





But for most players, including Hopkins, making it is akin to a crowning achievement, a moment they worked for their entire career. "To get traded and try to learn the playbook overnight, it was tough. But this organization and these coaches, they're here for a reason, to get guys to be their best," Hopkins said. "I never went anywhere where they were talking about the Super Bowl."

Hunt joined the Chiefs under similar circumstances: They needed a running back after Isiah Pacheco got hurt.

He was sitting around at home when it happened, still recovering from a core muscle surgery that had scared many teams off from signing him this season. Hunt picked up the phone and called Andy Reid, who had coached him in Kansas City - before off-thefield issues led to Hunt's release - and who had stayed in contact with him over the years.

The fleet-footed yet injury-prone wide receiver signed a one-year deal with Kansas City prior to the season, hoping to be the No. 1 option for Patrick Mahomes on a team chasing a historic Super Bowl title.

Înstead, on the very first play of the preseason, he sustained a shoulder injury that many thought would end Brown's season.

The Chiefs held out hope that he might return, though, and his rehab by November was ahead of schedule. Brown finally got on the field in December and has become a part of a wide receiver group that may be the best Kansas City has had in years.






MOUNDSVILLE - Steubenville made it back-to-back OVAC Bill Hin-egardner Class 5A Dual Meet Champi-

Niederhauser's capped a 5-0 run to close out the half for the Nittany Lions.






