

Cheerleaders bring OVAC first place home for Bulldogs

BRIDGEPORT — The cheerleaders at Bridgeport High won top honors at the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference match Feb. 1 and made Bulldogs history with their first win at that level.

Bridgeport's eight cheerleaders competed against cheer teams from six other schools across the Ohio Valley and won the Small School Non-Tumbling Division at WesBanco Arena in Wheeling. The Bridgeport team won by 15 points.

The district held an assembly Feb. 4 to celebrate Senior Abbie Bennett Rush, juniors Ariel Bennett Rush, Chloe Cuiksa, Liberty Chambers and Taelor Bowers, sophomore Jaicee Bradac, and freshmen Olivia Salm and Isabella Hilliard.

High School Principal Jack Fisher said this is a change for the cheerleaders, who are normally raising spirits for others. "We finally get to cheer and congratulate them," he said.

Fisher and High School Cheer Coach Kaylynn Yates thanked the team in front of cheering students in the stands. The cheerleaders then performed one of their routines for the crowd.

Yates said the cheerleaders were overjoyed by the decisive victory.

"They just cheered with excitement and cried," she said.

"This is the first time that they've won OVAC ever," she said, adding the win came after some very close prior competitions at the state level.

The cheerleaders give their all as the sport with the longest season, from June through January. Yates is proud of the

Steelers tapped for first regular-season NFL game in Ireland

NEW ORLEANS (AP)

— Dublin will host Ireland's first NFL regular-season game when the Pittsburgh Steelers play at historic Croke Park in 2025, the league announced Friday, two days before the Chiefs and Eagles meet in the Super Bowl.

The Irish capital joins Madrid and Berlin as first-time hosts next season as the league expands its global footprint. It announced earlier this week that an NFL game would be played at the iconic Melbourne Cricket Ground in Australia in 2026.

The Steelers have long-standing ties to the Emerald Isle and a partnership with the Gaelic Athletic Association, which operates Croke Park, the principal national stadium of Ireland. The date and Pittsburgh's opponent will be announced this spring.

"I think the emotion you hear from all of us is the excitement to bring a regular-season game to Ireland with the Steelers, and how special that will be, and yes, it ultimately comes back to the fans," said Peter O'Reilly, the NFL's executive vice

president. "A lot of people are excited about."

As of the 2025 season, the NFL can schedule up to eight regular-season games internationally.

London will stage three next season — the Browns and Jets will be home teams for games at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium and the Jets for a game at Wembley Stadium. The Colts will serve as the home team for the Berlin game at the Olympic Stadium and the Dolphins will be the hosts at the Bernabeu, the home stadium of Spanish soccer club Real Madrid.

The league also has considered having a team play back-to-back weeks in different European cities.

The Steelers played the Bears in a 1997 pre-season game at Croke Park, which has a capacity of more than 82,000, while college football games have been played in Ireland dating back to the old Emerald Isle Classic in the late 1980s.

Notre Dame played Navy at Croke Park in 1996 and Penn State played UCF there in 2014.

For the last three years, the Aer Lingus

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Wheeling Central defeats Bellaire for spot in 3A championship

WHEELING — The top-seeded Wheeling Central Maroon Knights are heading to the ECO Center after a 72-45 semifinals victory over No. 4 Bellaire in the 3A OVAC Tournament semifinals, riding a big second half to a big win against the Big Reds.

"The girls are very excited to go play at the ECO Center," Wheeling Central head coach Roberta Olejask said. "They're pumped. That's a goal, to play for championships, and they get to play for the OVAC title."

The Knights received 23 points from junior forward Bella Fitzsimmons, who made seven 3-pointers to help reach her total.

Kaitlyn Blake and Seneca Heller each had double-doubles for Wheeling Central, Blake

scoring 19 points to go with 10 rebounds, and Heller scoring 11 points with 10 assists.

Zara Harveth and Tamya Morgan each scored a dozen for Bellaire, Harveth rounding out her statline with nine rebounds four steals and seven assists. Eliana Mason had six assists or her own.

Bellaire and Central were almost dead-even in the rebounding battle, 31-30 Big Reds, and the Knights had an advantage with a 16-9 turnover differential and 9-5 3-point-shooting difference.

"I thought Central played a heck of a game and shot the ball really well," Bellaire head coach John Farrier said. "I thought we were too loose with the ball and had too many turnovers."

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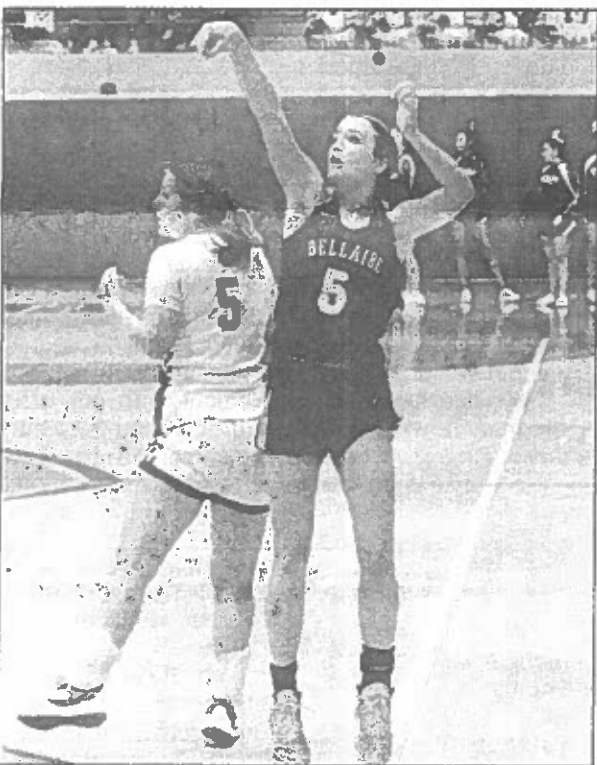

Shadyside Tigers take 1st at OVAC Cheer Competition

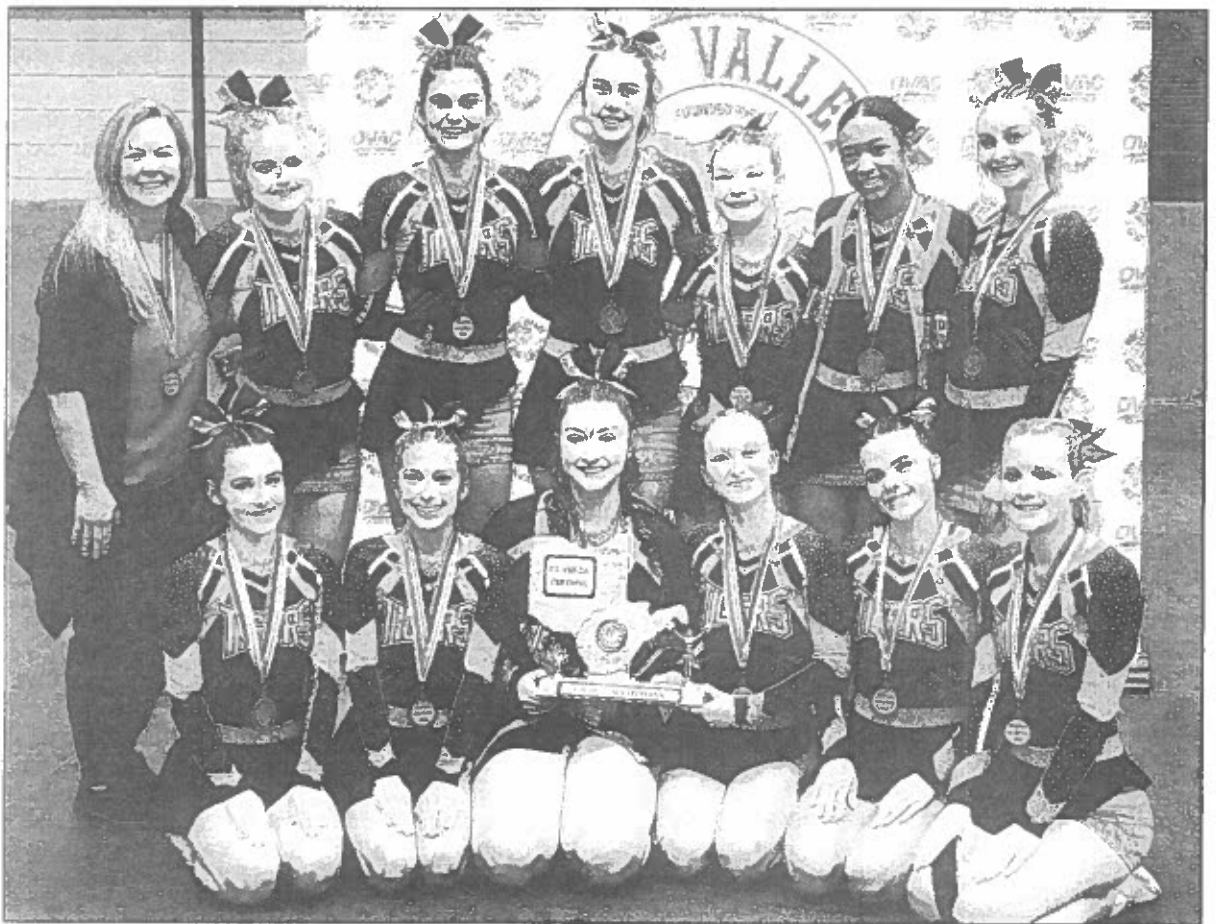

more seasons under a five-year, \$125 million extension he signed in 2020.

"As a kid dreaming of the NFL, all I focused on was the ultimate goal of winning a Super Bowl — and that goal fuels me today more than ever," Garrett said in his statement. "My love for the community of Northeast Ohio and the incredible fanbase of the Cleveland Browns has made this one of the toughest decisions of my life. These past eight years have shaped me into the man that I am today."

"While I've loved calling this city my home, my desire to win and compete on the biggest stages won't allow me to be complacent. The goal was never to go from Cleveland to Canton, it has always been to compete for and win a Super Bowl. With that in mind, I have requested to be traded from the Cleveland Browns."

Garrett, The Associated Press NFL defensive player of the year last season, is a finalist for the award again. His 14 sacks ranked second in the league, and he became the first player in NFL history to record 14 or more in four consecutive seasons. He holds the franchise record with 102.5 career sacks.

During preparations for the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Alabama, last week, Berry told reporters he would not trade Garrett even if a team were to offer two first-round draft picks.

"We feel really good about Myles obviously as a big piece of our future," Berry said. "We're looking forward to him being on the field. Like I said in my (early January) press conference, we envision him going from Cleveland to Canton when his career is over."

Garrett has relatively low salaries the next two seasons, according to Over The Cap. He is owed about \$20 million in base salary and bonus in 2025 and \$25 million in 2026.

But he also carries significant dead money if Cleveland were to trade him. The Browns, who are currently projected at \$30 million over the cap in 2025, would face a \$36.2 million dead cap charge with a trade based on bonuses already paid to Garrett. Keeping Garrett in 2025 would result in just a \$19.7 million cap charge for Cleveland.

The NBA trade deadline is approaching and Antetokounmpo says no player is exempt from chaos

(AP) — The list of NBA players that might get traded before the 3 p.m. Eastern deadline on Thursday is a long one, according to Milwaukee star Giannis Antetokounmpo.

It includes ... well, basically everybody.

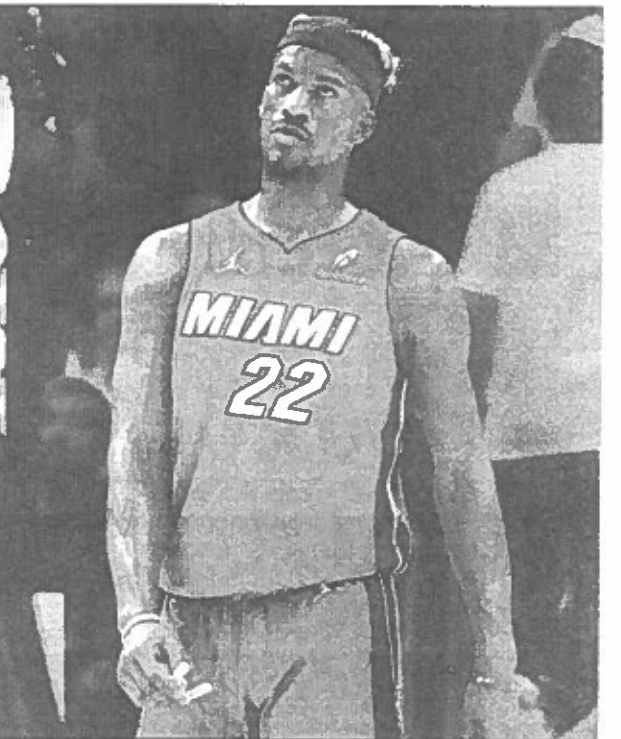
"This is the world we're living in," Antetokounmpo said. "It's a business. You have to understand this. Nobody's safe. Nobody's safe."

After this weekend, he might be right.

It's hard to envision a bigger stunner than the first deal that went down over the weekend — Luka Doncic is now with the Los Angeles Lakers and Anthony Davis is now with the Dallas Mavericks, the first time that two reigning All-NBA players were traded for one another in-season. That move overshadowed another one that, under normal circumstances, would have been seismic: De'Aaron Fox leaving Sacramento for San Antonio to join All-Star Victor Wembanyama, with Zach LaVine leaving Chicago for the Kings.

Fox was an All-NBA selection two years ago. LaVine is a two-time All-Star. And when adding in D'Angelo Russell getting moved by the Lakers to Brooklyn in late December, that's five current or former All-Stars that have been traded already this season.

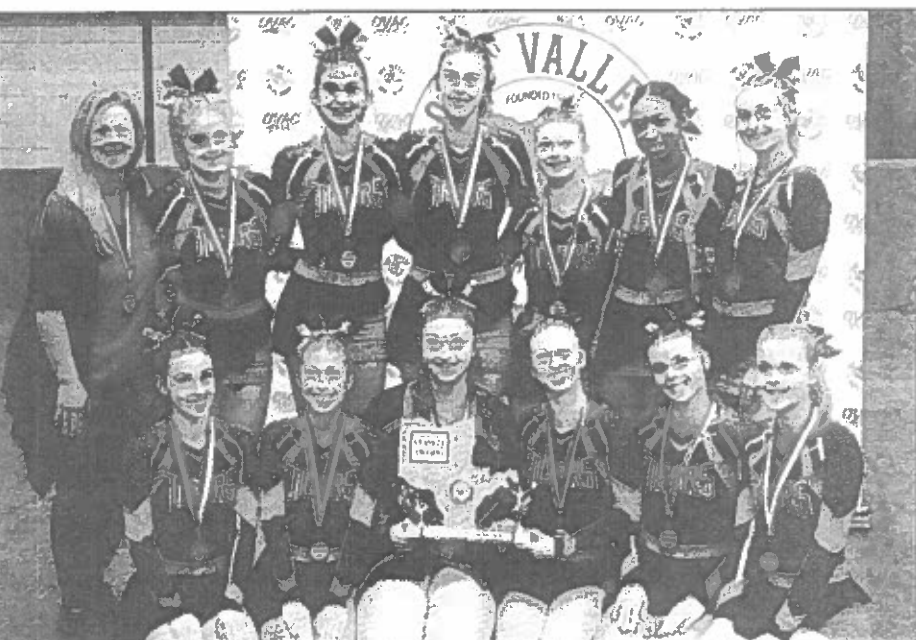

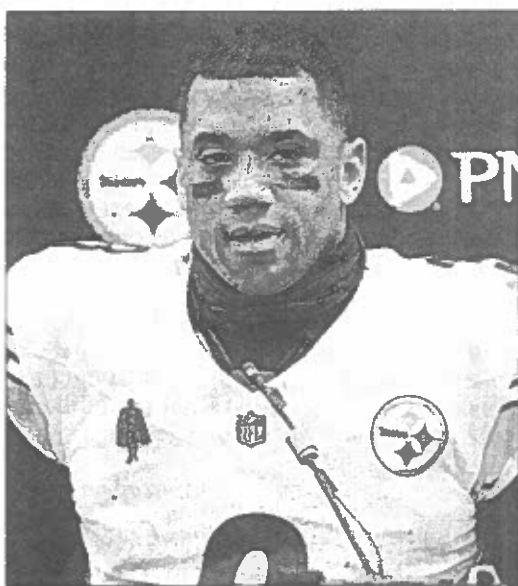
After all, Wilson realizes his 10th Pro Bowl might be his last.

Once plucky underdogs, Chiefs have become juggernaut fans love to hate

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Chiefs were once the loveable NFL underdogs, led by the good-natured coach who couldn't win the big one, the plucky quarterback with the Kermit the Frog-like voice, and the superstar tight end with charisma to spare.

Five years after their first trip to the Super Bowl in five decades, though, things have changed.

As the Chiefs prepare to face the Eagles next Sunday in New Orleans with an opportunity to win their record third consecutive Lombardi Trophy, football fans are seeing Andy Reid's bushy mustache popping up on TV commercials. They are hearing Patrick Mahomes' voice seemingly everywhere. And Tra-

at Emory University. "Pre-Mahomes, the Chiefs were an afterthought of a team; a small-market team was never a consistent winner. As the Chiefs grew into a dynasty, they became rivals to multiple teams, adversaries to overcome."

"In 2025, the Chiefs are perhaps the main rivals for the Ravens, Steelers, Eagles, Chargers and any other team that aspires to championships. Now, the Chiefs are the team that prevents other fandoms from reaching the promised land."

Indeed, the Chiefs have long been the rivals of the Raiders and Broncos, who play in the same division. But that team tucked away in Middle America also has become the biggest thorn in the side of the Bengals, whom they've played in

McIlroy overpowers Pebble Beach and wins in a runaway

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Pebble Beach looked as spectacular as ever.

So did Rory McIlroy. The combination of one of golf's biggest stars and America's most scenic coastal golf course was the just the spark the PGA Tour needed, and both lived up to their reputations Sunday in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am.

McIlroy was in complete control of his shots, leading to two key birdies when he made the turn against a pack of contenders. And then he delivered a haymaker, blasting his drive over a tree down the 14th fairway, leaving him only a 7-iron to the 571-yard hole to set up eagle. "We both hit 7 there," Sepp Straka said. "His was 7-iron, mine was 7-wood."

All that was left was a soothing stroll down the 18th fairway, enough sunshine to turn the surf turquoise, enough of a cushion to have no stress. McIlroy finished with a par for a 6-under 66 and a two-shot victory over Irish pal Shane Lowry.

"There's some venues in our game that just mean a little bit more than others and that's probably to do with the history and the people that have won on those courses and what those people have meant to the game of golf," McIlroy said.

"I've had a few close calls at St. Andrews. Augusta National being another one," he said. "So to be able to get a win on one of those iconic venues is awesome."

On a day when six players had at least a share of the lead, McIlroy took the top spot for good with a 6-iron out of the bunker to 18 feet for birdie on 10th hole into a stiff breeze along the Pacific. He hit a towering 7-iron to 8 feet for birdie on the par-3 12th to stretch his lead to two.

And then the 14th was

effectively the clincher, leaving everyone else scrambling for second. McIlroy hit 5-iron off the tee with a three-shot lead and was happy to get his hands on the crystal trophy, the 27th of his PGA Tour career.

Among players still actively playing, only Tiger Woods (82) and Phil Mickelson (45) have won more. Mickelson also was 35 when he got his 27th tour title.

Lowry fell out of a share for the lead when he sent his second shot over a cliff to the right of the par-5 sixth. But he shot 31 on the back nine, including a birdie on the final hole for a 68 that gave him second place alone.

Lucas Glover (67) and Justin Rose (68) were another shot behind. Straka, who started the final round with a one-shot lead, had a 72 and tied for seventh.

"I always say I believe when players like Rory McIlroy turns up and they have their 'A' game, they're pretty impossible to beat," Lowry said.

Scottie Scheffler, the world's No. 1 player whose season was delayed by minor hand surgery from punctured glass while making ravioli, closed with a 67 and tied for ninth.

McIlroy was inspired by Scheffler's tendency to avoid mistakes, he stole a page from that book this week at Pebble by tempering his aggressiveness nature. He made only one bogey on the weekend at Pebble Beach, including the wet, cold wind of Saturday.

McIlroy has talked about this being an important year for him, though his focus was more on April through September — an 11th chance to complete the career Grand Slam at the Masters, a return home to Northern Ireland for the British Open, a road Ryder Cup at Bethpage.

This wasn't a bad start. "It's a really cool way to start the season," McIlroy said. Winning makes everything sweeter, of course, but this week also featured a hole-in-one at Spyglass Hill in the opening round and his first time venturing over to play Cypress Point.

And now he heads back to Florida with another trophy, and loads of momentum for what he hopes will be a big year.

The sixth hole began to separate the pack a little. In consecutive groups, Rose went over the cliff with his tee shot and Tom Kim hit down the hill toward the ocean with his second shot. Lowry followed him in the final group, leading to bogey.

But really, McIlroy looked as though he was the player to beat from the second hole, when he hit a tough pitch from 50 yards away over a bunker to a back pin with enough height and spin to set up a 2-foot birdie putt.

But it was after his lone bogey on the tough eighth hole where he pulled away. Everyone else was left in a hopeless chase.

"When he's good, he's great. And when he's not great, he's good," Glover said. "There's a reason he's got 20-something wins and a bunch of majors and the game he has. Impressive round out there today under the pressure and under the conditions."

McIlroy won his second signature event — he won at Quail Hollow last year — to earn \$3.6 million. He finished at 21-under 267, one shot to par away from the tournament record.

Lowry at least tried to make him sweat, staying within range until missing a 7-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole that would have narrowed the gap to two. His final birdie, however, gave him a tidy consolation of \$2.16 million for second place.
