his head. Then he ended it with a down-the-line forehand, spreading his arms wide and tossing his head back.

"I mean, not bad," were Fonseca's first words during his on-court interview afterward.

That drew a smile from him and supportive laughter from the stands, where there were plenty of fans sporting his home country's green-yellow-and-blue flag.

"I just enjoyed every moment in this court, this amazing court," he continued. "My first time playing in a huuuuge stadium" — dragging out the "u" for emphasis.

Hitting serves at up to 133 mph (214 kph), Fonseca delivered 14 aces and had just one double-fault while saving five of the six break points he faced.

He accumulated 51 total winners, 18 more than Rublev, a quarterfinalist in Melbourne three of the past four years and Fonseca's first opponent ranked higher than No. 20.

"I was just focusing (on) my game, trying to put no pressure on myself, playing (against) a top-10 guy," Fonseca said. "I was just playing my game and, well, now we're in the second round."

He'll next face 55th-ranked Lorenzo Sonego, who got past three-time Grand Slam champion Stan Wawrinka in four sets earlier Tuesday.

Asked the key to his strong play in the tiebreakers against the far-more-experienced Rublev, Fonseca said he tries to employ "all the intensity in the important points," "go for the shots" and show "courage."

He also cited 20-time major champion Roger Federer as an inspiration.

"Like Roger says: 'Talent is not enough.' ... So I put (in) a lot of hard work," Fonseca said. "Just me and my team knows that."

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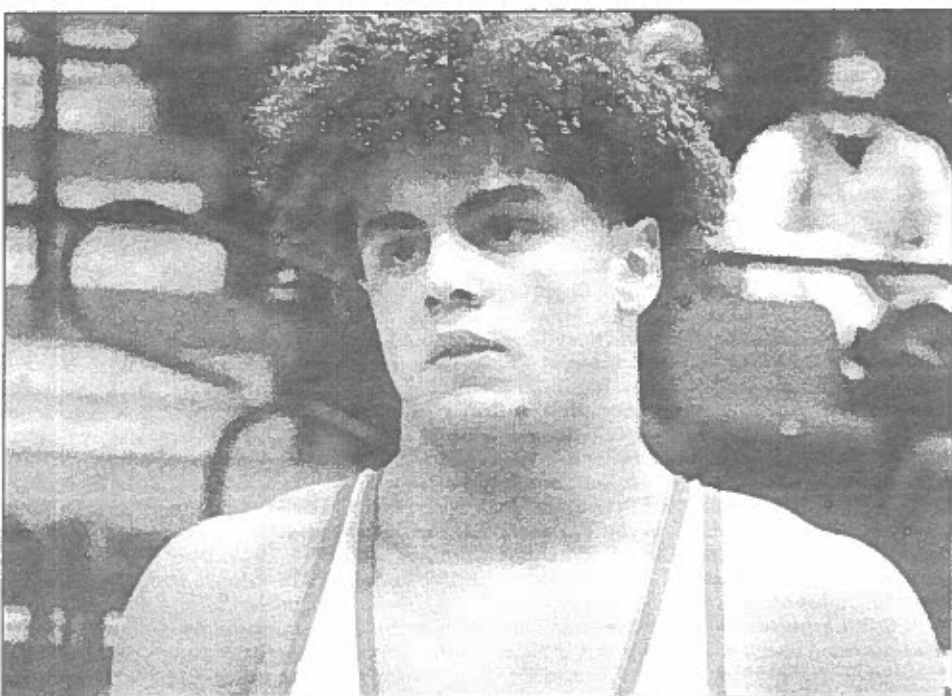
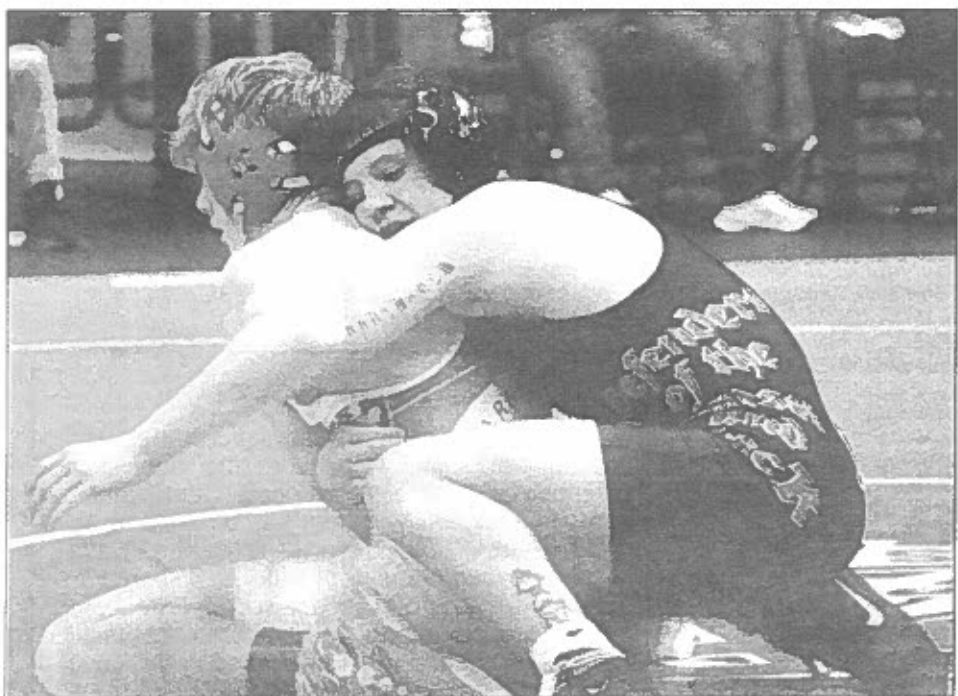
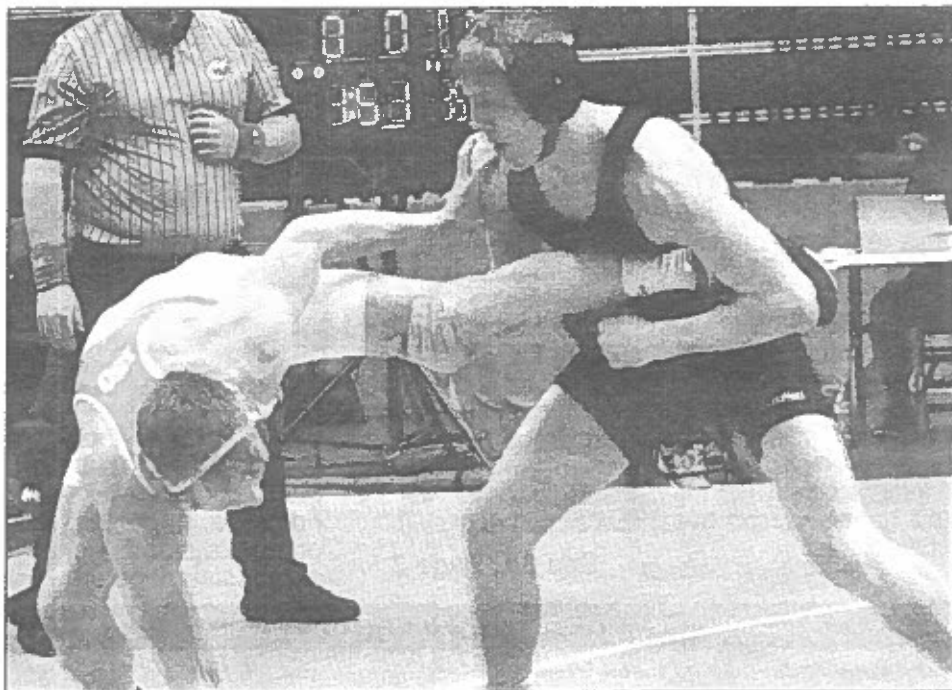
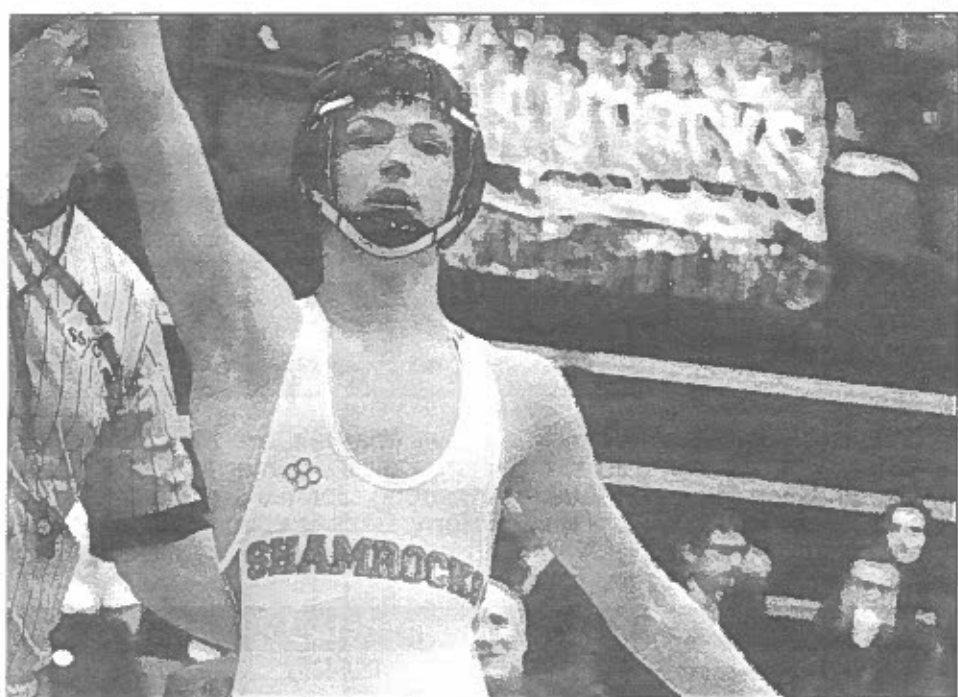

Barnesville is defending overall, Class 3A champs

• Shamrocks lost talented senior class to graduation

BARNESVILLE - For the first time in nearly four decades, Barnesville emerged victorious in the 70th annual OVAC Ron Mauck wrestling tournament last winter inside downtown Wheeling's WesBanco Arena. The Shamrocks piled up 259 points to slip past runner up University (251.5). It marked the first time since 1985 that the western Belmont County school had stood atop the podium. The Green Machine had three champions, three runner ups and 10 total placers in the top eight of their respective weight classes.

As the overall champions, the Shamrocks will carry that banner onto the main floor during the Olympic-style opening ceremonies as the 71st annual three-day event begins on Thursday, Jan. 16. "I think the kids put too much pressure on themselves as it is, so thinking about defending champions is nothing I bring up as a coach," veteran Barnesville head coach Jayson Stephen said. "The boys know the culture that's been created and expectations that go with Barnesville wrestling. So, to me, that's enough."

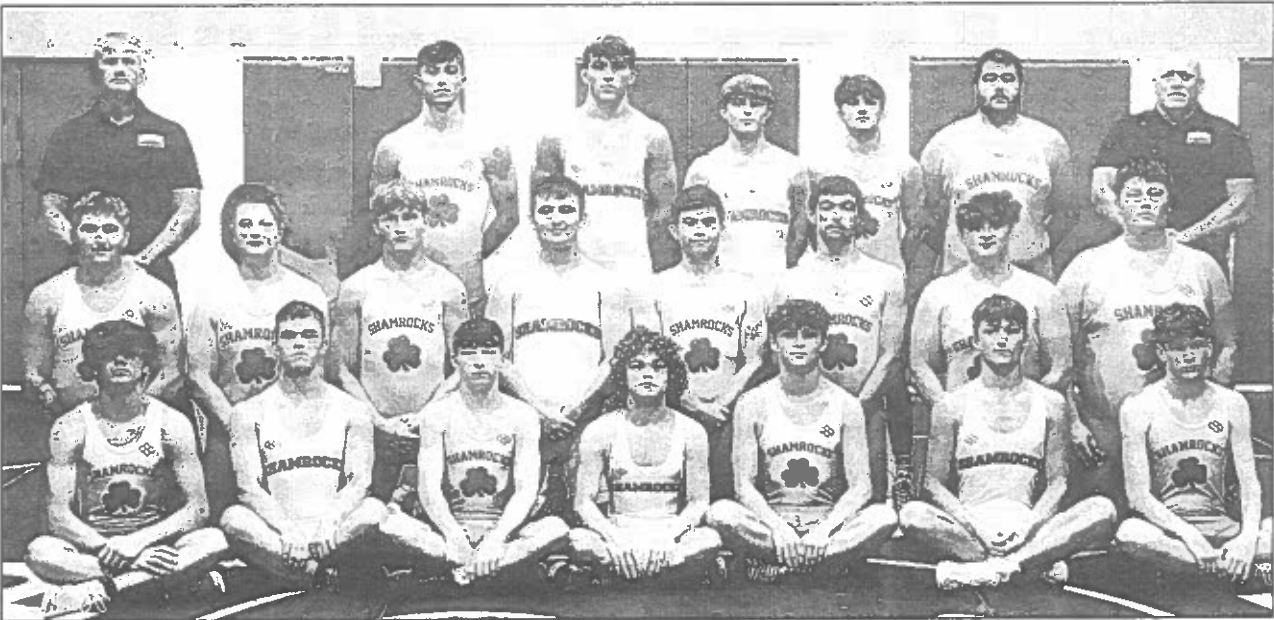

A repeat will be hard to duplicate as the Shamrocks lost two of their three champions (Dakota King and Skyler King) and all but one of their runner ups. Sophomore Colt Carpenter who won at 126 returns at 138.

Barnesville has won five straight Class 3A team titles and has 13 titles overall.

“This is a young team. They should be a top contender in 3-A,” Stephen pointed out. “They know if everyone shows up and competes to their ability they will have a great individual and team showing. It’s about believing in themselves.”

The Shamrocks do have five returning place-winners, with Carpenter leading the way. He is currently 9-2 and ranked No.1 by the OVAeC. He is 17th in Ohio Division III according to Borofan. He was also a sectional and district champion last year.

The others are sophomore Easton Stephen (106); senior Ayden Andrews (120); senior Ayden King (165) and junior Hines Ford (175).

Stephen placed sixth last year and is currently 13-6. He was an alternate state qualifier last season. He is ranked fifth by OVAeC and 22nd by

Borofan.

Andrews (10-8) finished fifth last year and was a district qualifier. He is ranked ninth by OVAeC and 20th by Borofan.

Ayden King, at 22-2, is the most decorated Shamrock. He has finished third as a freshman at the OVACs and has been runner up the past two seasons. He is a two-time state placer (3rd, 5th and a three-time sectional and district champion.

His career record is 168-30, which includes a championship at the Brecksville Holiday Invitational and a fifth-place at the prestigious Ironman event. He is ranked No. 1 by both the OVAeC and Borofan.

Ford (19-5) is four wins away from securing his 100th career triumph. He is a returning state qualifier and finished as a sectional and district runner up. He was sixth at the OVAC Tournament a year ago and is currently ranked fourth in the OVAeC and No. 6 by Borofan.

Rounding out the Shamrocks roster are senior Conner Wilson (13-6) at 113; freshman Haden Bowman (9-7) at 126; sophomore Layden Loring (10-9) at 132; sophomore Brayden Trigg (12-7) at 144; senior Eli Messenger (7-11) at 150; junior Johnathan Foster (3-8) at 157; either sophomore Austin Armstrong (8-12) or classmate Braxton Loring (6-3) at 190; sophomore Christien Han-

"Ax'zavior is a completely different wrestler this year. Last year everyone in the room was able to see the ability, it just never made it to the gym," McFarland said. "This year

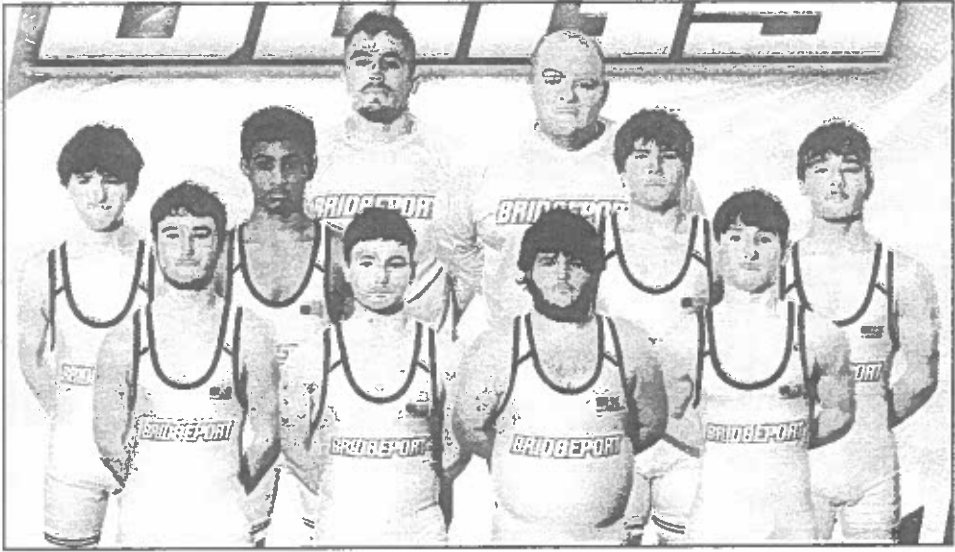

"I try to bring it down to a level where they can understand. We try to bring up the past pageantry of

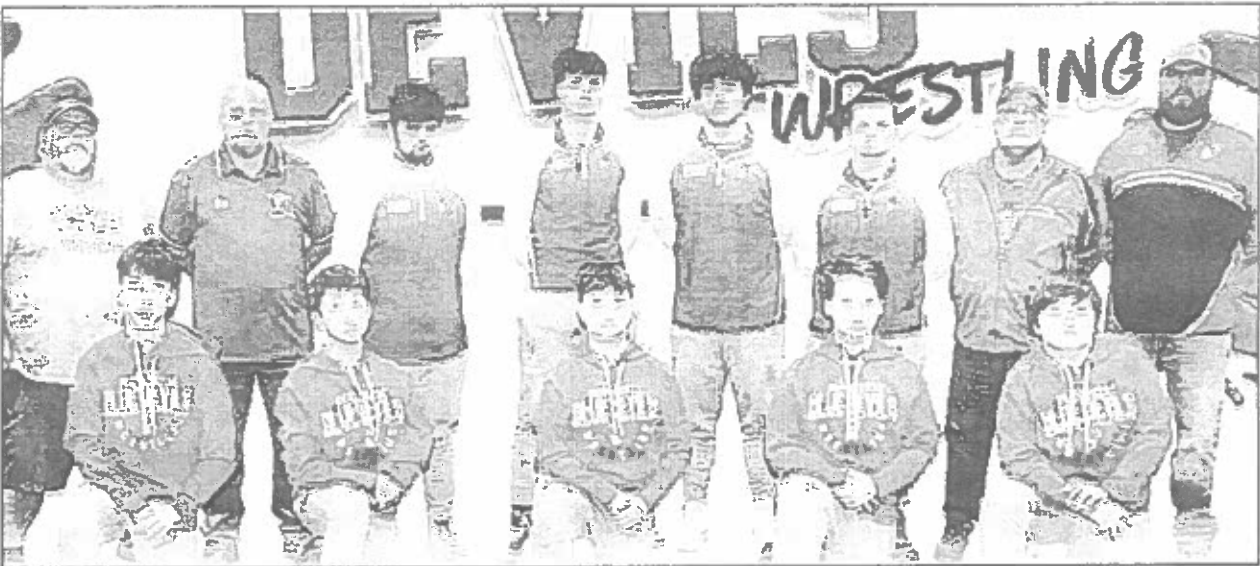

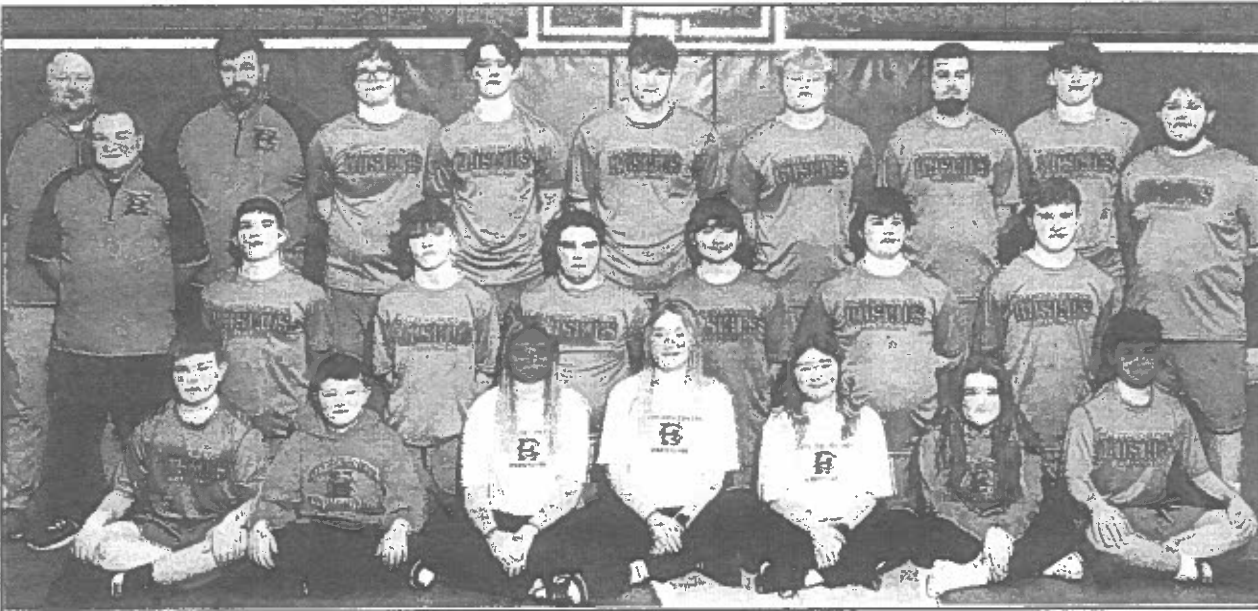

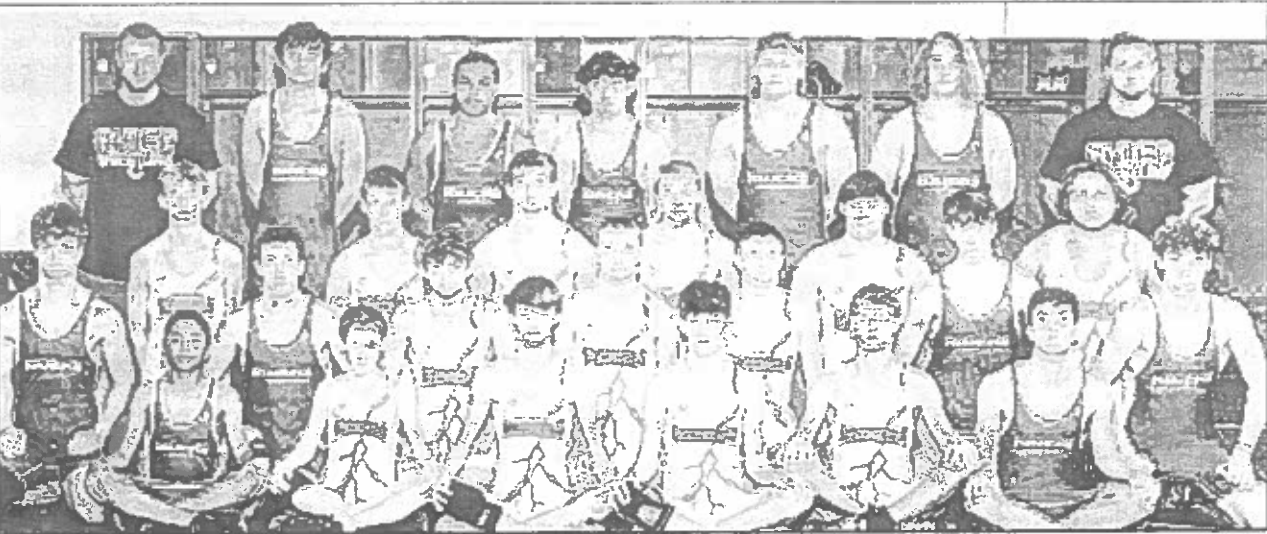

Richter is assisted by Rod Richter and Jesse Howard.

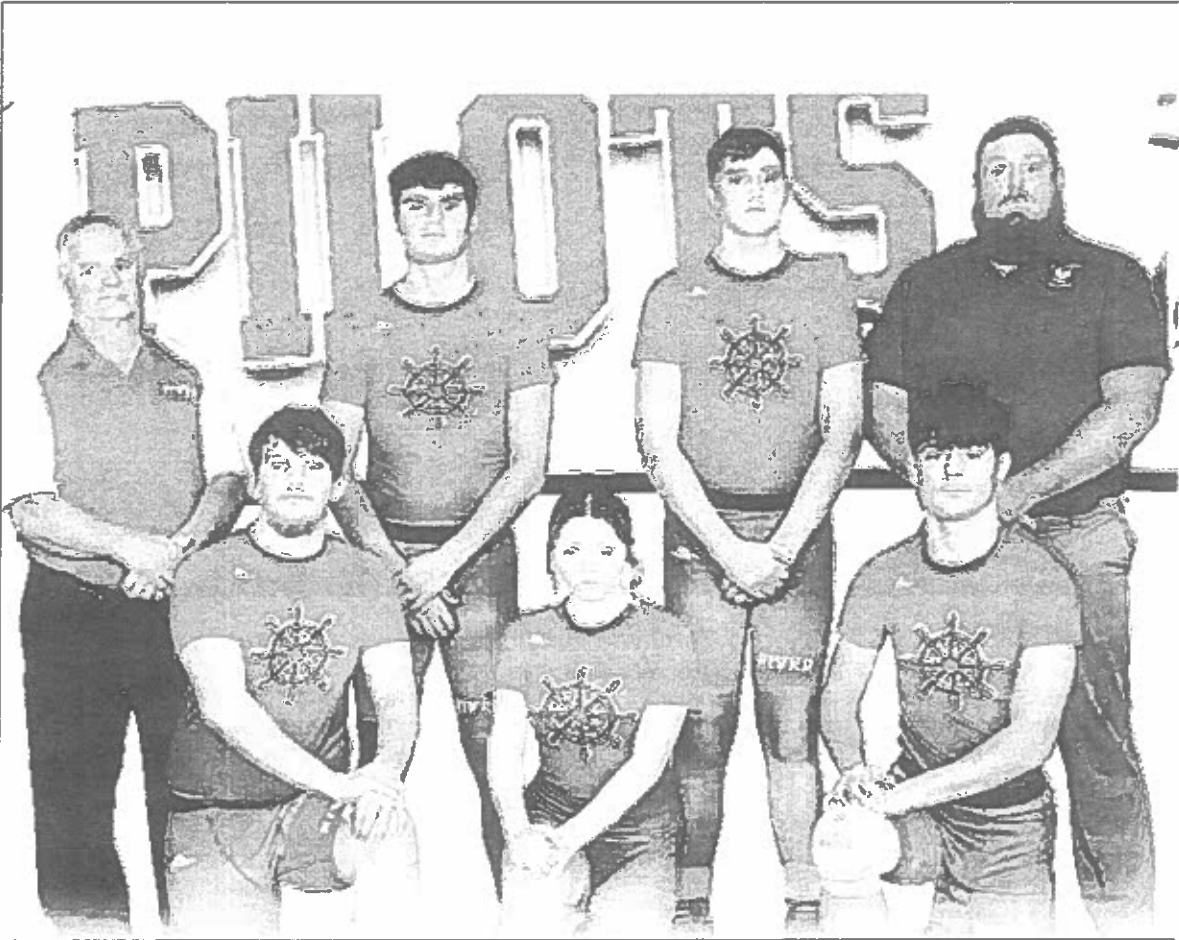

71st Annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships Press Conference Held

WHEELING - The top 12 seeds in each weight class for the 71st annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships were revealed Monday night during a press conference inside the east meeting room at WesBanco Arena.

The three-day event kicks off Thursday night with the traditional Olympic-style opening ceremonies, with wrestling beginning 30 minutes later. Action continues Friday at noon and again at 6 p.m., with Saturday's action beginning at 11 a.m. with championship semifinals. Special awards, including the prestigious Mr. Mat, will be presented at 3:30 p.m., with the championship finals

starting at 4.

"Last year was a little tough with all the snow that we received on Thursday," Tournament Director Shane Shaffer, in his second year, said. "We had to cancel Friday last year and combine some rounds to get the tournament finished, but the coaches were receptive to everything we did."

"Hopefully, cross your fingers, the weather treats us better this year," Shaffer continued.

Seven defending champions highlight the 2025 event as Steubenville and University have two each. Big Red is represented by junior Cooper Smith (144) and senior Brody Saccoccia (157), while the Hawks' senior tandem Pepper Martin (113) and Brock Ke-

hler (285) return. Barnesville sophomore Colt Carpenter (138); Beaver Local senior Bobby Buchheit (138) and Wheeling Park senior Malaki Washington (215) round out the returning titlists.

Saccoccia, who won at 150 a year ago, is a Purdue University signee and was the Bierkorte Award winner last year, while Kehler will attend West Virginia University. Martin prevailed at 106 a year ago; Carpenter won at 126 last year; Buchheit at 132; and Washington at 190.

All received top billing in their respective weight class, with the exception of Buchheit (No. 3) and Washington (No. 2).

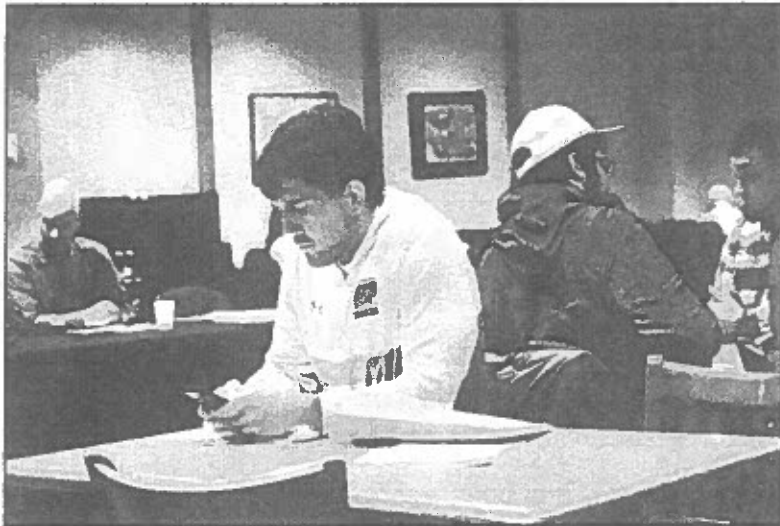
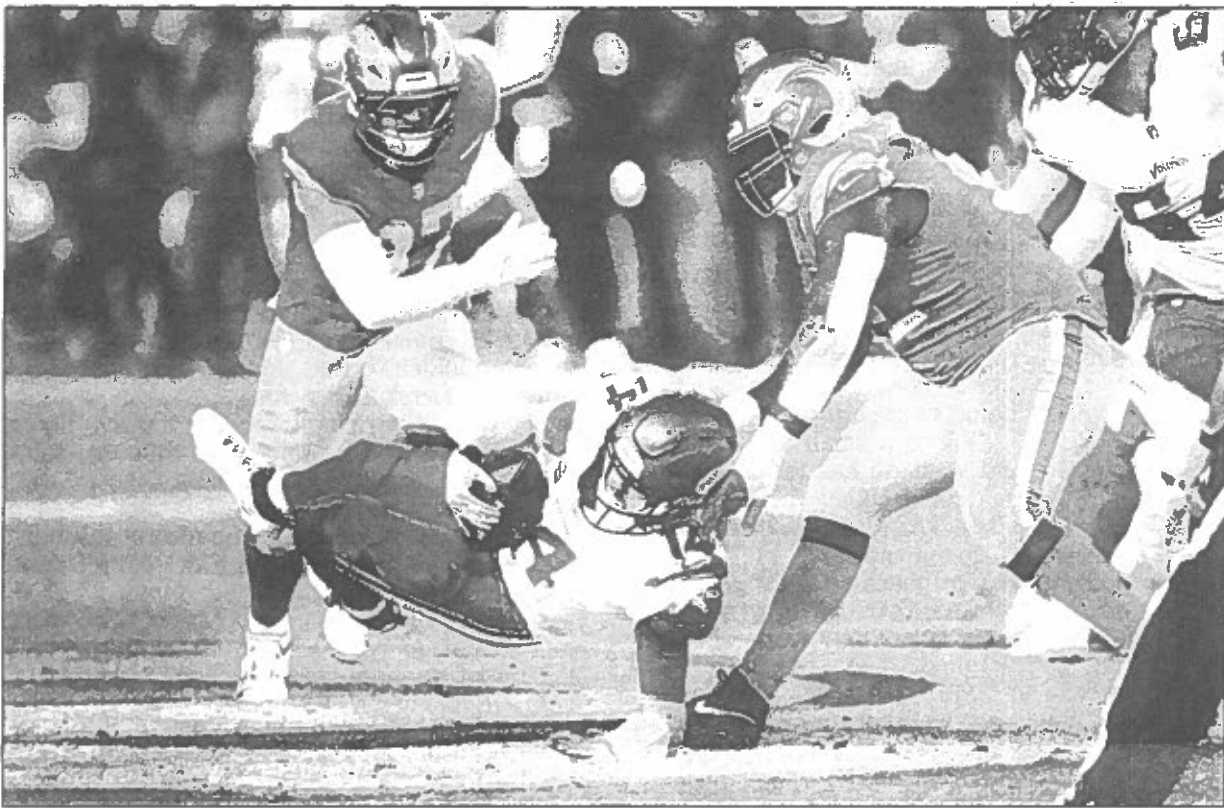

Wild Card Playoff Round Ends With Rams' Relocated Victory vs. Vikings

GLENDALE, Ariz. — Matthew Stafford threw two touchdown passes and the Los Angeles Rams overwhelmed the Minnesota Vikings, sacking Sam Darnold an NFL playoff record-tying nine times to win 27-9 Monday night in an NFC wild-card game that was moved out of Southern California because of devastating wildfires.

Rookie Jared Verse returned a fumble for a 57-yard score for the Rams (11-7), who looked comfortable in their adopted home of State Farm Stadium from the first snap. LA drove for a

touchdown on the opening drive and built a 10-0 lead by the end of the first quarter.

The game was moved to the Phoenix suburbs — nearly 400 miles east of the Rams' home in Inglewood, California — because of the wildfires that continue to burn in the Los Angeles area. LA's next game will be on the East Coast against the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday.

Verse's touchdown with 4:35 left in the second quarter gave the Rams a 17-3 lead. Darnold was under pressure from blitzing cornerback Ahkello Witherspoon when he lost the ball. The 24-year-old

Verse scooped it up and ran down the field untouched, somersaulting into the end zone.

The play sent the Rams' faithful into a frenzy — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell said some 45,000 fans made the trek from California for the game, and the 63,400-seat stadium appeared full.

It was the lowlight of a brutal first half for Darnold, who was making his first NFL playoff appearance. He was sacked five times before the break and threw an interception when Cobie Durant picked off a pass intended for Jordan Addison.

Minnesota (14-4) had a

chance to earn the NFC's top seed in the final game of the regular season, but Darnold struggled in a loss at Detroit. His poor finish raises questions about his long-term future with the Vikings after he played this season on a one-year deal.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — The year was 1894. Yale put together a football schedule that was daunting: Games on Wednesdays and Saturdays, basically every week from late September to late November, 16 contests in all.

No major college football team — what we now call the FBS level — had a 16-game season since.

Welcome to yet another new part of this rapidly changing college football world. Seasons, at least for some teams, will be longer than ever. Texas and Penn State just played their 16th

and final games of this 2024 season. And on Jan. 20 in the College Football Playoff championship game, Notre Dame and Ohio State will be playing their 16th and final games of this season in a matchup to decide the national title.

"How we got ready for the season, how we're adapting, is you have a plan, you have a team, you have a sports performance team that you listen to, and you talk through some different scenarios and you've got to be adaptable," Notre Dame coach Marcus Freeman said.

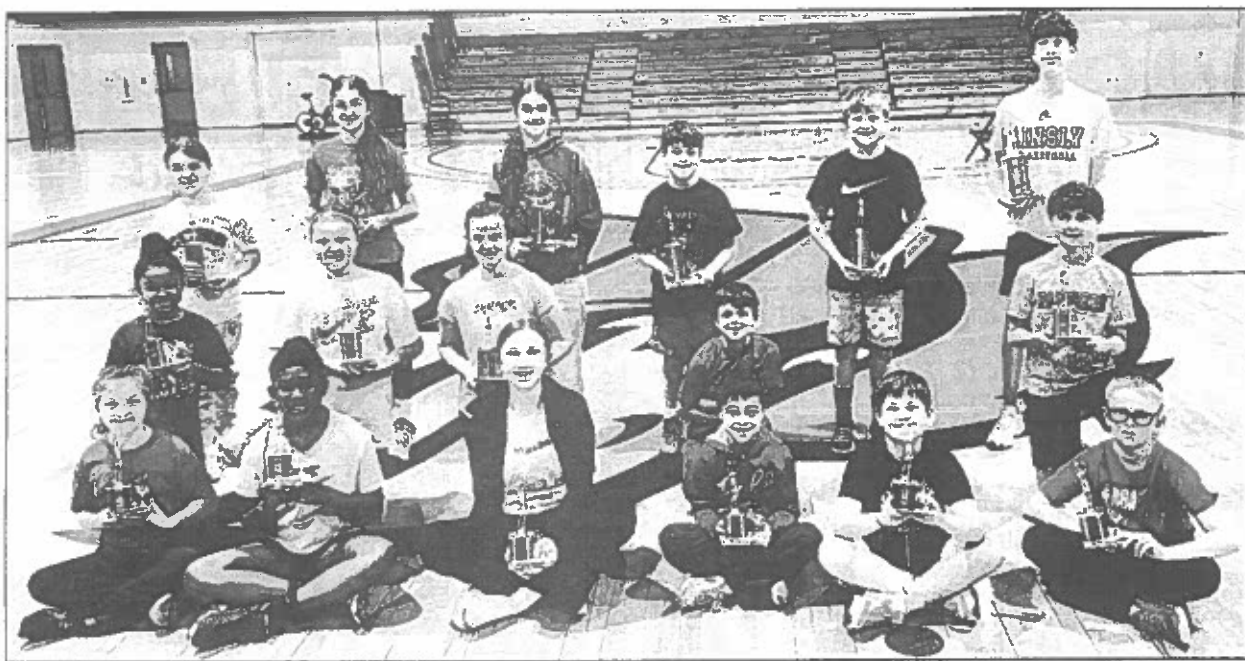

WVU Football Welcomes More New Players, Coaches

The West Virginia University football team continues to fill out its coaching offices and roster welcoming several new faces in both areas.

The Mountaineers announced Monday that they have hired former Coastal Carolina and University of South Florida offensive coordinator Travis Trickett as a senior offensive assistant. Trickett, the son of former WVU offensive line coach Rick Trickett, also spent three seasons (2019-21) as an assistant in Morgantown working with inside receivers and tight ends.

Trickett helped Coastal Carolina to an 8-5 record and a bowl win in 2023, a season where the Chanticleers ranked 19th nationally in completion percentage and 23rd in team passing efficiency. He moved to CCU after one season with USF. He also spent time as offensive coordinator at Georgia State, Florida Atlantic and Samford.

The program also announced over the weekend the hiring of Henry Weinreich as nickels/sams coach. Parker Whiteman as assistant head strength coach and director of skill development and Chuck Lillie as general manager.

Weinreich worked with WVU coach Rich Rodriguez at Jacksonville State as a graduate assistant and defensive analyst before moving to Oklahoma as a defensive analyst under current WVU defensive coordinator Zac Alley. Whiteman was head strength coach at Jacksonville State and has worked with Rodriguez at WVU, Michigan and Arizona.

Lillie was assistant general manager at Oklahoma last season, where he worked with Alley and Weinreich, and was Kansas State's director of scouting for four seasons prior to that. At West Virginia, he'll be the lead negotiator on all player acquisition deals, oversee all scouting, recruiting and roster management processes, including high school, junior college and portal recruitment and player retention.

The Mountaineers have been very active in the transfer portal over the last week, grabbing commitments from 16 players. That lineup includes former Colorado State linebacker Chase Wilson, former North Carolina State offensive lineman Robby Martin, former LSU offensive lineman Kimo Makaneole, former Youngstown State offensive lineman Wyatt Minor, former Nevada cornerback Michael Coats Jr., former Washington safety Justin Harrington, former Northern Iowa running back Tye Edwards, former Virginia Union safety William Davis, former Jacksonville State safety Fred Perry, former Tulane kicker Ethan Head, former Akron cornerback Devonte Golden-Nelson, former Jacksonville State cornerback Derek Carter, former Chattanooga safety Jordan Walker, former Arkansas offensive lineman Ty Kieast Crawford, former Iowa tight end Johnny Pascuzzi and former Wyoming edge Braden Siders.

Of specific note are Wilson, a former All-Mountain West second-team pick who recorded 205 tackles over the last two seasons; Edwards, a 6-foot-4, 230-pound back who rushed for more than 1,000 yards for NIU last season; and Martin, who was the No. 1 recruit in West Virginia in the 2024 signing class out of Huntington High School. Minor also is a West Virginia native, who played at Robert C. Byrd High School in Clarksburg.

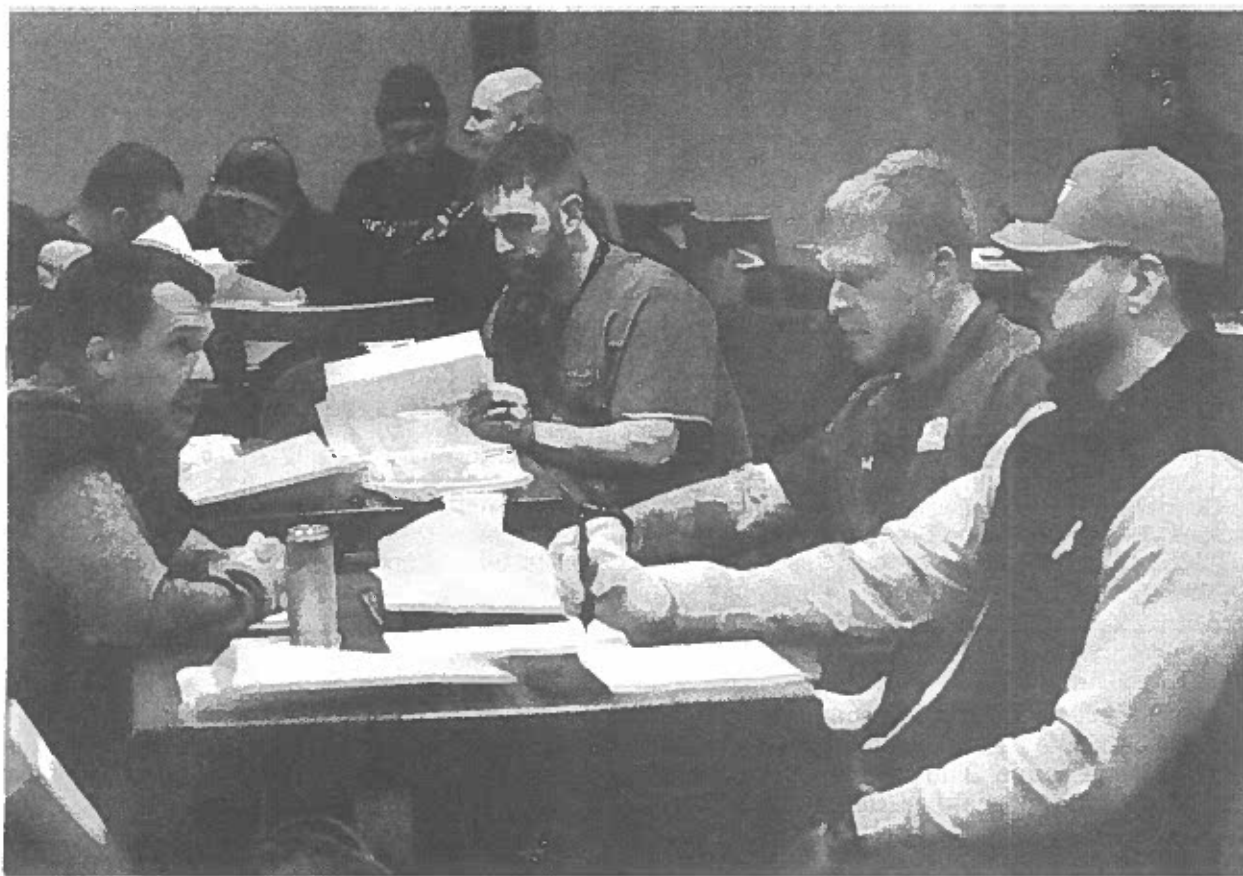

Annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships press conference held

WHEELING — The top 12 seeds in each weight class for the 71st annual OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships were revealed Monday night during a press conference inside the east meeting room at WesBanco Arena.

The three-day event kicks off Thursday night with the traditional Olympic-style opening ceremonies, with wrestling beginning 30 minutes later. Action continues Friday at noon and again at 6 p.m., with Saturday's action beginning at 11 a.m. with championship semifinals. Special awards, including the prestigious Mr. Mat, will be presented at 3:30 p.m., with the championship finals starting at 4.

"Last year was a little tough with all the snow that we received on Thursday," Tournament Director Shane Shaffer, in his second year, said. "We had to cancel Friday last year and combine some rounds to get the tournament finished, but the coaches were receptive to everything we did."

"Hopefully, cross your fingers, the weather treats us better this year," Shaffer continued.

Seven defending champions highlight the 2025 event as Steubenville and University have two each. Big Red is represented by junior Cooper Smith (144) and senior Brody Saccoccia (157), while the Hawks' senior tandem Pepper

Martin (113) and Brock Kehler (285) return. Barnesville sophomore Colt Carpenter (138); Beaver Local senior Bobby Buchheit (138) and Wheeling Park senior Malaki Washington (215) round out the returning titlists.

Saccoccia, who won at 150 a year ago, is a Purdue University signee and was the Bierkorte Award winner last year, while Kehler will attend West Virginia University. Martin prevailed at 106 a year ago; Carpenter won at 126 last year; Buchheit at 132; and Washington at 190.

All received top billing in their respective weight class, with the exception of Buchheit (No. 3) and Washington (No. 2).

Pre-tournament favorite University, which finished a close second to Barnesville last winter, had all 13 of its 14 wrestlers receive a seed, with three receiving No. 1 nods. They were Martin, Colton Gillespie (126) and Kehler.

"Everything looks good on paper but we'll see what happens after three days on the mats," University head coach Ken Maisel said. "Paper doesn't mean anything. You've still got to go out and perform. I didn't feel like we competed last weekend against Bethel Park (Pa.), so today at practice we got after it."

Steubenville checked in with 11 seeds, including Smith and Saccoccia being No. 1s. Barnesville, Beaver Local and John Marshall all came away with nine seeds, while

Cameron had seven. Of that group, only the Dragons had top seeds in seniors Slaton Pettit (150) and Klypsan Wallace (175).

"Cooper and Brody are both having outstanding seasons," Steubenville head coach Lucas Huffman said. "We look for them to wrestle well this weekend and bring back two more titles."

Huffman said practicing every day together has tremendously helped the pair.

"Those two plus Landon Crosier and Ethan Llewellyn battle every day in practice," he explained. "Iron sharpens iron."

Wheeling Park finished with seven, including No. 1 Jameson Maynard at 190. He was a champion two years ago and runner up last year.

"We're as healthy as we're going to get for the rest of the year. That's awesome," Wheeling Park first-year head coach Danny Doyle said as the Patriots were banged up in the early going. "Malaki will be wrestling for the first time this season, but watching him in practice, you could never tell he was injured. He's ready to defend his title."

Doyle said he is anxious to watch his three senior performers in Jack Lowe (150), Isaac Sands (165) and Maynard. Lowe and Sands are both seeded third.

"All of those guys have had steady careers," he noted.

OSU favored by 9 1/2 points over Notre Dame, 2nd-largest spread in CFP title game history

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Ohio State ended the regular season with many questions about its program under coach Ryan Day after the Buckeyes were upset by rival Michigan 13-10 on Nov. 30.

Now, the Buckeyes not only are in the College Football Playoff national championship game on Jan. 20 against Notre Dame in Atlanta, they are the second-biggest favorites in the title game since the playoff began 10 years ago.

BetMGM Sportsbook and Caesars Sportsbook each had Ohio State favored by 9 1/2 points on Saturday.

The only larger line for the championship game, according to Vegas Insider, occurred two years ago when Georgia was favored by 13 1/2 over TCU.

The Bulldogs easily covered with a 65-7 victory. Four years ago, Alabama was favored by nine over Ohio State and won 52-24.

CBS SportsLine handicapper Bruce Marshall said he doesn't see this matchup playing out anywhere close to those games, arguing that the Buckeyes will be pushed by Notre Dame.

"Way too high, way too high, way too high," Marshall said of the point spread. "They're not going to roll over these guys. I don't think, unless something crazy happens."

Notre Dame, Ohio State in new territory: They're playing 16-game seasons for the 1st time

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) — The year was 1894. Yale put together a football schedule that was daunting: Games on Wednesdays and Saturdays, basically every week from late September to late November, 16 contests in all.

No major college football team — what we now call the FBS level — had a 16-game season since. Until now.

Welcome to yet another new part of this rapidly changing college football world. Seasons, at least for some teams, will be longer than ever. Texas and Penn State just played their 16th and final games of this 2024 season. And on Jan. 20 in the College Football Playoff championship game, Notre Dame and Ohio State will be playing their 16th and final games of this season in a matchup to decide the national title.

"How we got ready for the season, how we're adapting, is you have a plan, you have a team, you have a sports performance team that you listen to, and you talk through some different scenarios and you've got to be adaptable," Notre Dame coach Marcus Freeman said. "You've got to be willing to adapt based off the unpredictable things that can happen, and that's what we've been able to do — and I feel like our guys will be physically ready to roll."

The 16-game season didn't come out of nowhere.

Caesars head of football Joey Feazel said most of the early betting has come in on the Fighting Irish, "which is slightly surprising as it has been an onslaught of Ohio State action for the past three weeks. I expect this line to come down slightly towards Notre Dame as we get closer to game time and expect this national championship to be slower-paced."

BetMGM trading manager Seamus Magee called the early action "very balanced, which we expect to continue throughout the week. Slightly higher volume on Ohio State money line, but certainly some interest in Notre Dame as well. We anticipate the book to need an outright Buckeyes win, which is also favorable from a futures perspective."

Ohio State rolled through the first two rounds of the playoffs, beating Tennessee 42-17 and topping previously undefeated and top-ranked Oregon 41-21 in a game that wasn't even that close.

The final score in the Buckeyes' 28-14 victory over Texas in Friday night's semifinal also was de-

ceiving, but for different reasons. The Longhorns had a chance to pull even with first-and-goal at the 1-yard line before Ohio State's defense came up with a dominant goal-line stand, capped by Jack Sawyer's strip-sack that he returned for an 83-yard touchdown.

That play was set up by an outside run on second down that Ohio State stopped for a 7-yard loss.

"Ohio State was very fortunate (Friday) night," Marshall said. "I cannot believe Texas ran that play at second-and-1 at the goal line. They're ready to tie the game. That thing's going to overtime."

Notre Dame got to the title game by beating Indiana 27-17, Georgia 23-10 and Penn State 27-24.

"You really saw this against Penn State, they've got speed," Marshall said. "They're not slow at all. They have almost SEC-type speed on that team."

Marshall pointed out that the Irish have covered the past 11 point spreads and are 22-6 against the line going back to last season.

"I think Notre Dame could win, I really do," Marshall said.

Expanding the CFP to 12 teams meant that the teams in the national championship game would have to play either three or four games — depending on whether they got a first-round bye or not. With a 12-game regular season and then a conference championship game for some schools, it's almost certain that the national finalists in this system will have to play at least 16 games along the way.

Notre Dame and Ohio State each played 13-game seasons last year. Playing 16-game seasons this year could obviously be considered problematic — it's a lot more wear and tear on bodies — but it's also a wonderful problem to have, since it comes with a chance at a national championship.

"Along the way, we looked at a lot of different things and metrics about playing this many games, playing our 16th game, what that was going to be like," Ohio State coach Ryan Day said. "We knew it was going to be a little bit of a battle of attrition at times. So, depth was certain-

ly a critical part of roster management and talent acquisition, but also how we practice, how we play. We've taken all those things into consideration so that we're still really, really fresh going into the end of the season."

Only three teams at the "major college" level played the 16-game season before this year: Yale in 1894, Penn in 1892 and Yale in 1889. It has happened a handful of times at the FCS and Division II levels as well.

But at the FBS level, it hasn't happened in 130 years.

It has created new challenges for fans and quite possibly their pocketbooks — Notre Dame and Ohio State each had an extra home game, plus now three bowl games, and none of those tickets were exactly low-priced. It surely has created an issue or two on the academic end: Ohio State's spring term started last week, Notre Dame's spring semester started Monday. And in many cases, players on both teams have simply logged more plays, hits and miles than ever before.

Oh, and while this season is

ending, next season is in full swing. Players have transferred. Recruits have signed. Coaches have been hired and fired at plenty of schools, and teams are putting together their spring practice schedules.

But in South Bend and Columbus, it still may as well be 2024.

"I've been an advocate that we need to go to an NFL calendar," Duke coach Manny Diaz said. "We need to get rid of spring football and move into early summer OTAs and mini-camps. We don't have to invent this. The league has already figured it out. ... We're a spring sport now. We need to just act like that."

Notre Dame defensive coordinator Al Golden looks at the marathon season as a blessing in some ways. On one hand, it's a ton of work. On the other, the Irish are playing for a ring. He's not complaining.

"Most of these guys are navigating it as we go. Nobody's done it before in college," Golden said. "We listen to what the data says and go by it. It's just an interesting time."

Marquette was next at No. 7 as the only team to stay at the same spot from last week, followed by Kentucky, preseason No. 1 Kansas and Houston to round out the top 10.

No. 12 Michigan State and No. 20 Michigan had the week's biggest jumps, each rising four spots. Florida and No. 17 Purdue were next by climbing three positions.

While Tennessee's tumble was notable, No. 19 Illinois had the week's biggest slide by falling six spots after a weekend home loss to Southern California.

Two-time reigning national champion UConn matched the Volunteers' five-spot decline, checking in at No. 14 after last

week's loss at Villanova.

Six teams that were ranked last week moved down in Monday's poll.

No. 23 Georgia, No. 24 Wisconsin and No. 25 Baylor were the week's new additions. And for Georgia, it's been a while.

Mike White's Bulldogs (14-2) have their first AP Top 25 ranking since spending a week at No. 24 in January 2011. That lone appearance had stood as the program's only time being ranked since the 2002-03 season, but the Bulldogs are coming off a week that featured wins against then-No. 6 Kentucky and then-No. 17 Oklahoma for the program's first back-to-back victories against ranked opponents since the 2006-07 season.

Soto among 13 free agents to receive \$21.05M qualifying offers

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Juan Soto, Corbin Burnes and Willy Adames were among 13 free agents who received \$21.05 million qualifying offers on Monday.

Pete Alonso, Alex Bregman and Max Fried also were given the one-year offer before Monday's deadline. Players have until 4 p.m. EST on Nov. 19 to accept.

If they do, they will be under contract with their 2024 club for another season. If they decline and sign elsewhere, their new team must forfeit draft picks and their previous orga-

nization will receive at least one draft pick as compensation.

In other news Monday, ace pitcher Gerrit Cole decided to remain with the New York Yankees rather than become a free agent.

As a 5 p.m. EST deadline approached, both sides agreed to rescind their rights and worked out the language with Major League Baseball and the players' association.

"Maybe the grass isn't always greener," Yankees general manager Brian Cashman said. "I think he's happy where

he's at."

Atlanta picked up All-Star designated hitter Marcell Ozuna's \$16 million option for 2025 and turned down options on right-hander Luke Jackson and catcher Travis d'Arnaud.

Jackson's option was for \$7 million with a \$2 million buyout, and d'Arnaud's option was for \$8 million with no buyout.

Texas pitcher Nathan Eovaldi became a free agent after declining a \$20 million option for next season with the Rangers. Eovaldi will get a \$2 million buyout from an option that vested when he threw more

than 300 innings over his two years with Texas.

After losing to the Los Angeles Dodgers in the World Series last week, the Yankees made a qualifying offer as expected to Soto — the biggest prize on the free agent market.

Fellow outfielder Teoscar Hernandez received a qualifying offer from the Dodgers.

Perhaps the biggest surprise among the group was Boston pitcher Nick Pivetta, who went 6-12 with a 4.14 ERA in 145 2/3 innings this year.

Coming off a surprising run to the National League Cham-

pionship Series, the New York Mets made qualifying offers to Alonso and starting pitchers Sean Manaea and Luis Severino.

Baltimore offered Burnes and outfielder Anthony Santander.

No other team made more than one qualifying offer.

Other players given the offer were Arizona first baseman Christian Walker and Cincinnati right-hander Nick Martinez. Adames was offered by Milwaukee, Bregman by Houston, and Fried by Atlanta.

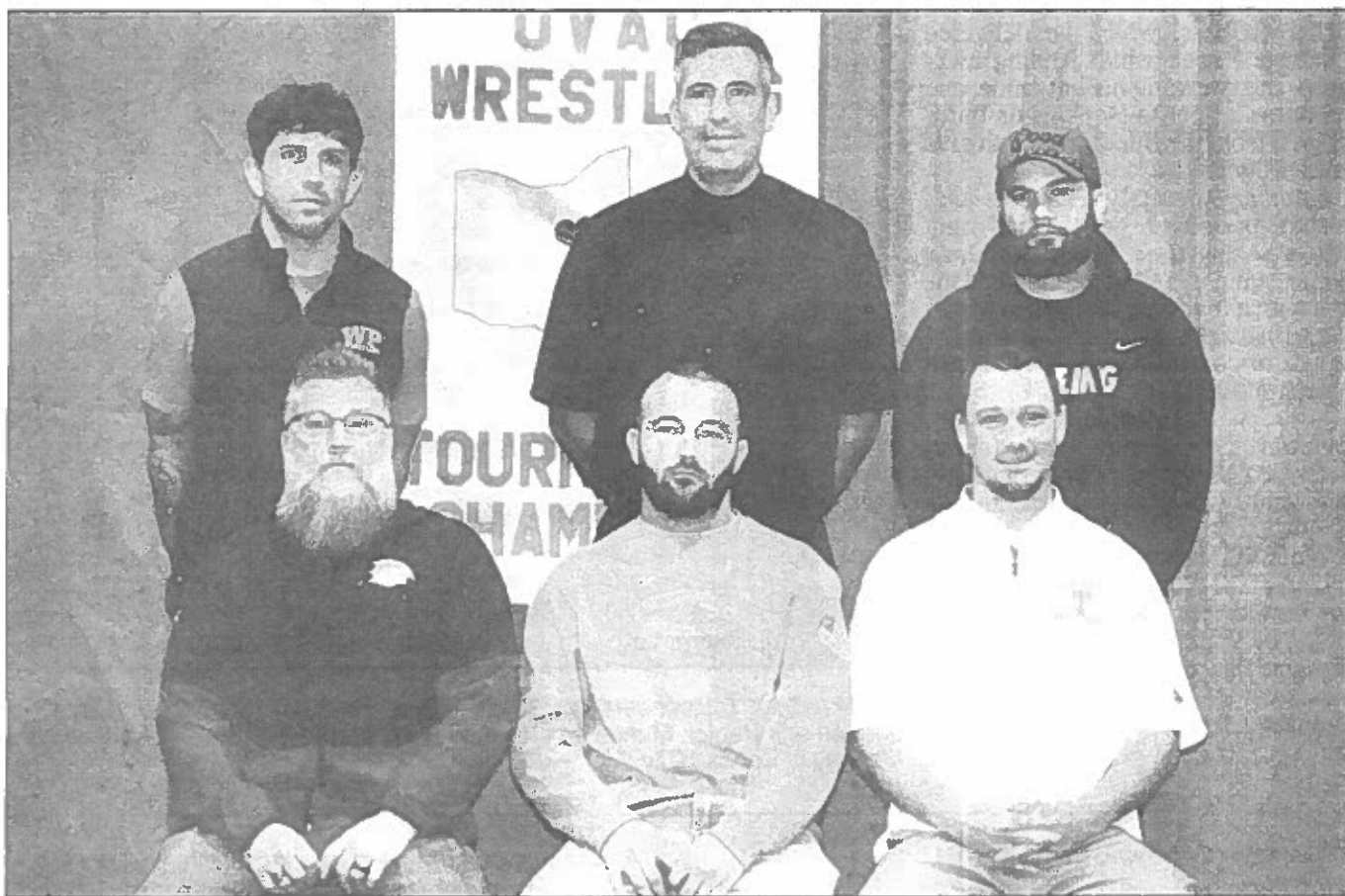

Steelers CB Sutton returns from suspension hoping to find a role on elite defense

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Cam Sutton doesn't believe he has to prove anything to anyone as the Pittsburgh Steelers veteran defensive back tries to hit the reset button on his career.

Sitting at his locker on Monday, his first full day back at work in two months after serving an eight-game suspension for violating the league's personal conduct policy, the 29-year-old is more focused on trying to carve out a niche on a team that did just fine without him.

The Steelers enter the second half of the season atop the AFC North at 6-2, with undrafted rookie free agent Beanie Bishop and his three interceptions doing just fine while taking some of the snaps Sutton's absence created.

Sutton hasn't been invisible during the suspension — he said he's been able to sit in on some meetings, for example — but now finds himself, as coach Mike Tomlin likes to put it frequently, trying to hop on a moving train.

"I've been working and doing everything I need to do to stay ready," Sutton said.

And move on from a difficult chapter in both his career and his life.

Sutton spent the first six seasons of his career in Pittsburgh creating a role that relied heavily on his versatility before signing a \$33 million deal with Detroit in the spring of 2023. He lasted just one year with the Lions, who released him in March after a warrant was issued for Sutton's arrest in Florida stemming from a domestic incident.

The case ended with Sutton entering a pretrial diversion program in April after the charges were reduced from a felony to misdemeanor battery. His agreement with prosecutors required Sutton to take a mental health evaluation.

The Steelers took a flyer on Sutton, bringing him back on a one-year contract in June well aware that he still faced potential discipline from the league. He filled in at a variety of positions during training camp before serving his suspension.

Sutton is eager to do whatever is asked on a defense ranked second in the NFL in points allowed, fourth in takeaways and ninth in yards.

"I play football man," he said. "I don't care what position it is. I could be on offensive line, I really don't care."

Pittsburgh is relatively set at cornerback, where Joey Porter Jr. has spent his second season showing signs of becoming one of the elite players at the position and Donte Jackson has already picked off three passes.

Tampa Bay promptly went three-and-out, but its defense got the ball right back, and this time Mayfield calmly led his team down field. His capped the drive with a touchdown throw to Miller — his first career TD catch — with 27 seconds to go, and Tampa Bay elected to play for overtime.

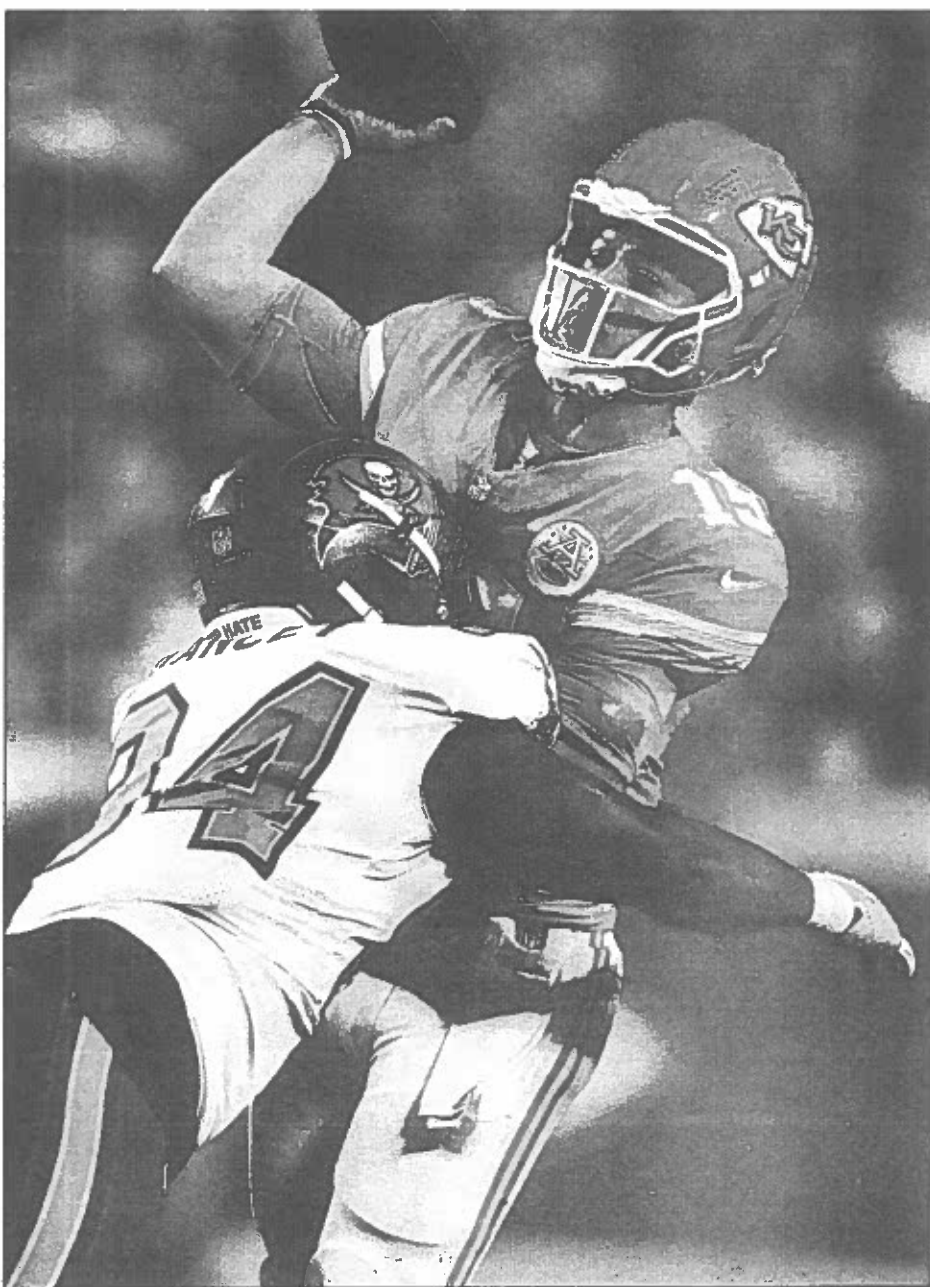

Sutton figures to fit more into the nickel position he thrived at during his first stint with the team, though Bishop, an undrafted rookie free agent out of West Virginia, has more than held his own.

"He's just really enjoying ball right now," Sutton said of Bishop. "Just taking every day one day at a time and good things are happening for him."

Linebacker Patrick Queen doesn't see Sutton's return as a threat to Bishop's playing time, but a chance for one of the league's best defenses to get even better.

"(He's) a physical cat, a guy who can cover," Queen said. "Just the utmost confidence that he's going to communicate real well."

The defense Sutton returned to doesn't look much different than the one he left after 2022. Minkah Fitzpatrick is still quarterbacking the defense from his safety spot. T.J. Watt and Alex Highsmith are still one of the best edge rush tandems in the league. Cam Heyward is still a problem for opponents at defensive tackle.

If anything, the Steelers have only evolved on that side of the ball, mixing it up with different substitu-

tion packages that can create matchup issues.

"We're doing a great job of just giving teams different looks, getting after quarterbacks how we should and obviously winning the field position game, getting off the field and causing turnovers and getting the ball back for our offense," Sutton said.

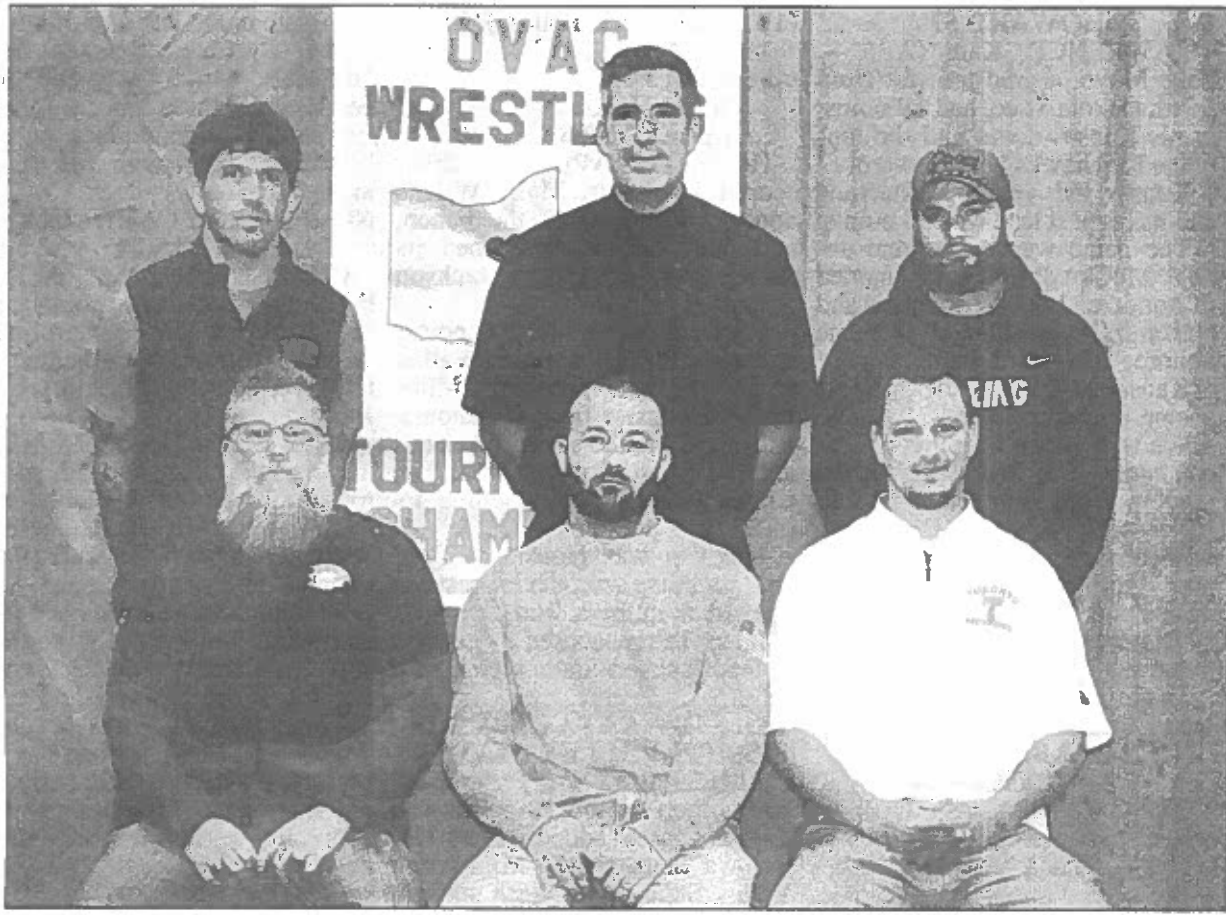

Koonz Ready To Lead WVU Defense

Jeff Koonz doesn't look at his new job on the West Virginia University football coaching staff as a promotion. To him, it's an obligation.

"This is an opportunity right now for us to play really good football in the month of November as a defense and as a team," WVU's new defensive coordinator said Monday. "And that's the objective. That's how I look at it."

WVU head coach Neal Brown named Koonz defensive coordinator for the rest of the season last Tuesday, at the same time he announced the dismissal of former defensive coordinator Jordan Lesley.

The WVU defense sits near the bottom of several defensive metrics nationally, part of the reason the Mountaineers (4-4, 3-2 Big 12) haven't enjoyed the success they hoped to have this year.

Now West Virginia enters the home stretch of the regular season, starting with Saturday's noon contest at Cincinnati (FS1). The Mountaineers want to finish the season strong like they did last year, when it won four of its last five regular season games and beat North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl. To reach that level, both Koonz and Brown know WVU has to play better defense.

A key part of that process, Koonz said, is for WVU's defense to be better organized and more

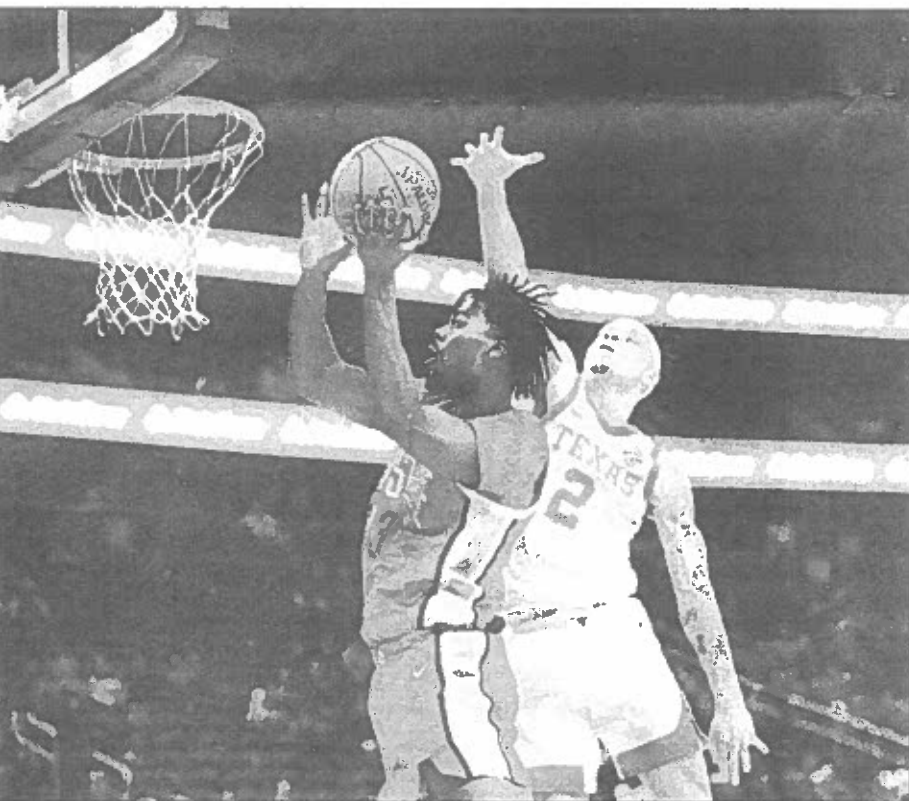
consistent. Inconsistency is a term that has been used too often to describe the defense's performance, he added, and that must change.

"We've got to get lined up as fast as possible," Koonz said. "We've got to make sure that all 11 guys on that field understand what the call is, how to execute the call, and what success they should expect after that call. And I say that the confidence that comes with understanding exactly what we're trying to accomplish with each and every single call that is made is paramount right now. And that's what we've got to make sure of on every play - when you're up by 10, down by 10, doesn't matter."

WVU coaches hope that will help the defense improve in some crucial areas. It currently sits among the nation's worst in categories like third- and fourth-down conversions allowed, plays of 30 yards or more allowed, passing yards allowed per game and passing yards allowed per attempt.

Brown said he's confident Koonz, the Mountaineers' inside linebackers coach, is up to the task. Koonz has succeeded in whatever leadership roles Brown has handed him, including that of WVU's special team's coordinator. Koonz has been a co-defensive coordinator at both Cincinnati and North Texas, calling the defensive plays at Cincinnati.

When it was all said and done, the Mountaineers were efficient with their shots, going 33 of 60 (55%), connecting on 14 3-pointers — nine in the first half — and came up with eight blocked shots on defense.

Scire Harris "is a tremendous defender," WVU point guard Javon Small said. "Him having three blocks didn't surprise me at all. I think guys are just a little more bought in into what we want to do. We just play hard on both ends of the floor."

He filled in at a variety of positions during training camp before serving his suspension.

Sutton is eager to do whatever is asked on a defense ranked second in the NFL in points allowed, fourth in takeaways and ninth in yards.

"I play football man," he said. "I don't care what position it is. I could be on offensive line, I really don't care."

Pittsburgh is relatively set at cornerback, where Joey Porter Jr. has spent his second season showing signs of becoming one of the elite players at the position and Dontae Jackson has already picked off three passes.

Sutton figures to fit more into the nickel position he thrived at during his first stint with the team, though Bishop, an undrafted rookie free agent out of West Virginia, has more than held his own.

"He's just really enjoying ball right now," Sutton said of Bishop. "Just taking every day one day at a time and good things are happening for him."

J'wan Roberts had 14 points and six rebounds, Ramon Walker Jr. chipped in 10 points and Milos Uzan, a transfer from Oklahoma, had eight points, seven rebounds and 10 assists for Houston. The Cougars shot 58%, including 12 of 20 on 3-pointers.

The win was Houston's 23rd straight home win, the longest active streak in the nation.

Jalen Tatum scored 14 points to lead Jackson State, which shot 28%.

NO. 5 IOWA STATE 83, MISSISSIPPI VALLEY STATE 44

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Keshon Gilbert scored 17 points and Tamin Lipsey added 16 as No. 5 Iowa State routed Mississippi Valley State for its 28th straight home win.

Saint Mary's transfer Joshua Jefferson added 10 points, six rebounds and four steals in his first game with the Cyclones.

Donovan Sanders had 12 points and Greg Moore added 10 for the Delta Devils, who won one game

last season and are picked to finish last in the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

The Cyclones led 44-21 at half, and the bulge grew to as many as 42 points in the last five minutes.

The Cyclones finished with 16 steals, with Lipsey and Gilbert making three apiece. Lipsey moved into eighth place on the ISU career chart with 172 steals in his 70 games.
