Brady Roe's shootout goal and lifts Ohio boys by W.Va., 2-1

ST. CLAIRSVILLE — There were plenty of standout players on the artificial pitch Sunday afternoon at windy and chilly-filled Red Devil Stadium in St. Clairsville for the annual OVAC Senior Showcase boys' soccer all-star match.

Union Local's Brady Roe turned out to be the hero for the Buckeye State. His goal in the fifth — and final — round of the shootout gave Ohio a cherished and hard-fought, 2-1, victory ball.

"This is a fantastic way to end my high school career," Roe added. "This means so much to me to be one of the first players from my high school to play in this game, on this field, and then to be able to score the game-winning goal."

Also scoring for Ohio in the shootout against Wood County Christian's Andrew Seigneur were St. Clairsville's Parker Galloway; Steubenville's Cole Bowers and Cambridge's Rylan Matthews.

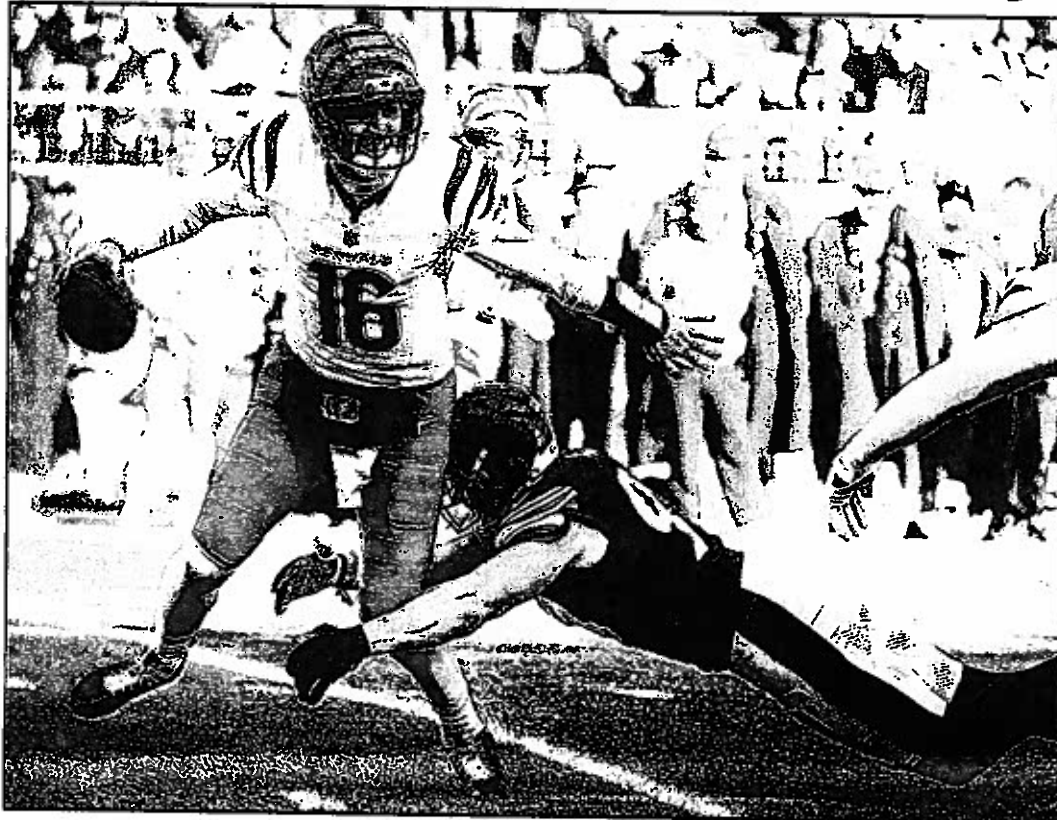

Enter Rudolph, the long-time backup who led the Steelers on a late run to the playoffs in 2023. He returned to Pittsburgh last spring after a year with Tennessee, though he quickly ceded the starting job after Rodgers signed in early June.

It was only when Rodgers pointed to Rudolph during halftime that Rudolph knew he would be going in. The eight-year veteran picked up right where he left off the

last time he took meaningful snaps for the Steelers, completing 12 of 16 throws for 127 yards, including a 5-yard touchdown pass to running back Kenneth Gainwell with 3:40 left that sealed it.

"I love playing here, this is where I was drafted," said Rudolph, a third-round pick by Pittsburgh in 2018. "This is home and yeah, (it was) very, very special."

Pittsburgh's defense, which was shredded by Joe Flacco and the Bengals a month ago, added two touchdowns of its own.

Safety Kyle Dugger, acquired in a trade with New England last month that looks shrewder by the week, intercepted Flacco and returned it 74 yards for a game-turning pick-6 in the third quarter. Cornerback James Pierre added a 32-yard scoop-and-score late in the fourth.

"Somebody gives you a gift like that, you've got to maximize it for the defense for the team," Dugger said after the 10th and perhaps easiest interception of his career.

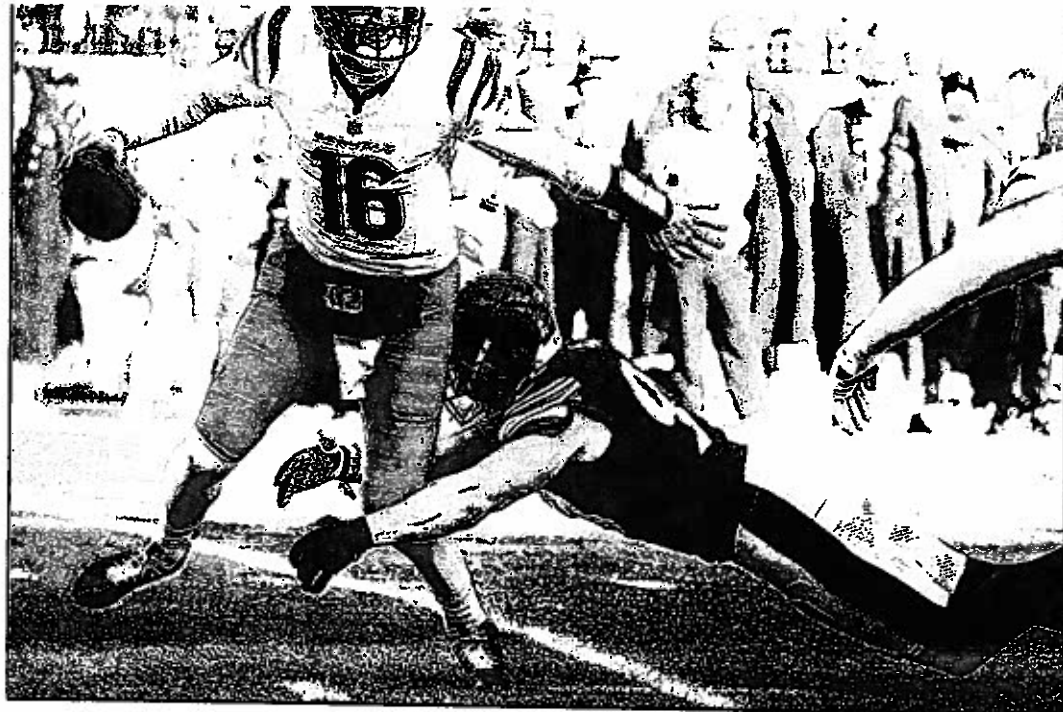

Haralson had 10 points off the bench and the Irish shot 58% to lead the Buckeyes 34-31 at halftime.

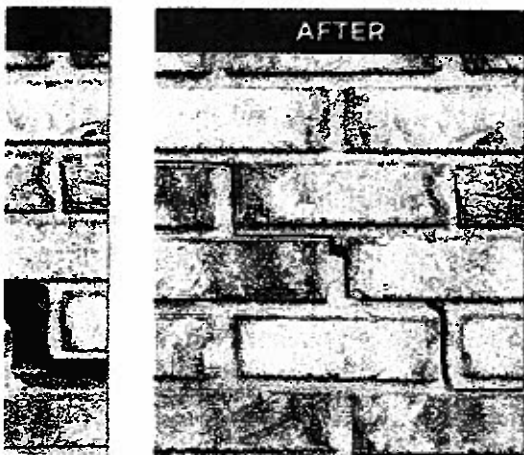
An early 18-4 run gave Notre Dame a 21-10 lead midway through the first half. The Buckeyes battled back, despite shooting just 38%.

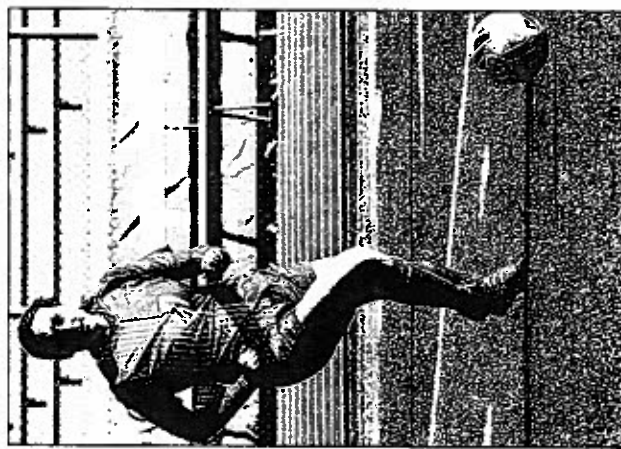

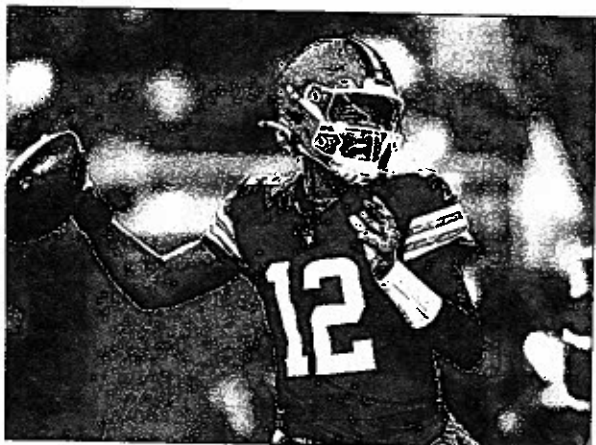

Coach Brian Daboll With Team At 2-8

few seasons have nothing short of disappointing, and we have not met our expectations for this franchise. We understand the frustrations of fans, and we will work to deliver a significantly improved product."

The rest of Daboll's career was kept in place, including defensive coordinator Shane Bowen. In New York, he has lost four consecutive games since upsetting the Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles in prime time early last month. That included losing the first team to the Titans in 2003 to lead by 18 points with six minutes to go and lose, which the Titans did at Denver on Nov. 19. This is just the Giants' first midseason coaching change over the past 95 years. It's the first since 1977, when Ben McAdoo

and general manager Jerry Reese were fired following a 2-10 start.

Daboll went 20-40-1 in his first head-coaching job in the league. He led the Giants to the playoffs in his first season and was named coach of the year, but has gone 11-33 since.

His .336 winning percentage ranks 154th out of 166 coaches with 50-plus games since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. Daboll is the second coach to be fired this season; Tennessee dismissed Brian Callahan after the Titans started 1-5.

"These are difficult decisions, and John and I do not take them lightly," Tisch said. "But we feel like this is the right thing to do at this time

and will allow us to move forward."

Daboll, who previously served as Buffalo's offensive coordinator from 2018-21, had faced increasing pressure about his job security in recent weeks and repeatedly took responsibility for the Giants' woes.

"Look, you put everything you've got into it," Daboll said. "You look at the things that aren't where they need to be and you try to fix them. Whether that's changing things on the schedule, whether that's different periods of practice, whether that's changing little parts of the scheme, again, that's where we're at. We're at where we're at."

While it's true that the 41-year-old Rodgers looked like the oldest active player in the league for the first time all season, it's also true that his play during the opening eight weeks is one of the main reasons Pittsburgh is atop an underperforming AFC North.

Rodgers is on pace to threaten Ben Roethlisberger's single-season franchise record of 34 touchdown passes set in 2018, and his decision-making has helped the Steelers become more efficient in the red zone.

Yet three times in the last month, Pittsburgh has been given the national spotlight with a chance to prove that this year's group is different than the "pretty good but nowhere near great" teams that have become the franchise's norm over the last decade.

All three times, they've failed. The defense came up empty against Joe Flacco and the Bengals, the entire team turtled in the second half of a loss to Green Bay, and the offense disappeared in the mid-autumn Southern Cal-

ifornia game media session Sunday, Rodgers — who lives in Malibu, California — was asked about it being perhaps his final game in the Golden State. Rodgers pointed out that it could be his final game in Southern California, a nod to the Super Bowl being in Northern California in February.

The Steelers have shown the briefest of flashes of being able to make a run at it. To those flashes into something more, all involved need to be better.

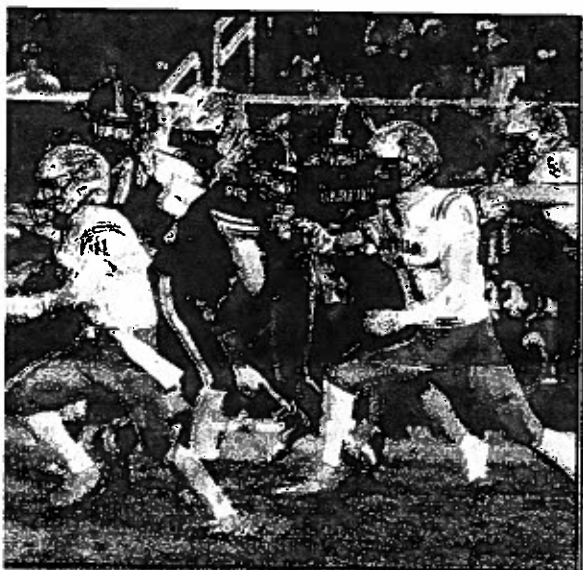
