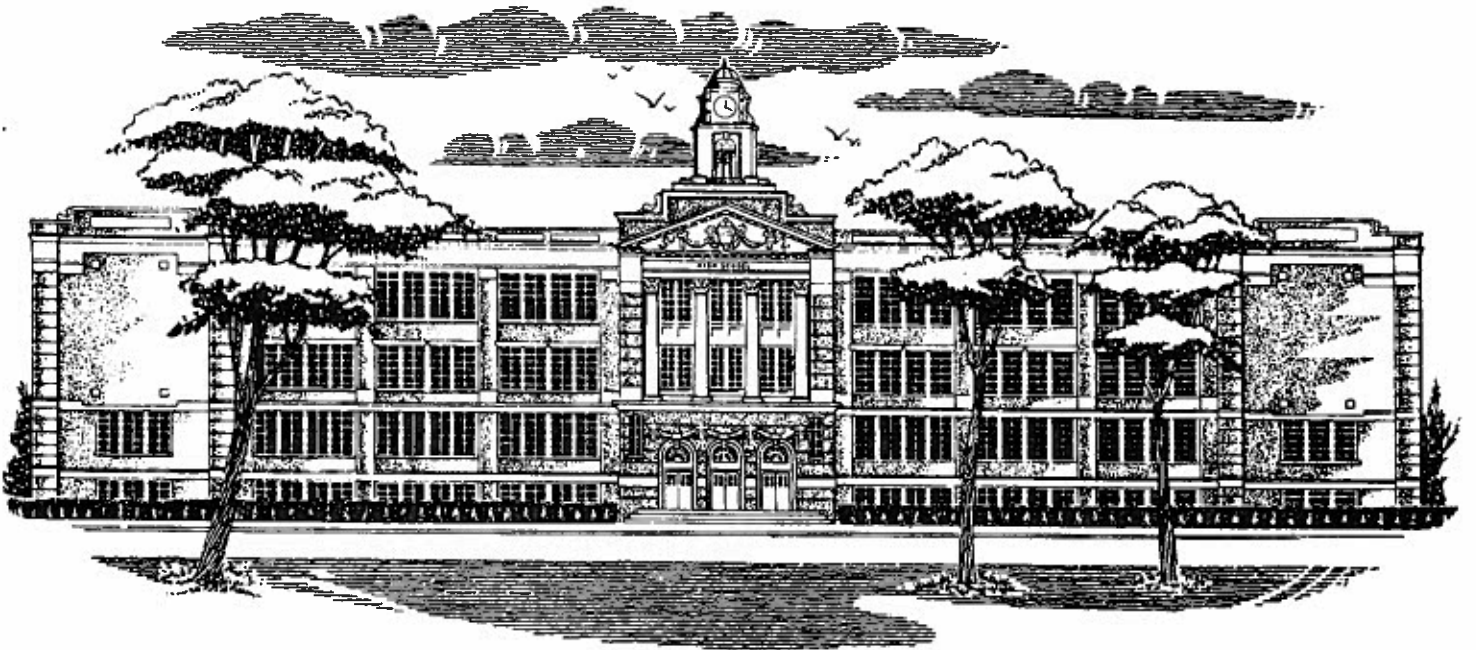

# CHARLES 'TOD' GOODWIN

Tonight's recipient of the Alumni Service Award is being bestowed upon Mr. Charles "Tod" Goodwin ('31).

Goodwin was a standout athlete while at Bellaire High School, lettering in football, basketball, and track. In 1930, he received All-Valley honors for his exploits in football. Upon graduation, he entered West Virginia University where he earned three letters as a two-way end. In 1934, Goodwin was selected MVP and was a member of the All-East Team. It is a rarity to see a three sport standout in college, but Goodwin played basketball and also ran track while at WVU. He is still a member of West Virginia University's All-Time football team.

From WVU, Goodwin went into professional football with the New York Giants where he set a pass receiving record which survived for over 20 years. He also did a stint with the Pittsburgh Pirates (now the Pittsburgh Steelers) and ended his professional career as a player-coach for the Wilmington Clippers of the American Association of Professional Football.

During World War II, Goodwin entered the U.S. Army, serving both the ETO and the Pacific Theater. In 1950, he coached the All-Army football squad which played the Air Force team in a Rice Bowl game in Tokyo. After active duty, Goodwin stayed in the reserves, where he rose to the rank of General.

Several years ago, Tod Goodwin was selected as a member of Bellaire High School's Hall of Fame and has been a generous benefactor to the school's program. Although a retired realtor, Goodwin is a frequent visitor to his alma mater during football season. This year marked the first recipient of the Tod Goodwin Scholarship that he has established to help an athlete with his college career.

The 34th recipient of the Service Award, the Bellaire High School Alumni Association is pleased to recognize and honor Mr. Charles "Tod" Goodwin.

# ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Last year, the Alumni Association initiated the Achievement Award in the hopes that we could begin recognizing more of our alumni who have contributed to our society. Not to take the place of the Service Award, the highest honor we bestow upon a graduate, the Achievement Award is meant to recognize those alumni who have made significant contributions to their school and community.

**JAMES A. DIXON** (Honorary) 65182 Candlewick Lane, Bellaire, OH 43906 \* If you had anything to do with Bellaire High School for 43 years, then you had to come in contact with Jim Dixon. From 1933 until 1976, Dixon served BHS as a teacher, a coach, a principal, and a superintendent. Under his direction, and with the help of a qualified staff he selected and directed, Dixon began a special education program Work Study, Head Start, the Practical Nursing program that is now at the Belmont Technical College, and a special reading program for the elementary schools (for which he served as Commissioner for Right to Read for Eastern Ohio). It was under his direction that a levy was passed to build the new gymnasium, cafeteria, and central kitchen, the science labs were remodeled, the industrial arts building and bus garage were built, the all-weather track was installed, and the present administration building was purchased. In addition to receiving Certificates of Commendation from Representatives A.C. Lancione and Jack Cera, Dixon received the first Certificate of Commendation for Achievement given by Dr. Martin Essex, State Superintendent of Schools. In his spare time, Dixon has served as an elder in the Bellaire Presbyterian Church, the Citizens Advisory Board, the Advisory Council for Ohio University Belmont, Belmont Technical College, Past President of the Ohio Valley Red Cross, Past President of the Belmont County Historical Society, the American Legion, Past President of the Kiwanis Club, Past President of the Eastern Ohio Superintendents' Association, and Past President of the Ohio Valley Football Officials. He has also served as the Interim Superintendent for the St. Clairsville-Richland School System, the Interim President and Manager of the Belmont Federal Savings and Loan Association, and will retire this year from the Community Improvement Corporation. Dixon, along with his wife, Nell, have three children: Jim, Diane, and Lynne.

**JOHN J. MALIK** ('46) 100 High Street St. Clairsville, OH 43950 \* Another long time name in the city of Bellaire, Jack Malik attended undergraduate school at John Carroll University in Cleveland and Notre Dame University. He later attained his LL.B. and Juris Doctorate Degrees from the University of Notre Dame Law School. Returning home, he commenced his law practice with his father, John J. Malik, Sr. (who died in 1970) in 1954. He later became associated and partners with Charles F. Knapp, Jack J. Kiger, and Daniel L. Frizzi, Jr. During his practice, Malik served as an elected City Solicitor from 1958-1964, Belmont County Prosecuting Attorney from 1965-1976, and was the former president of the Belmont County Bar Association. He was the former President of the Citizens National Bank in St. Clairsville and presently is the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors. Malik also serves as a board member of both the American Bancorporation and Alternative Residences II, St. Clairsville. Although he used to do a great deal of hunting, fishing, boating, and woodworking, he now limits his recreational interests to woodworking. He is married to the former Adrienne Carroll of St. Clairsville, and has four children: Michelle, the head nurse of Out-Patient Surgery at Mt. Carmel Hospital in Columbus; Jay and Greg, who operate "The Green Barn," a John Deere franchise in St. Clairsville, and Leslie, a junior at St. Clairsville High School.

**THOMAS L. RING** ('46) 528 44th Street Bellaire, OH 43906 \* Dr. Tom Ring has probably contributed more to Bellaire City Schools during the past 30 years than many people, as he has been bringing new students into the world since he started his medical career in Bellaire in 1955. Ring attended Ohio Wesleyan College where he graduated in 1950, and then went on to Western Reserve to receive his M.D. degree in 1954. Returning home, he joined forces with two tremendous family doctors who had spent their lifetime helping others in the community: Dr. D.M. Creamer, and his father, Dr. Homer Ring. His years of service to the community haven't been limited to the office. Ring has served as the Past President of the Belmont County Medical Society, the Past Chief of Staff of the City Hospital, and is a member of the American Board of Family Practice. Presently, Ring serves as the coroner for Belmont County. In his spare time, he enjoys working in his hothouse and garden hybridizing rhododendrans and fishing. He and his wife Susan reside on Hospital Road with two children, Michael and Heather, a sophomore and freshman at Bellaire High School. His other two children, Jeff and Janet, live away from home.

**MIKE SHERWOOD** ('67) 5150 Jefferson Street, Bellaire, OH 43906 They say it takes a lot of courage to come back to your alma mater and coach, especially in Bellaire, but that's exactly what Mike Sherwood did. His senior year in football, Mike quarterbacked perhaps one of the most powerful offenses ever assembled at Bellaire. From there, he went to West Virginia University and, over the next four years, treated the Mountaineers to a lot of exciting football. By the end of his career, he had written his name in the record books 18 times, many of which still stand today. He received the Pittsburgh Curbstone Coaches MVP Award in 1968, the Ira Rogers Award in 1970, and was selected to perform in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game. That same year, he was selected to perform in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game. In addition to playing in the 1969 Peach Bowl where WVU defeated South Carolina, 14-3, Sherwood was also selected in a pool for the All-Time WVU team. His three year career saw him pilot the Mountaineers to a 25-7 record. Upon graduation, he served as a graduate assistant for WVU while earning his Masters Degree. The next five years saw him split time between Bethany College and Waynesburg College, before returning to his alma mater in 1980. Although his coaching career lasted only 4 years (26-13-1), he was selected the 1980 Eastern District Coach of the Year, and piloted the 1982 OVAC All-Star squad. In 1984, Sherwood resigned his football coach's job to assume the reins of the Athletic Department Director, where he continues to upgrade the quality of the program. He is a member of the American Football Coaches' Association, the Ohio Football Coaches' Association, the OVAC Football Coaches' Association, the Ohio Athletic Directors' Association, and the Eastern District Athletic Directors' Association. He and his wife, the former Pam Soland, have two children: Kell, 5 years old, and Matt, 4 years old.

**CLYDE A. THOMAS** ('58) 90 Knox Lane Wheeling, WV 26003 \* Those Ohio Valley residents who have lived here since the 50's, have never been able to forget the name of Clyde Thomas. At Bellaire High, Thomas enjoyed a very successful senior year, serving as a class officer and captain of both the football and basketball teams, where he also was elected MVP. From there, he went to Ohio University, where he played on the undefeated, United National Championship team in 1960. After graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree in business, Thomas began a 10 year career in pro football with stints with the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League, the B.C. Lions of the Canadian Football League, and the Ohio Valley's own Wheeling Ironmen of the Continental Football League. While with the Ironmen, Thomas lead the League in rushing and kickoff returns and was again selected as the MVP. Retiring from pro football, he opened the Clyde A. Thomas Insurance Company which he ran for 17 years. During this time, he was selected Agent of the Year 3 times for selling over \$20 million of life insurance. He is presently the owner of Thomas Construction

Each year, the Alumni Association honors a boy and a girl from the graduating class for their contributions to Bellaire High School. The recipients receive a \$100 Savings Bond and a 16x20 portrait that is displayed on the first floor of the high school listing all their accomplishments.

During the past four years, MIKE IMBROSCIO has been a little dynamo of activity. His major accomplishments have come on the wrestling mat where he was a four-year performer and captain. His senior year was short of outstanding, as he accomplished championships at the Barnesville Tournament, Watkins Memorial Tournament, and the gigantic OVAC meet. He was also crowned as the District champion before suffering a heartbreaking loss in the Sectionals. Mike also received the MVP honors for the year. He also was a member of the championship track team for the past two years and is participating in the District meet tonight. During football season, Mike served as a statistician for the team. Outside the world of sports, Imbroscio has been a four year member of the Publications Staff as a sportswriter and a four year member of the Student Council where he served as Vice-President. He capped off his senior year by being a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, the National Honor Society, and was listed in Who's Who and the International Award in Student Council. A member of St. Johns, Mike still found time to do a little studying, as he accumulated a perfect 4.0 average, earning him the Valedictorian spot as first in a class of 178.

The money from the lifetime memberships will be placed in a special account for the purpose of drawing interest. Hopefully, the interest from this corpus will allow us to fund some nice projects in the future.
